Rome, August 9. N. S.

Cardinal *Janssen* had Audience of the Pope the 6th Instant, and presented to him the Abbot *Theſu*, who is appointed by the Dutchels of *Orleans* to be her Plenipotentiary for adjusting the Differences between the Elector Palatine and her Royal Highness, concerning her Pretensions to several Lands in the Palatinate, the final Decision of which is referred to the Pope, pursuant to the Treaty of *Ryſwick*. The Pope has appointed Cardinal *Tamara* to be Legate of *Urbino*, and has named Cardinal *Archinto*, who is now at his Archbishoprick of *Milan*, to go to *Turin*, to make a Compliment in his Name to the new Queen of *Spain*. The Princeſs of *Urſini*, who is to accompany her Catholick Majeſty in her Journey to *Spain*, is on her departure from hence to *Turin*. The Pope has given Orders for enlarging the Hospital of *St. Francis* at *Ripa*, founded by Pope *Innocent XII* his Predeceſſor. Letters from *Naples* ſay, the Affairs of that Kingdom are in great diſorder, and that the Emperor's Party gains ground every day.

Dantzick, August 20. The laſt Advices from *Cowland* ſay, the *Swediſh* Army was encamped near *Bauſeben*. The *Saxon* Forces are marching back to *Saxony* by the way of *Pruffia*, and the *Muſcovite* Auxiliaries are returning home, ſo that the King of *Sweden* is entirely Maſter of all *Cowland*. He has demanded a conſiderable Sum of Money, and a great quantity of Proviſions, of the States of that Country, which they have conſented to furniſh him, upon the hopes he has given them, that he will ſee them reimbursed upon the Conclusion of the Peace. The *Dinamunder* Fort held out ſtill; but the ſame being ſo cloſely blocked up by a Body of *Swediſh* Forces, that no Proviſions can be carried into it, and the Garriſon having no hopes of any Relief, 'twas not doubted but they would ſoon be obliged to ſurrender, upon ſuch Conditions as the *Swedes* ſhould be willing to grant them, who will thereby become Maſters of the King of *Poland's* great Train of Artillery, conſiſting of 90 Pieces of Cannon, which is laid up in that Place. The *Swedes* are juſtifying *Mitaw*, and ſeveral other Places in *Cowland*. Letters from *Vienna* ſay, the Senate met there the 4th Instant, and reſolved to ſend one of their Body to the King of *Sweden*, to deſire, that he would not ſuffer his Forces to enter into the Territories of the Republick of *Poland*, which had no part in the Differences between him and the King of *Poland*. They write from *Vienna*, that the

Principal Nobility of *Lithuania* (who are met there to endeavour to accommodate the Differences between the Houſe of *Sapieba* and the Confederated Nobility of that Dutchy) have writ a Letter to the King of *Sweden* to the ſame effect.

Vienna, August 17. Orders are given for ſending a Reinforcement of 6000 Men from *Hungary* to the Imperial Army in *Italy*; and 'tis ſaid the *Daniſh* Forces now in *Saxony* which have been lately put into the Emperor's Service, are to be ſent to *Hungary* in their room; A Draught of 2000 Men is alſo ordered to be made out of the Imperial Garriſons at *Friburgh*, *Briſac*, and the other Places on the *Rhine*, to be ſent to *Italy*, whole Place will be ſupplied by the like number of the Biſhop of *Wurtzburgh's* Forces, which are to be taken into the Emperor's Pay, in purſuance of the Treaty lately concluded with that Biſhop.

From the French Camp at Antegnato between *Soncino* and *Ponte Oglio*, Aug 23. The 12th Instant the Army continued at *Scandolera* to reſreſh the Troops, who were extremely fatigued with their difficult Marches, the Country being full of Hedges and Ditches, and of Fields ſowed with Rice, and overflowed with Water. The 13th we continued our March along the *Oglio*, and came to *Rebecca*, the 14th to *Bardolano*, and the 15th to *Campagna*, a ſhort League from *Soncino*. The Marquis of *Vauccour*, Lieutenant-Colonel, who was detached the 13th with 250 *French* Horſe, and 60 of the Duke of *Savoys* Horſe-Guards, to view the Fords of the River *Oglio* as far as *Soncino*, rejoined the Army this day, and gave an Account, that he had viewed the River 3 miles above *Soncino*, advancing within the like diſtance of *Ponte Oglio*, at which Place, and at *Palazzuolo*, he heard there was a Body of 2500 *German* Horſe commanded by General *Palfi*; and that he only met with a Party of 60 *German* Horſe, who, the 14th at night, attacked a *French* Lieutenant with 12 Troopers, who were marching before to get Intelligence; But theſe being ſupported by the Duke of *Savoys* Guards, and by a *French* Troop of Dragoons, the *Germans* retired. The 16th the Army marched to *Romanengo*, and continued there the next day, to expect the coming up of the Troops which Count *Teffe* was bringing to the Army, and who were advanced to *Vaver* near *Crema*. The 18th the Sieur de *Courlandon* was ſent out with a Party of Horſe to get Intelligence of the Enemy, who brought an Account the next day, that their Army was come a League on this ſide *Breſcia*, and was encamped near *Cafali*, *Torbolo*, and *Roncadella*, in which laſt Place Prince *Eugene* has his head Quarters, and

that 'twas said, they were advanced this way, upon the Encouragement given them by the Party they have in the *Milaneze*. The 20th we marched to *Comisano*, and were joined by Count *Tesse* with the Body of Forces under his Command, consisting of 20 Battalions, and 32 Squadrons; and yesterday we marched to this Place. The Marquis of *Ruffay*, who had been sent out with a Party of Horse to observe the *German* Camp, brought word, that they were intrenching themselves near *Palazucolo* in a very advantageous Post, and had 4000 Pioneers at work. Last night Marshal *Villeroi* arrived in our Camp with a Guard of 300 Horse, who were sent out to meet him as far as *Lodi*. We received Advice, that General *Passi* had passed the *Oglio* with a Body of 2000 Horse, and was advanced within 3 miles of our Army. This day the Marquis of *Precontal* was sent out with a Detachment of 1500 Horse, and 300 Grenadiers, with Orders to cause several Bridges to be made over the *Oglio*. The *Chevalier de Tesse*, Lieutenant-General in the *French* Service, died some days ago at *Crema*.

Paris, September 3. N. S. Letters from *Milan* of the 26th inst, which came in last night, give an Account, that the *French* Army continued at *Fontanelli*, and that their advanced Guards were extended as far as *Romano* in the Country of *Brescia*, to prevent the frequent Excursions of the *Germans*, who had several times in strong Parties advanced as far as *Caravaggio* in the *Milaneze*. The 24th, Marshal *Villeroi* took a Review of the whole *French* and *Spanish* Army, which is said to be 50000 strong, all their Garrisons being so much drained, that there are not above 2000 Men left in *Mantua*. The Imperial Army was encamped near *Ponte Oglio*, Prince *Eugene* having his head Quarters at *Rozello*, within 2 leagues of the *French*. A Party of the Imperialists were working very hard upon the Fortifications of *Palazucolo*, and other new Intrenchments they are making there, the Situation of that Place being very convenient for them; and they were at liberty to pass and repass the River *Oglio* there as they thought fit. The 25th, a *German* Party surprized, and took Prisoners 12 *French* Officers, as they were going from the City of *Mantua*, (where they had lain sick) to their Army. The Abbot of *Louvain* returned hither from *Rome* the first Instant. An Edict has been published here, for raising 500000 Livres, by augmenting the Salaries of certain Publick Officers, who, in Consideration thereof, are to advance this Sum to the King. Another Edict is come out, setting forth, That whereas several Publick Offices are Hereditary, or granted in Reversion, and the King might (as has always been the Practice in his Finances) revoke and annul these Rights of Inheritance and Reversion, yet he is willing to confirm the same, upon the Payment of certain Sums, to be settled by the Council, with respect to the particular value of their respective Employments; of which further notice shall be given them. A Declaration has likewise been issued, enjoining all Vagabonds in the City of *Paris* to depart the same within one month's time, and apply themselves to manure the Ground, or to such other Works or Employments as they shall be fit for, under pain of being sent to the Gallies for 3 years.
