

and pass the *Adda*, Prince Eugene has left at *Castiglione* a Garrison of 100 Horse, and 700 Foot, and has put a Garrison likewise into *Castel-Guisfre* or *Godofredo*. 'Tis said, the Prince of *Castiglione* is gone to the *French Army*; The Princess his Wife with her Children are gone to *Verona*, being conducted thither in Prince Eugene's Coaches, and attended with a Guard of Horse as far as *Dezenzano*. *Proveditore Extraordinary Delfino* arrived here last night from *Venice*; and *Proveditore General Milino* is shortly expected from *Verona*; Most of the *Venetian Forces* which were in that Place are marching hither.

Vienna, August 15. The King of *Denmark's* Minister here has received the first Payment of the Money which the Emperor is to pay for the *Danish Forces* lately put into his Service and they are forthwith to march towards the *Rhine*. 'Tis discoursed here, that the Emperor will send 10000 Men more to *Italy*. The Ambassador of *Saxony* is gone from hence in pursuance of the Emperor's Orders.

Munich, August 17. The Elector of *Bavaria* has ordered his Troops, which amount in the whole to about 18000 Men, to draw together near this City towards the end of the next month, in order to take a Review of them.

Cologne, August 25. A Regiment of Foot of the Elector Palatine's Forces entered yesterday in this City to reinforce this Garrison, which is now 6000 strong. A Body of the said Elector's Forces are encamped at *Mulheim*, to be ready to give us further Assistance in case there be occasion. They write from *Ratisbonne*, that the *French* and *Saxony* Ministers there had received Orders from the Emperor's First Commissioner to leave that Place.

Hamburg, August 23. The last Letters from *Courland* give an Account, that the *Swedes* fortify *Mittaw*, and had taken a Place called *Bausche* in *Courland*, where they found a considerable Magazine provided by the *Saxons*. 'Tis said, that the *Saxon Forces* that were in *Liesbald*, are marching to *Saxony*.

Brussels, August 26. The Feast of *St. Lewis*, being the Name of the Most Christian King, was observed here yesterday with as great Solemnity as the King of *Spain's* could be; The Cannon round the Town was thrice discharged, and the Forces which were drawn together near this Place made 3 Salvo's with their small Arms, and the Marquis of *Bedmar* gave a splendid Entertainment, and a Ball, to the Persons of Quality in Town. Orders were sent beforehand to the Governors of all the *Spanish Towns* to do the like. There are at present 13 *Spanish Battalions* encamped near this Place, making together about 9000 Men; The rest of the Foot not being yet ready, the General Review is put off till the 4th of the next month. Several Persons are come hither from *France*, with a design to Farm the King of *Spain's* Revenues, and have brought with them a considerable Sum of Money to advance the first Quarter. Letters come in this day from *Madrid* say, Regents are appointed to have the Administration of the Government during the King of *Spain's* Absence when he goes to meet the Queen, at *Barcelona*, though the time of his Journey is not yet fixed; and some think the Queen's coming to *Spain* may be delayed till the Duke of *Savoy's* Intentions in relation to the Publick Affairs are better known. Several Persons are arrived at *Madrid* from the *French Court*, to put the King of *Spain's* Revenues into a better Method.

Dieren, August 25. On Tuesday morning His Majesty went from hence to *Nimeguen*, where he reviewed the Horse and Dragoons encamped on the *Mocker-Heide*, being near 40 Squadrons, in all about 4000 Men. His Majesty at the same time presented the Earl of *Galloway* to the Regiment of *Dutch Horse-Guards* as their Colonel, and afterwards visited the new Works that are making round the City, which are in good forwardness. Yesterday morning the King reviewed the Foot in Garrison at *Nimeguen*, consisting of 9 Regiments, which were drawn out for that purpose; Afterwards His Majesty went to the *Grave* to see the Fortifications, and then reviewed the 3 Regiments of Foot in that Garrison, and in the evening returned to *Nimeguen*, very well satisfied with the good Condition all those Troops are in. Count *Styrum* and Count *Bentheim* attended His Majesty in this Progress. This morning His Majesty left *Nimeguen*, and came to *Pandze*, to see the Canal that is ma-

king there to join the *Waal* and the *Rhine*, in order to supply the latter with Water. Afterwards His Majesty killed a Stag, and returned hither this evening in very good Health.

Hague, August 26. The Forces which the King of *Denmark* has put into the Service of the States-General, are expected very soon, every thing being adjusted in relation to their March. We hear Count *Tallard* is marched back to *Alsace* with the *French Forces* under his Command, which were come to *Lomburg*. Count *Sinzendorf* is shortly expected here from *Paris*, as Count *Styrum* is likewise from *Dieren*. Some Letters which came in yesterday from *Italy*, speak of an Insurrection in the Kingdom of *Sicily* in favour of the Emperor.

Paris, August 27. N. S. Letters from the *French* and *Spanish Army* in *Italy* of the 16th Instant give an Account, that having rested some days at *Castel-Franco*, they decamped from thence the 10th, and marched along the *Oglio* to *la Rocca*; The 11th they came to *Scandolera*. Prince *Vaudemont*, who had been at *Milan* to give the necessary Orders for preserving the Publick Quiet there, returned that day to the Army. The 13th, the Army marched again, and arrived the 15th at *Soricina*, between *Picighittone* and *Sonino*, where Count *Tesse* was expected the 17th or 18th with the Reinforcements lately arrived from *France*. The Imperial Army, as we are informed by Letters from *Milan* of the 18th, marched the 13th from *Monte-Chiaro* to *Torbale*, where they rested the day following, and advanced the 16th to *Palazzuolo* on the *Oglio*, of which Place General *Palfi* had possessed himself some days before. The Imperial Army is said to consist of 44000 effective Men, and they expect a farther Reinforcement of 9000. The *French* are said to be much inferior to the *German*s in Horse; They are very much discouraged, and the Climate does so ill agree with them, that they have a great many Men in their Hospitals. The Emperor's Envoy intends to be going from hence on Monday next.
