Penniss, June 14.

THis last week arrived three Ships of this Port from Barbados.

Yesterday put to sea the *Enderwilt*, laden with French Wines and Salt bound for New-England, and the day before a ship of this place from Virginia laden with Tobacco sailed hence for Holland.

Portsmouth, June 17. On Tuesday last his Excellency the Spanish Ambassadour embarked himself upon the *Portland* Frigate, and put to sea with a fair wind intending for Spain, but the same night the wind changing, forced him back into this place where he arrived yesterday in the afternoon he has now resolved to pass over Land to Plymouth, where the ship is to meet him for his transportation.

The *Coffin* *Warwick* with the ships under her Conduct are put to sea.

Warsaw June 7. This last week has been spent in several debates without any considerable resolution, till yesterday the 6th instant the Equestrian Order went to attend the house of Senators, to know their resolution about the Exclusion of the Prince of Conde; where their Marshall of the said Order in the name of the whole body proposed the Question to the Senators, to whom the Arch Bishop of Gnesne as speaker of the house of Senators answered, That every person had a free vote in the Election, and might propose whom he pleased to succeed to the Crown, and as to his own particular he should neither exclude the Prince of Conde nor any other: whereupon the whole body of the Equestrian Order began to cry out, Kill him, kill him? He is a Traytor: He has taken money, and would have more! But the Bishop of Cracovy appeald the house, by crying aloud, Let Conde be Excluded; all the rest of the Bishops following him in the same Vote, only the Bishop of Varmia endeavouring to speak somewhat in favour of the Prince of Conde; the Nobles againe rose up in great fury, and took up their seats to throw at him, crying out, He is also a Traytor, kill him unless he votes with the rest, which the Bishop seeing answered, I say then by force let him be Excluded: all the Palatines and Senators following in the same Vote of Exclusion one after another.

Whilst they were thus voting, the Grand Marshal rose from his seat, and began to conier with 4 or 5 Senators, well-wishers to the Prince of Conde, which being observed by the Nobles, they cryed out, This is no time for Cabals, your friends the French are too far off from assisting you, our Brethren and Friends are nigh and able to act over the Sicilian Vespers, and if you refuse to vote with us, we shall cut you to pieces immediately; so that the Grand Marshal gave his Vote for the exclusion, as did also at the last the Archbishop of Gnesne.

The 5th instant the Popes Nuncio came to his Audience with extraordinary magnificence; this day the Emperours Ambassadour is likewise to have his Audience, and the next day is designed for the French Ambassadour.

An Ambassadour from *Valachia* being on his way hithers, was about 4 days journey distant from this place set upon by Thieves and killed with all his people.

Cologne, June 7. The differences between the Elector and this City are not yet determined, both parties being equally dissatisfied, and as yet resolved not to abate any thing of what they demand.

The Elector continues still a Garrison of 1200 men at *St. Fruyen*, and is endeavouring to find out the Anchors and

Ring-leaders of the late sedition, and to proceed against them according to Justice, and in the mean time is building a strong Citadel there, the better to provide for the quiet of that place for the future.

The Duke of Lorraine has taken Order for the reinforcement of his Garrisons upon the Rhine; and particularly that of *Hombourg*; that they may be in a posture of defence in case the Negotiation between the Commissioners about the differences with the Prince Elector Palatine, meets not with that peaceable issue which is desired; the said Duke sees us willing to give *Hombourg* and *Landstbu* to the said Elector upon the payment of a considerable summe of Monneys; but as concerning the pretensions to *Sarwerden* and *Herbiheim*, he is resolved not to submit them to be treated for by the States of the Empire, or to refer them to any arbitration.

A party of the French forces having some days since entered into the Territories of *Nomenie* in *Lorraine*, and driven thence some numbers of Cattle, upon complaint made Orders have been since given for restitution. The French Troops which were sent towards the three Bishopricks, are countermanded and ordered to take up their Quarters; part of them in *Luxembourg*, and the rest in *Burgundy* upon the borders of *France*.

The sieur de *Rissan-court* is lately sent away for *Vienna* by the Duke of *Lorraine*, about the affairs of the young Prince, which are generally said to be in a good posture as to the Election in *Poland*; in confidence whereof 'tis said the Emperour has written to the Duke of *Lorraine* to congratulate the great hopes of his success.

Toulon, June 11. The Cardinal de *Vendosme* having put out to sea with the Fleet designed for *Candia*, and accompanied the Duke de *sea fort* for about 6 Leagues on board the new great ship, called the *Grand Monarch*, is lately returned upon a Bark, and has taken his way by *Aix* on his return for *Paris*; the wind having much favour'd the Fleet since their putting out to sea, 'tis hoped they may ere this have gain'd as far as *Malta*.

The Sieur de *Larson* is lately arrived at *Marseilles* with 3 Merchants ships and a Polack under his Convooy from *Smirna* and is daily expected here to rest and take in fresh victuals, an afterwards to return to his charge for the security of our Merchants in their Trade to the *Levant*. By him we are assured that the Chevalier de *Almeras* was sail'd with the 3 men of war under his Command to *Volos* in *Thezaly*, where he is to take in an Ambassadour sent by the Grand Seigneur to his most Christian Majesty.

The 8th instant, the Kings Letters Patents were Registered in the Parliament, or *Provyence* for the establishment of a Royal Academy in the City of *Arles*, consisting of 20 Gentlemen; all of them Natives and Inhabitants of the said City, who are to enjoy the same priviledges with the Academy at *Paris*; their principal design aiming at the restoring that Province to its purity of Languages, which has been much corrupted by the mixture of words taken from the neighbouring Nations.

Kenig, June 15. Our last advices from *Candia* inform us, that the Grand Visier had a Council of War in his own Tent, near the River *Giostra*; where he had a long conference with the Principall Officers of his Army, concerning the present condition of their affairs, and at the last resolv'd to try their utmost force against the Town, and if possible to oblige it to a surrender before the arrival of the Christian succors, for which purpose they made choice of the ablest and stoutest soldiers in the Army, amongst

amongst whom they distributed large summes of Money to encourage them to the work, and on the 10th of May about two hours before day about 10 thousand of them began to fall upon the Town, and with great cries fell desperately upon the Bulwarks of *Saint Pierre* and *St. Andre*, coming on with great confidence of success; but the besieged who are always intent upon every motion of the Enemy, received them with extraordinary courage at the breaches, and in both places sprang several Mines which they had before prepared for them to their great loss of men and courage, insomuch as after above three hours sharp dispute they were forced to retire, leaving behind them several of their scaling Ladders, having besides great numbers of men lost 3 Batts and several other Officers of great esteem.

We are farther advised that the Captain General of our Fleet having Intelligence that 18 Barbary men of War entered into the service of the Grand Seigneur for this summer, were put out from several parts of *Alexandria*, *Smirna*, and *Sorbia* laden with Men and Ammunition, and bound for *Cahes*. had divided 24 men of war under his command into three squadrons, with Orders to find out and engage the Enemy, himself with 10 ships sailing to the Eastwards of the Isle of *Candia*, where he found them making for *Cahes*, whom though so much superior to him in number, he immediately engaged, where for some time was maintained a sharp dispute, the Enemy making up in number what they wanted in courage, and had already worked two of the Generals squadrons but the noise of the fight bringing in another Squadron of 8 of our ships to their relief, the Turks were in little time worked six of them sunk by our Cannon, four taken, and the other eight flying, were for some time pursued, much torn and disordered, and many of their men killed; in this engagement were made prisoners about 800 Turks.

Hague, June 24. On Saturday last His Highness the Prince of *Tuscany* departed from this place and lay that night at *Leyde*, and went the next day to *Harlem*, intending on Monday to pass from thence into the North of *Holland* on his way to *Friesland*.

Yesterday arrived here a Courier in 10 days from *Florence* with dispatches for the Prince, whom he intends to find at *Atomar*. The States have sent to the Officers of all places by which the said Prince is to pass, to receive and entertain him with all possible honour and respect; during his Highness's stay here, he was pleased to return a visit to the French Ambassador, and is believed may now be persuaded to visit *France* on his return for *Italy*.

The Duchess of *Friesland* is lately arrived here, and lodged at the house of the Princess Dowager, who also in few days expects the arrival of her other Daughter the Duchess of *Simmeren*.

From *Manila* we are informed, that the Bishop of that place does not raise any new forces as was reported, but gives entertainment to all Officers which proffer him their service, and has put Arms into the hands of all his Subjects.

The States have ordered 8 Companies of Foot to march to *Bortang* upon the frontiers of *Westphalia*, and is believed the Army will be suddenly drawn together and exercised.

We are even now informed of the safe arrival upon our Coasts of 13 ships from the *East-Indies*, which came from *Batavia* in December last, whereof 2 or 3 are already entered the *Texel*, the Company have already given order to receive and discharge them; besides these, we daily expect the news of 3 others from *Ceylon*, and 2 more from *Batavia* which put out in *February* last.

Paris June 26. On Saturday the 22 instant *Le Roux* *Marsilli* having before disembred himself and in great danger of his life, was sentenced by the Lieutenaut Criminal, to be broken alive upon the Wheele, as guilty of high Treason against his Majesty, and was the same day removed from the *Bastille* to the *Chastelet*, before the door whereof he was ordered to suffer, and was accordingly there executed the next day, and afterwards dragged through

the City at a Cart-tail; before and at his death he denied that he had any design or attempting any thing upon the Kings life, shewed much constancy to his Religion.

A Vessel lately arriving at *Marseille* from the *Levant* informs us that the Grand Seigneur had countermanded the Ambassador designed to have been sent aboard our ship, and ordered an Embargo upon the ship which attended for the transportation of our Ambassador the *Sieur de la Haye*; farther adding that the Visier being resolved to do his utmost endeavour for the taking in of *Candia* before the arrival of our succors, had given seven several assaults to it, in which he had lost many men and Officers of note, but had at last made himself master of a Post which much annoyed the *Fort. Andre* to the great disadvantage of the Town.

His Majesty has lately dispatched away a Courier to *Toulon*, where he is ordered to Embark himself upon the first Vessel, and to overtake the Fleet, with a packet to the Duke de *Navailles* General of the Land forces in that Expedition.

From *Switzerland* we are informed that the Deputies from the several Cantons were arrived at the *Diet* in *Baden*, where they appear much concerned at the procedure of the *Sieur Menville* the French Resident, in treating with the four lesser Cantons, and advancing Moneys to them without any conclusion first had with the rest of the Cantons.

From the coast of *Ricardy* we are told, that our Merchants seem much dissatisfied to find that the liberty given by His Majesty for the free transportation of their Corn, has not been so beneficial to them as they expected; several of their ships having been lately in *England* to vent their Grains, but finding a prohibition on foot against the importation of Corn, were forced to return with the loss of their voyage.

Deal, June 18. Yesterday and this day sailed from the Downs about 43 Merchant ships with a fair wind outwards bound for several parts.
