Rome, Sept. 9. N. S.

THE Pope has resolved to raise more Forces, and has given Directions for Repairing and Augmenting the Fortifications of the Castle of St. Angelo, and for casting divers Pieces of Cannon, and providing the Magazines with Ammunition. Letters from Sicily say, the Duke of Escalona, the Vice-Roy of that Kingdom, is arrived at Palermo.

From the Imperial Camp near Ponte Oglio, Sept. 15. The 12th Instant, the Major of the Regiment of Commari went out with a Party of 150 Horse on the other side the Oglio, and brought back some Prisoners, and a Booty of Horses and Mules; and another Party came in likewise with several Prisoners. About 10 at night, Count Leiningen passed over the Oglio with a Detachment of Horse. The 13th, he returned to the Camp with some Prisoners, about 40 Horses, 5 or 6 Mules, and 12 Wagons laden with Wine and other Provisions which he had taken from the Enemy; and he brought an Account, that the Prince of Vaudmont was gone back to Milan; The same day, 15 Deserters came over to us. The 14th, before break of day, a Party of the Enemy came with a Design to surprize our advanced Guards; but upon a false Alarm given them by the Country People, they retired in such Confusion, that divers mistook their way, and came into our Camp, and were taken Prisoners. About 10 at night, Major-General Vaubonne, and the Sieur Roussinone Colonel of Dragoons, went out with a Party of 400 Horse towards Ponte Vecchio, to meet the Regiment of Dragoons of Vaubonne, and the Regiment of Hussars commanded by Colonel Paul Diack, lately arrived in these Parts from Germany, which were marching to our Camp. A Lieutenant-Colonel, with a Party of 200 Horse, advanced towards the Enemy's Right Wing to observe them, and several Parties of Horse and Foot were sent to make Excursions on the other side the Oglio. Divers Deserters came over to us, and our Parties brought in some Prisoners. The 15th, by break of day, a Major, who was sent out the day before with a Party of Horse, returned to our Camp, and gave an Account, that while he was abroad, a Body of 2000 French who were going to fetch in a great Carroy of Provisions passed within 100 Paces of him, but he and his Party marched away undisturbed, and afterwards fell upon the Enemy's Foragers, killed about 50, and took 22 Prisoners. Another Party of 24 Horse killed 30 of the Enemy's Foragers, and brought away 13 Horses. An Officer came from Major-General Vaubonne, and gave an Account, that he was marched to Oglio, with the Regiments of Vaubonne and Diack, and the Party they went out with him. Advice came, that the Enemy had sent out a Detachment of 3 or 4000 Men towards the Mantuan, of which immediate Notice was sent to Major-General Vaubonne. In the evening, the Generals Palfi and Sars were sent on the other side the Oglio with 1500 Horse, and 400 Foot. Just now arrives a Letter from General Vaubonne, with Advice, that

he met with the French Detachment sent to the Mantuan, and defeated them, and took some Standards and Kettle-Drums; 'Tis said, above 400 of the Enemy were killed upon the spot, and that they had with them a very considerable quantity of Ammunition, which the Germans have taken.

Libou in Courland, Sept. 17. The Swedish Army continue encamped within a mile of this Place, and observe a very exact Discipline, paying for every thing that is furnished them by the Country People. The Burghers of this City have been obliged to give to the Swedish Commissaries a particular Account of all their Effects, and to declare upon Oath what they have in their hands belonging to the Saxons; and the Foreign Merchants are to do the like.

Vienna, Sept. 17. The Emperor has resolved to send a further Reinforcement of 14 or 15000 Men to Italy, and 'tis said, Orders will shortly be given for raising several new Regiments. The Sieur Vorster is gone to Croatia with a considerable Sum of Money to buy up Provisions for the Imperial Army, which are to be Shipped off at Trieste, and sent to Italy by the Gulph of Venice. The Emperor has sent Orders to Count Strattman, his Envoy at Warsaw, to use all possible Endeavours for accommodating the Differences between the Kings of Sweden and Poland. An Express was sent this week to Saxony, with Orders, as 'tis said, for the Danish Forces lately put into the Emperor's Service to march forthwith to Hungary.

Frankfort, Sept. 25. Count Schlick arrived here lately from Vienna, and intends in a day or two to go to the Court of the Elector of Mentz. Baron Wierzer, Chancellor to the Elector Palatine, came hither the 22d Instant from Offenburgh, where he has been to confer with Prince Lewis of Baden; He had a long Conference here with Count Schlick, and continued his Journey the next day to Dusseldorp. The Forces of the Circle of the Upper Rhine are shortly to return to their Quarters, and the Diet of the said Circle will meet in few days to consider of making new Levies.

Cologne, Sept. 27. The Elector Palatine came yesterday to Bemburg, and will go in a day or two to Mulheim, to review his Forces encamped near that Place; Count Nassau Weaburgh, General of his Electoral Highness's Troops, is shortly expected there. Several new Works are adding to the Fortifications of this Place, which are in good forwardness. The Deputies sent by the Chapter of Cologne to the Diet at Bonn are returned hither.

Hamburgh, Sept. 27. The Danish Forces which are to be sent to Holland will embark this week. Letters from Copenhagen say, the Queen-Dowager of Denmark arrived there the 23d Instant, having been met at Amack by the King, the Queen, and the rest of the Royal Family. The Muscovite Ambassador there intends shortly to take his leave, having Orders to go with the same Character to the Court of Prussia. Breda, Sept. 30. On *Wednesday* left the King came from *Loe* to *Nimeguen*, where he reviewed a Body of *Dutch* Horse, consisting of about 30 Squadrons, that are encamped near that Place. From thence His Majesty came yesterday in the evening to *Breda*. This morning His Majesty reviewed the 12 Battalions of *English* Foot, which are encamped about two miles from the Town, and after passing along the Line in the Front and Rear, saw each Battalion file off in single Companies, being very well satisfied with the good Condition they are in, and His Majesty has given Orders for their Decamping, and returning to their respective Garrisons. After the Review, His Majesty, with the chief Officers, was entertained at Dinner by the Earl of *Marlborough* at his Lordship's Quarters near the Camp. To-morrow His Majesty will review 16 Battalions and 30 Squadrons of the *Dutch* Troops which are encamped at *Oosterhout* near two Leagues off, and not far from the *English* Camp. And on *Monday* His Majesty intends to return to *Nimeguen* in his way to *Loe*.

Hague, Sept. 30. The Pensioner of *Holland*, and several other Persons of Quality, went from hence this day to wait upon His Majesty at *Breda*. The Earl of *Macclesfield*, who, since his return from the Court of *Hanover*, has been to wait on His Majesty at *Loe*, is expected here to-morrow, and will embark in few days for *England*. We have an Account from *Maestricht*, that a Conspiracy has been lately discovered there, which was carried on by several *French* Soldiers who came to that Place pretending to be Deserters, and listed themselves in the Service of the States-General; Of these 16 are seized, and some of them have confessed the whole Design. 'Tis very much suspected that these or other like Incendiaries set on fire the Work-house of that Place, where Bombs and other Fire-works were made, which was blown up the 26th; 3 Workmen being killed, and several wounded. The Elector of *Cologne's* Minister here has presented a Memorial to the States-General, to complain of their having caused a Fort to be built upon *St. Peter's Hill* near *Maestricht*, pretending that the Ground on which 'tis built belongs to the Bishoprick of *Liege*.

Paris, October 1. N. S. The Earl of *Manchester*, Ambassador Extraordinary from His Majesty of *Great-Britain*, has received an Express from *Loe*, with His Majesty's Orders to return forthwith to *England*, without taking any Leave of this Court. A Declaration is published here, for raising the Value of Coin in the manner following; The *Lewis d'Ors* Recoined in pursuance of the Declaration of the 8th of *June*, 1700. (which by the late Edict in that behalf were to pass at 13 *Livers*) are to go for 14 *Livers*, and the *Crowns* are raised from 3 *Livers* and 10 *Sols* to 3 *Livers* and 16 *Sols*, and other Gold and Silver Coins proportionable; The old *Lewis d'Ors* (ordered to be brought into the Mint to be Recoined) are to pass in common Payments till the last day of *October* at 13 *Livers*, and the *Crowns* at 3 *Livers* 10 *Sols* and 6 *Deniers*, and will be received at the same Rates in the Mints till the last day of *December*. And by an Act of the Council it is ordered, That those who have already carried their old Money to the Mints, and have received Bills to be repaid at 12 *Livers* and half for a *Lewis d'Or*, shall be paid at the Rate of 13 *Livers* for a *Lewis d'Or*, and other Species proportionable. The Court is still at *Fonsainbleau*, taking the Diversions of the Season. The freshest Advices from *Italy* are of the 20th past, and give an Account, that the two Armies were still in the same Camps, the *Germans* having their Right at *Palazzuolo*, and their Left at *Chiari*. The head Quarters of the *French* and *Spanish* Army is at *Vrigo*, where they have their Left Wing, their Right extending towards *Chiari*. The *Germans*

seem to have a Design to Winter in those Parts, and have made two Roads over the Mountains, (the one by the Valley of *Canonica* which lies towards the Source of the River *Oglia*, and the other by the Valley of *Anso* near the Lake of *Livy*, out of which flows the River *Chiesla*) to have a Communication with the Country of *Trent*; where they have provided great Magazines of Forage for the use of their Cavalry.

Deale, September 23. Sir *George Rooke*, with the Fleet under his Command, came last *Saturday* to an Anchor at *St. Hellens*, and sailed again the next day for the *Downes*, where he arrived yesterday.

Whitehall, Sept. 23. Notice has been given by His Majesty's Command to Monsieur *Peuffre*, the *French* Secretary here, that he should forthwith depart out of *England*.
