Rome, August 9. N. S.

Ardinal Fanssen had Audience of the Pope the 6th Inftant, and prefented to him the Abbot Thefu, who is appointed by the Dutchess of Orleans to be her Plenipotentiary for adjusting the Differences between the Elector Palatine and her Royal Highnels, concerning her Pretentions to several Lands in the Palatinate, the final Decision of which is idented to the Pope, pursuant to the Treaty of Rywick. The Pope has appointed Cardinal Tours to be Legate of Orbino, and has named Cardinal Archinto, who is now at his Archbihopick of Milan, to go to Turin, to make a Compliment in his Name to the new Queen of Spain. The Princets of Ursini, who is to accompany her Catholick Majesty in her Journey wspain, is on her departure from hence to Tuin The Pope has given Orders for enlarging the Hospital of St. Francisco at Ripa, founded by Pope Innocent XII his Predecutior. Doutzick, August 20. The last Advices from Comland lay, the Swediffs Army was encamped that Baufeben. The Saxon Forces are marching both to Saxony by the way of Pruffia, and the Muscovite Auxiliaries are returning home, so that the King of Sweden is entirely Maker of all Courland. He has demanded a confiderable Sum of Money, and a great quantry of Provisions, of the States of that Counth which they have consented to furnish him, Epon the hopes he has given them, that he will te them reimbursed upon the Conclusion of the Peace. The Dunamunder Fort held out ftill; but the same being so closely blocked up by a body of Swedish Forces, that no Provisions can ecarried into it, and the Garrison having no hopes of any Relief, twas not doubted but they would foon be obliged to furrender, upon such Conditions as the Swedes should be willing mgrant them, who will thereby become Mahers of the King of Poland's great Train of Artillery, confishing of 20 Pieces of Cannon, which is laid up in that Place. The Swedes are familying Mittaw, and several other Places in Comland Letters from W. wfaw lay, the Senate met there the 4th Instant, and resolved to send one of their Body to the King of Smelen, to defire, that he would not suffer his Forces to enter into the Territories of the Re-Differences between him and the King

Principal Nobility of Lithuania (who are met there to endeavour to accommodate the Differences between the House of Sapieba and the Confederated Nobility of that Dutchy) have writ a Letter to the King of Sweden to the iame effect.

Vienna, August 17. Orders are i given for fending a Reinforcement of 6000 Men from Hungary to the Imperial Army in Italy; and tis taid the Danish Forces now in Saxony which have been lately put into the Emperor's Service, are to be fent to Hungary in their room; A Draught of 2000 Men is also ordered to be made out of the Imperial Garrisons at Friburgh, Brifac, and the other Places on the Rhine, to be sent to Italy, whose Place will be supplied by the like number of the Bishop of Wurtzburgh's Forces, which are to be taken into the Emperor's Pay, in pursuance of the Treasy lately

concluded with that Bishop.

From the French Camp at Antegnato between Soncino and Ponte Oglio, Aug 23. The 12th Instant the Army continued at Scandolera to refresh the Troops, who were extreamly fatigued with their difficult Marches, the Country being full of Hedges and Ditches, and of Fields fowed with Rice, and overflowed with Water. The 13th we continued our March along the Oglio, and came to Rebecco, the 14th to Bardelano, and the 15th to Campagna, a short League from Soncino. The Marquis of Vaucocourt, Lieutenant-Colonel, who was detached the 13th with 250 French Horse, and 60 of the Duke of Savoy's Horse-Guards, to view the Fords of the River Oglio as far as Soncino, rejoined the Army this day, and gave an Account, that he had viewed the River 3 miles above Soneino, advancing within the like distance of Ponte Oglio, at which Place, and at Palazzuolo, he heard there was a Body of 2500 German Horse commanded by General Palfi; and that he only met with a Party of 60 German Horse, who, the 14th at night, attacked a French Lieutenant with 12 Troopers, who were marching before to get Intelligence; But these being supported by the Duke of Savoy's Guards, and by a French Troop of Dragoons, the Germans retired. The 16th the Army marched to Romanengo, and continued there the next day, to expect the coming up of the Troops which Count Teffe was bringing to the Army, and who were advanced to Vaver near Crema. The 18th the Sieur de Courlandon was tent out with a Party of Horle to get Intelligence of the Enemy, who brought an Account Polick of Poland, which had no part in the League on this side Breseia, and was encamped pland. The 20th we marched to Comisano, and were joined by Count Tesse with the Body of Forces under his Command, consisting of 20 Battalions, and 32 Squadrons; and yesterday we marched to this Place. The Marquis of Russay, who had been sent out with a Party of Horse to observe the German Camp, brought word, that they were intreaching themselves near Palazzuolo in a very advantagious Post, and had 4000 Pioneers at work. Lait night Marthat Villeroy arrived in our Camp with a Guard of Soo Horle, who were lent our to meet him as far as Ledi. We received Advice, that General Pa'fi had patled the Oglio with a Body of 2000 Horse, and was advanced within 3 miles of our Army. This day the Marquis of Precontal was few out with a Detachment of 1500 Horse, and 300 Granadiers, with Orders to cause several Bridges to be made over the Oglio. The Chevalier de Tosse, Lieutenant-General in the French Service, died some days ago at Crema.

Faris, September 3. N. S. Letters from Milan of the 26th pait, which came in last night, give an Account, that the French Army continued at Fontanella, and that their advanced Guards were extended as far as Romano in the Country of Brescia, to prevent the frequent Excursions of the Germans, who had several times in strong Parties advanced as far as Caravagio in the Mi-Lineze. The 24th, Marshal Villeroy took a Review of the whole French and Spanish Army, which is faid to be 50000 strong, all their Garrisons being to much drained, that there are not above 2000 Men left in Mantua. The Imperial Army was encamped near Ponte Oglio, Prince Eugene having his head Quarters at Rovello, within 2 leagues of the French. A Party of the Imperialists were working very hard upon the Fortifications of Palazzuelo, and other new Intrenchments they are making there, the Situation of that Place being very convenient for them; and they were at liberty to pals and repass the River Oglio there as they thought sit. The 25th, a German Party furprized, and took Prisoners 12 French Officers, as they were going from the City of Mantua, (where they had lain fick) to their Army. The Abbot of Louvon returned hither from Rome the first Instant. An Edict has been published here, for raising 500000 Livres, by augmenting the Salaries of certain Publick Officers, who, in Confideration thereof, are to advance this Sum to the King. Another Edict is come out. fetting forth, That whereas feveral Publick Offices are Hereditary, or granted in Reversion, and the King might (as has always been the Practife in his Finances) revoke and annul these Rights of Inheritance and Reversion, yet he is willing to confirm the fame, upon the Payment of certain Sums, to be fettled by the Council, with respect to the particular value of their respective Employ-ments; of which further notice thall be given them. A Declaration has likewise been issued, enhyning all Vagabonds in the City of Paris to depart the same within one month's time, and apply themselves to manure the Ground, or to such other Works or Employments as they shall Le nt for, under pain of being fent to the Galleys for 3 years.
