Venice, Sept. 23. N. S.

THE German and French Parties have frequent Rencounters, in which the former have always had the Advantage; The French in these Actions have lost a great many Men, as likewise by Sickneis and Detention; They continue to spoil and plunder the Country People, who in Revenge kill as many of them as they can meet with straggling from the Army. Our Senate meet frequently, to consider of providing for the Security of their Subjects, and have sent Orders to General Molino, to take the best care he can for their Protection. Several Gallies are sent to Dalmatia to fetch over more Venetian Forces.

Vienna, Sept. 21. Orders are sent to the Regiments of Foot of Lichtenstein and Rhyngaff of 1500 Men each, and the Regiment of Hussars of Eibergen of 1000 Men, to march with all possible expedition to Italy, to reinforce the Imperial Army. And the Emperor has resolved to augment his Forces by new Levies, and to that end the Imperial Ministers are treating with several Officers about raising new Regiments.

Frankfort, Septemb. 28. Count Schlick, who lately came hither from Vienna, went yesterday to the Court of the Elector of Mentz; and 'tis said, that after he has finished his Negotiation there, he is to proceed to Coblentz, to confer with the Elector of Triers. Prince Lewis of Baden is now at Offemburgh, and has given Directions for repairing and augmenting the Fortifications of that Place, and for making several Lines for the better Security of the Country on that side. The Forces of the Circle of the Upper Rhine, which lay near Wisbaden, are marched to Erbenheim, where they will continue some time together before they return to their Quarters. The Diet of the Circle of the Upper Rhine is to meet here in the beginning of the next Month.

Cologne, Sept. 30. The Bishop of Raab went from hence the 27th Instant to Bensberg, to confer with the Elector Palatine, and returned hither in the evening. The Sieur Valkonier, late Envoy from the States-General to the Swiss

Cantons, had Audience the same day of his Electoral Highness, and is since gone for Holland. 'Tis said, the Elector of Cologne intends shortly to call another Diet of the States of this Electorate; but 'tis doubted whether the Chapter of Cologne will send any Deputies thither. The Sieur Quentell, Coadjutor of the Bishoprick of Munster, arrived here two days ago, being sent by the Bishop of Munster to confer with the Deputies of this Chapter. The Bishop of Munster is raising 2000 Men to recruit his Foot, and has ordered Horses to be bought up for the use of his Cavalry.

Hamburg, Sept. 30. The Danish Foot, which are to be sent into the Service of the States-General, continue to assemble near Iezehoa, in order to be there reviewed by the Dutch Commissioners; after which they will march to Geluckstad and Weselsoleth, where Transport Ships are provided to carry them to Holland; The Horse have already passed the Elbe, in order to march thither through the Country of Lunenburgh. Letters from Riga of the 18th Instant say, the Saxon Garrison in the Duna-munder Fort held out still, but that the Swedes were raising several Batteries against the Place in order to Bombard it. They write from Memel of the 21st, That the Magistrates of that Place do still refuse to deliver up to the King of Sweden the Train of Artillery belonging to the Saxons, which is laid up there; That the Swedish Army was still encamped about a Mile from Libou; And that they are fortifying that Place, and making several Forts in Courland to secure their Wintering in that Country. According to the Letters from Dantzick, the Saxon Forces continue their March home by the way of Prussia.

Brussels, Octob. 4. Marshal Bonfflers arrived yesterday from Louvain, and intends to continue here this Winter. Money is extremely scarce here; and a Placart will shortly be Published, for raising the value of Coin in these Provinces, as has been done in France. The Soldiers in the Spanish Regiments in the Netherlands desert daily, and some Regiments have already lost a third part of their Men.

His Majesty and the General Officers were afterwards entertained at Dinner by Monsieur *d'Auverquerque*. The 12 Battalions of *English Foot* which lay near *Breda*, decamped from thence the same morning, in order to return to their respective Garrisons. Yesterday morning His Majesty left *Breda*, and came that night to *Nimeguen*, having in his way reviewed the Lord *Portmore's* and another Regiment of Foot of the Garrison of *Wissleduc*, which were drawn out for that purpose on the Road about two Leagues from their Garrison; And this day His Majesty came hither. During His Majesty's stay at *Breda*, Count *Wratisslaw* the Emperor's Minister, the Pensioner of *Holland*, and several other Persons of Quality, came to wait upon His Majesty from the *Hague*. The Earls of *Carisle* and *Macclesfield* have taken their Leaves of the King, and are gone for *England*.

Hague, October 4. The Earl of *Marlborough* returned to this Place last night from *Breda*, and his Excellency intends next Friday to go to *Loo*. The Count of *Bentheim Steynfort*, one of the Gentlemen of the Bed-Chamber to the Elector Palatine, came hither this week from *Dusseldorp*. They write from *Maestricht*, that the *French Soldiers*, taken up there for a Design to destroy the Magazines of that Place, have confessed several Particulars of this Conspiracy, by which it appears that the same was contrived ever since *April* last, and that there are more Persons concerned therein than was thought at first.

Paris, October 5. N.S. A Courier arrived at *Fontainbleau* the first Instant from *Italy*, and brought an Account of a considerable Defeat given to a Detachment of *French Troops*, consisting of the Regiment of *Brie* and another of *Savoy*, who were sent out under the Command of the Marquis of *Roquepine* to attack the *German Foragers*; They met with a Party of 600 *Imperial Horse*; the latter after a little Skirmishing retired, as they seemed, in great disorder, and drew the *French* into an Ambush they had laid for that purpose, where the *Germans* fell upon them, and cut off most of them; Monsieur *Roquepine* and several other Officers were killed; and the Loss of the *French* is computed at 1000 Men. This Action happened the 24th of the last Month. The *French* are very much dissatisfied with the *Venetians* for their Partiality to the *Germans*; and for that reason the *French Officers* connive at all the Disorders their Soldiers commit in the Territories of the Republick of *Venice*; They have lately plundered some Lands belonging to Cardinal *Delphino* Bishop of *Brescia*. 'Tis said, the Duke of *Savoy* will return to *Turin*

about the end of this Month. The *French Court* is still at *Fontainbleau*.

Dublin, Sept. 18. The Earl of *Rochester*, Lord Lieutenant of *Ireland*, embarked at *Helyers Bay* about 7 a Clock, and arrived in *London* about 10 this morning. His Excellency was received at the Water side by all the Persons of Quality in Town, and was saluted with a Discharge of 3 Batteries of Cannon, besides those of the Castle, and the Soldiers of our Garrison being under their Arms; And his Excellency was complimented upon his arrival by the Lord Mayor and Aldermen, the University, and the Dissenting Clergy.
