The KING has been graciously pleased to give orders for the following appointments to the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire:

To be Additional Officers of the Military Division of the said Most Excellent Order:

Major (Acting Lieutenant Colonel) Kenneth Langton Macdonald COOPER, Royal Marines, for inspiring leadership, courage and efficiency whilst in command of the 3rd H.A.A. Regiment, R.M., for a period of over four years.

He has performed with outstanding distinction an important part in keeping open the Port of Antwerp, coming as a fitting culmination to a very long and successful tenure of command.

Temporary Major (Acting Temporary Lieutenant Colonel) Hugh LINDSAY, Royal Marines,

for outstanding example, leadership and efficiency whilst in command of the 4th L.A.A. Regiment, R.M. Shortly after Lieutenant Colonel Lindsay took command, his Regiment was deployed in defence of the Port of Antwerp during February and March 1945. The high standard displayed by the Regiment during this critical period was largely due to his example and made a considerable contribution to the defence of the Port.

Major (Acting Lieutenant Colonel) Thomas Kelly WALKER, Royal Marines,

for inspiring leadership, organisation and efficiency in forming and training an infantry battalion within three months. The battalion went into training in January, 1945, and the following April relieved a sector of the River Maas. Numerous offensive patrols were made across the river and on the night of April 22nd the enemy were evicted from Alem Island and the Heerevaarden Isthmus.

The KING has been graciously pleased to approve the award of the George Medal to the undermentioned:—

Temporary Lieutenant James Verdon STEELE, R.N.V.R.

When a "Biber" Midget Submarine was being brought into Dover on January 8th, 1945, the tow-line parted and it sank making location very difficult. As it was the first of its type to be recovered instructions had been given that it had to be raised at all costs and Lieutenant Steele showed great courage and initiative in carrying out this extremely hazardous operation.

When the submarine had at last been located and brought into shallow water, it was found to have one torpedo on board which was in the dangerous position and not set to safe. As any small slip or jolt to the submarine might have released the torpedo and caused it to fire, Lieutenant Steele took very great precaution in lifting it. Moreover the pistol was found to be

of a new type and rendering it safe was a matter of some guesswork and consequently, very dangerous.

The weather during the whole of the operation was very rough, and frequent snow-storms militated against the gentle handling of the torpedo, making the task even more hazardous.

Lieutenant Steele also found and removed the submarine's scuttling charges which were in a particularly awkward position in the partly-flooded submarine. Any false move on his part in the bad light would have resulted in an explosion and his own destruction, but by his courage and devotion to duty the whole of this new type of midget submarine was captured intact as well as the latest type of torpedo pistol.

Lieutenant Steele also took part in the recovery of a new type of torpedo from a Seehunde Midget Submarine stranded off Yarmouth on 7th February, 1945. This was also a very delicate and dangerous operation carried out under extremely difficult conditions in bad weather, and calling for great endurance and devotion to duty from this Officer and his helpers. The submarine went aground on the Scroby sands and when it was possible to land there Lieutenant Steele found that it was largely buried in liquid sand and very difficult to salvage. With the aid of a bulldozer and tractor and sheer determination, sufficient of the submarine was uncovered to make recovery of the torpedo possible. The weather and condition of the sand made it necessary to work as quickly as possible, and Lieutenant Steele and his party worked for thirty hours at a stretch in order to complete the operation successfully.

The recovery of these new types of enemy weapons was of the greatest use in deciding on appropriate counter measures, which were very necessary at that time, as the midget submarine was a menace to coastal and cross-channel shipping.

Temporary Lieutenant (Sp.) Richard Aitken WATERS, R.N.V.R.

Lieutenant Waters was ordered to recover a Seehunde Midget Submarine which had been stranded on a sandbank near Walcheren. The operation began on 13th January, 1945 and was completed on 5th February, 1945, under extremely difficult conditions. The submarine was practically buried in sand and it was impossible to remove the portside torpedo pistol until it was dug out a little. When he did attempt to remove the pistol Lieutenant Waters found that it had to be removed by hand, as it had jammed, and had to be started with a cold chisel and hammer. Later when it was possible to remove the starboard torpedo he again had to use a hammer, some two feet under freezing water, in order to recover the pistol from the torpedo which was not fully in the safe condition. He also had to remove the detonators and primers from this pistol by force, a most dangerous task, which took three and a half hours. A slightly inaccurate blow with the hammer during any of these operations would have certainly resulted in an explosion which would probably have had fatal consequences, a fact of which Lieutenant Waters was fully aware.

This was the first Seehunde to be recovered so completely and this successful operation resulted in full knowledge being obtained of the latest German midget submarine, which was a menace to our coastal and cross-channel shipping.
