May it please Your Majesty,

WE are very sensible how much we are in Gratitude, as well as by our Allegiance, obliged to Resent that great Iniquity and Injustice offered to Your most Sacred Majesty by the French King, in giving and allowing the Title of King of England, Scotland, and Ireland, to the Pretended Prince of Wales, contrary to Your Majesty's most just and Legal Title, and to the several Laws for the settling the Succession in the Protestant Line: By this it is demonstrable the French King designs, as far as he is capable, to endeavour the Dethroning Your Majesty, and to extirpate the Protestant Religion out of these Your Majesty's Dominions, and to Subvert our Liberties and Properties, for the Protecting and Preserving of which Your Majesty has shown the greatest Zeal, by the frequent hazarding of Your most Precious and Invaluable Life.

Wherefore, Your Majesty's most Faithful and Obedient Subjects, beg Leave to assure Your Majesty, That we will at all times Sincerely and Unanimously serve You, and exert the utmost of our Power and Abilities for the Preservation of Your Majesty's Person and Government, against all Invaders and Pretenders whatsoever.

Great Sir,

SINCE the French King (the Constant Disturber of the Peace of Europe) has so highly Affronted Your Majesty and the English Nation, in Owning and Declaring the Pretended Prince of Wales King of England, Scotland, and Ireland, we Your Majesty's most Loyal and Dutiful Subjects, think our selves bound upon this Occasion to assure Your Majesty, That we do Acknowledge Your Sacred Majesty to be our Only Rightful and Lawful King. And we do sincerely assure Your Majesty, That we will Heartily and Vigorously Stand by Your Majesty with our Lives and Fortunes, in asserting Your Undoubted Right and Title to these Your Kingdoms, against the Pretended Prince of Wales, and all his Adherents whatsoever; and for the Preservation of Your Majesty's Most Sacred Person, whom God Almighty Preserve, and grant a Long and Happy Reign over us.

Rome, October 15. N.S. The Marquis del Vasto a Neapolitan, who is said to have furnished the Imperialists with a great quantity of Corn, is come hither from Ancona, and has been to wait upon the Pope; The Spanish Ambassador here endeavoured to persuade him to return to Naples, but he does not think fit to venture himself there at this time. The Letters from thence say; the severe Proceedings against the Persons of Opahey accused of being concerned in the late Rising, have very much increased the general Discontent and particularly the Nobility are much dissatisfied at the publick Beheading of Don Carlo Sangre, who was related to Cardinal Gualtero, Archbishop of Naples, and to divers other Nobles, who interceded for him, and desired the Pope to take pity upon the Sentence against him; His Holiness has heard from Madrid, or at least that he might be succeeded privately. The News

Roy seems very apprehensive of new Disturbances, and that he is not safe in his Person; for which reason he has doubled the Garrison of the Castle; and does not himself stir out of the Palace, and all Persons are obliged to put off their Swords before they are admitted to come to him. The French and Spanish Ministers here have pressed the Pope several times to grant the Investiture of the Kingdom of Naples to the King of Spain; representing to him that it might be a Means of restoring the Peace in that Kingdom; but he replied, That he apprehended the contrary, and that he could not come to any Determination in this Matter, till the Congregation appointed for that purpose has fully examined it; They also desired that several Neapolitans, who retired to Benevento, might be delivered to the Spanish Officers, in order to their being carried back to Naples; which the Pope refused; but ordered Notice to be given to the said Persons to retire from thence in six Hours, as they all did, except the Prince of Castellania, who staying beyond that time, was seized by order of Cardinal Orini, Archbishop of that Place; which was done without any particular Direction from the Pope, and 'tis not yet known how he will like it; For being informed that the Duke della Rocca, a Noble Neapolitan, who is in the Emperor's Interest, was lately taken by Force out of a Church at Sorra, where he had taken Refuge; He has sent Orders to his Nuncio at Naples, to complain to the Viceroy of this Violation of the Ecclesiastick Privileges, and to demand, that the said Duke may be brought back to the said Church, and enjoy the Protection he ought to have had there.

From the Imperial Camp near Ponte Oglio, October 20.
 The 14th Instant, three of our Parties returned to the Camp, and brought with them a Booty of 24 Oxen, and 13 Horses, and Mules. The 15th, we made a general forage on the other side the Oglio. One of our Parties, consisting of 60 Horses, fell in with the Enemy's Foragers, of whom they killed about 20, and took 24 Horses; And meeting afterwards with a Body of French Horse and Foot that guarded the said Foragers, the Germans fought their way through them, with the loss of a Cornet and 3 Troopers. Another Cornet went out with 30 Dragoons, and killed 10 of the Enemy's Foragers, and took 6 Horses, and was likewise obliged to make his way through the Enemy's Guard, but lost only one Man. The 16th, in the evening, Prince Charles of Vaudemont and General Palm were sent out with 1300 Horse and 200 Grenadiers, to fall upon one of the Enemy's Convoys that was expected from Lodi. In the evening we received an Account from Castiglione, that the Enemy's Forces which lay at Goito were marched from thence to rejoin their Army, and that in all appearance they would abandon that Place. The 17th, several of our Parties which were abroad, returned to our Camp with a few Prisoners. In the night, Prince Vaudemont sent hisher a Spanish Commissary, with 2000 servants, who he took at Caravazio. General Vaubonne sent an Account, that not meeting with any of the Enemy on the other side the Oglio, he repassed that River, and made an Excursion towards Soncino, where the French have a great Magazine of Provisions, and brought away 150 Mules and Oxen. The 18th, one of our Parties met a small French Party of about 30 Men, who were conducting several Loads of Hay to their Camp, took them all Prisoners, and brought away the Hay. The Enemy Foraged on this side the Oglio, and we received an Account, that General Vaubonne's Detachment had been Engaged with them; but we have not yet the Particulars. In the night, Prince Charles of Vaudemont, with the Detachment under his Command, returned to the Camp, not having met with the Convoy he looked for. The 19th, a Captain of Colonel Paul Diack's Hussars advancing alone too near the Enemy's Camp, was taken Prisoner. The Enemy are making some Intrenchments towards their Left Wing. The 20th, no Parties were sent out, because our Foragers came in last night very late, so that nothing considerable happened. We have not yet any further Account from the Body commanded by General Vaubonne, and we suppose he is lying in wait for the Enemy's Foragers, or for some of their Convoys. The French are in great want of Forage and Provisions, and suffer very much from the Weather, so that 'tis not doubted but they will shortly be obliged to decamp, in expectation of which we observe them very narrowly.

Viterbo, October 18. The Queen of the Romans was this day delivered of 2 Princesses. The Officers who are to make new Levies for the Emperor's Service, have received Money for that purpose, and have accordingly begun the same; And Directions are given for raising 1200 Hussars, to be added to the Regiment commanded by Colonel Paul Diack. The Emperor having received an Account, that his Minister at Naples has been very ill treated there, the Spanish Ambassador here, who was upon his departure, has been obliged to give his Parole, not to proceed on his Journey without the Emperor's Leave.

Hague, Nov. 21 N.S. The King was present yesterday in the Assembly of the States of Holland and Westfrisia, and in that of the States-General, where the State of the War for the next Year was laid before His Majesty, and settled, and in the Evening His Majesty gave a private Audience to Signior Aluizio Mocenigo, Ambassador from Venice. The Wind coming about yesterday to the Eastward, His Majesty intended to have embarked this day, and every thing was in a readiness for that purpose; Rear-Admiral Fairborne being ordered with the Men of War to sail out of the Gorge, and the Yachts to fall down into the Firths; but this Morning the Wind changed to the S.W. The Danish Forces are arrived in the Country of Overyssel, except part of the Horse, which are hourly expected. Eight Dutch Regiments of Foot, and 12 Squadrons of Horse and Dragoons, have begun their March from Nimeguen, and other Towns in Geiderland, towards the Electors of Cologne. Letters from the Swedish Camp in Courland of the 17th past, say, the Swedish Envoy had Publick Audience that day of the King of Sweden. They write from Riga of the 20th, that the Dunamunde Fort held out still.

London, October 29. This Day Sir William Gore, Elected Lord-Mayor for the Year ensuing, accompanied by the late Lord-Mayor, the Recorder, Aldermen, and Sheriffs, in their Scarlet Gowns, went on Horseback to the Water-side, the Sword and Mace being carried before them, and the City Officers attending on Foot. From thence they proceeded in the City Barge, attended by the several Companies in their respective Barges, adorned with streamers and Pendants, to Westminster, where the new Lord-Mayor took the usual Oaths before the Barons of the Exchequer. After which they did in like manner return by Water to Black-Friers stairs; and from thence proceeded on Horseback with the usual Solemnity to the Guildhall; where a Magnificent Entertainment was provided, at which were present the Great Officers of State, many of the Nobility, Lords of the Privy-Council, the Judges, and other Persons of Quality.
