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Whitehall, October 16.

A Very Loyal and Dutiful Address to His Majesty from the City of Bristol; And a like Address from the Town of Portsmouth; were presented this day to their Excellencies the Lords Justices.

Which Addresses follow.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty. The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty, of Your City of Bristol, in Common Council assembled.

It is our Duty, Great Sir, with the rest of Your Loyal Subjects, to express our utmost Detestation of the French King's Vanity in styling, and his Violation of Public Faith and Treaty in acknowledging, the pretended Prince of Wales King of England, Scotland, and Ireland; to which Your Majesty has the only Just and Lawful Title: This must be intended to Subvert our Constitution, the great Security of our Religion and Liberties.

The many Dangers to which You have often exposed Your Royal Person, Your Care of the Protestant Religion, and the Happy Effects of Your Majesty's Government amongst us, have left on our Minds so deep and lasting Impressions, that having always adhered to Your Majesty's Interest; we shall continue our Zeal and Dutiful Affection to Your Majesty's Person, Opposing to the worst of our Power and Abilities any Pretender to the Rights of Your Crown and Dignity; and praying, That Your Majesty may Reign long and prosperously over these Kingdoms.

To the KING's most Excellent Majesty. The Humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgeses, of Your Majesty's ancient Corporation of Portsmouth.

May it please Your Majesty, As we esteem our selves obliged to Your Majesty in Duty, as our Prince, for the many Blessings we enjoy under Your Majesty; so we hold our selves bound, to Resent the Transcendent Indignity offered to Your most Sacred Person by the French King, in declaring the pretended Prince of Wales King of England, Scotland, and Ireland: We therefore, Your Majesty's most Loyal Subjects, do heartily, sincerely, and solemnly assure Your Majesty, That we will at all times use our utmost Endeavours (and Contribute as much as in us lies) to Preserve Your Majesty's Royal Person and Government against all Invaders of the same.

Naples, October 4. N.S. The late Disturbances in this City are quiered. About 150 of the Persons concerned therein have been seized, and of them two of the Nobility, Don Carlo Sargro and Don Sieseppe Cappucci, have been beheaded, and 8 of the other Prisoners hanged. The first of these was formerly a Colonel in the Emperor's Army, and had been 17 years in his Service, and is generally lamented. The Baron of Scharjone, who was taken the 25th Feb in the Monastery of St Lawrence. is a sick Prisoner in

the Castle; he was Secretary to Count Lichtenstein, formerly Ambassador from the Emperor at the Court of Rome; The Imperial Ambassador now there has writ to the Viceroy of Naples in his behalf, and 'tis believed that being a Stranger he will be treated only as a Prisoner of War. Divers of the Nobility are retired to their Country Houses, and the People in general continue to shew a great aversion to the French.

Rome, October 8. The Pope, upon the Advice of the late Rising at Naples, and the Discontents that appear in that Kingdom, has resolved to raise some more Troops, which 'tis said are to be employed for the Security of the Ecclesiastical State on that side. He continues his Resolution to send three Extraordinary Nuncios to the Emperor, France, and Spain. The new Roman Calendar not being exactly calculated according to the Course of the Sun, the Pope has appointed a Congregation, consisting of Cardinal Norris and two other Cardinals and three able Mathematicians, to mend the same.

Venice, October 14. The two Armies are still in the same Camps; but the great Rains which have fallen ever since the 2d Instant do very much incommode them. The last week 500 French in covered Boats came from Ostiglia, and surpris'd a Place called Canarzero, where the Germans had a good quantity of Corn guarded only by a Commissary and 12 Men, which they destroyed, notwithstanding a Conveniency to carry it off. An Express is come from Brescia with Advice of the 11th Instant, that 2000 German Horse commanded by General Vanborne, march'd towards Bransche and surpris'd 1000 French Troopers, who were all on foot, their Horses being a Grazing; and that the Germans killed 800 of the French, and brought away all the Horses. Signior Duodo, Ambassador from this State to the Court of Spain, intends to begin his Journey thither the next week. They write from Naples, that Don Carlo Sargro, one of the principal Persons concerned in the late Rising there was beheaded, who before he was executed cried out 3 times, Long live the Emperor; and several other Persons were hanged; 'Tis said, the Baron of Scharjone, and the Writings taken with him, will be sent to Madrid. Several of the Neapolitan Noblemen, who are suspected to have had part in this Affair, are retired to Benevento, And the Duke of Castro, who has been at Rome to confer with the Emperor's Ambassador, is returned to the Kingdom of Naples, which is in a great Convulsion. The Gallies of Turky are arriv'd at Naples, and two Gallies of the Squadron of Sicily are sent to Genoa for the Security of that Place.

Vienna, Octob. 12. A Courier arriv'd here 2 days ago from the Imperial Camp in Italy, Being sent by Prince Eugene; with some intercepted Letters from Marshal Villeroi to the French King, which give a great Light into the Design of the French in Italy. The Bishop of Wurzburg has put into the Emperor's Service 2 Regiments of Foot of 1600 Effective Men each, and they were to begin their March yesterday to the Emperor's Hereditary Countries. The Baron of Jessen, Envoy of Denmark, has had Audience of Leave of the Emperor, and is upon his Return home.

Frankfort, October 19. Count Schlick, the Emperor's Envoy Extraordinary, returned hither from Mainz some days ago, very well satisfied with the Success of his Negotiation at that Court; and is since gone to Coblenz to confer with the Elector of Trier. The Deputies of the Circle of the Upper Rhine are come hither, in order to hold a Diet. The Elector Palatine's Forces which were quartered at Heidelberg and Mannheim are march'd to Neustad, as are likewise those of the Circle of the Upper Rhine which were encamp'd near Ebernheim, and 'tis said these Forces are to be employed in making a Line from Germersheim to Neustad; and
