

Vienna, August 30. General Schlick is on his departure from hence to the Court of the Elector of Mentz. Baron Fuchs, who has resided here some time as Envoy from the Bishop of Wurtburgh, is going with the same Character to Berlin. Letters from Constantinople of the 22d past say, the Grand Signor was still at Andrinople, and that an Ambassador was arrived there from the Czar of Muscovy, who has had Audience of the Grand Signior.

Cologne, Sept. 13. The States of this Electorate are still assembled at Bon. The Elector of Cologne has made some Propositions to them, which were very much disliked, and the Chapter of this Cathedral has drawn up a Memorial to justify their Proceedings.

Brussels, Sept. 16. The Marquis de Bedmar went yesterday to Louvain, to confer with Marshal Boufflers, and intends afterwards to go and visit the Garrisons and Lines in Flanders. The 12th Instant the Magazines of Hay at Ruremond accidentally took Fire; it lasted 3 Days, and did very considerable Damage.

Loe, Sept. 16. On Tuesday His Majesty, accompanied by the Bishop of Osnabrug, with the Court, went to Dieren, and this day His Majesty returned to this Place. Count Stirum, Lieutenant-General of the Emperor's Forces, returned on Wednesday from the Court at Duffeldorp, and the Count de Nassau Weilburgh, General of the Elector Palatine's Forces, is come with him to wait upon His Majesty. The Earl of Macclesfield, is arrived here from the Court of Hanover, and the Duke of Cell, with the Electoral Prince of Hanover, are expected this night at Deventer, and will be here tomorrow morning; when the Bishop of Osnabrug intends to take his Leave of His Majesty, in order to his return home. Count Frise, who commanded His Majesty's Forces on the Rhine during the late War, and is now a Lieutenant-General in the Emperor's Service, is come hither from Prince Lewis of Baden to wait upon his Majesty.

Hague, Sept. 16. Count Wratislaw, the Emperor's Envoy to His Majesty of Great Britain, has notified the Foreign Ministers here, the happy Success of his Master's Arms in Italy; upon which he has received their Compliments. Monsieur Bondeli, Envoy from the King of Prussia, is recalled, and Monsieur Schmettau is appointed to reside here in that Quality in his room.

Paris, Sept. 17. N. S. The late King James fell into a Lethargy on the 14th Instant, and was thought to be dead; he continued in the same till yesterday, and died between Three and Four that Afternoon. Letters from the French Army in Italy of the Eighth Instant say, they were retired between Vrago and Castrazato. The French themselves confess they lost 300 Officers and 3000 Soldiers in the late Action at Chiari, and that the Loss of the Germans does not amount to above 100 Men. It was said Prince Eugene intended to pass the Oglio. A great number of Country People had declared for the Emperor, and had taken Possession of Musso, a Castle seated upon a Hill, where they were fortifying themselves. The Count de Chateauneaut is sailed from Brest, in order, as 'tis said, to join Count d'Estree's Squadron at Cadix. An Edict is published here, whereby the Importation of most of the Commodities of the Growth or Manufacture of England, Scotland, Ireland, and the Countries depending thereon, is absolutely Prohibited, and the Duties upon others are considerably Augmented.

Biale, Sept. 9. The King William Galley from Scanderoon, the Leoners from New England, and the Amity from Virginia, are arrived in the Downes.

Whereas the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in former Years past, have been persuaded to grant Deputations, commonly call'd, [No Purchase no Pay.] for seizing Unlawful and Prohibited Goods to certain Persons, who being in no settled Employment, have nevertheless pretended, if they had such Authority, to be Serviceable to Trade; and the Revenue; but it being justly suspected, That

such Commissions have sometimes served to cover Irregular Practices, and have frequently been made use of to the Vexation and Disturbance of Fair Trade, but very seldom with any Advantage to the Revenue: The Commissioners have thought fit, to Revoke all such Deputations granted to any Person not having some settled Employment in the Customs, and Salary from that Revenue; hereby giving notice, That if any such Deputation be not rescinded before Michaelmas next to be cancelled, the Commissioners will direct a Prosecution against the respective Curators of all such Persons who shall be found to be guilty hereof.
