Falmouth, June 17.

**T**He 14th instant arrived here the Honours Adventure of London from the Barbadoes, informing that several French Men of War appear in those Seas; but have not attempted upon any place. The 16th came in here the John of Dartmouth from Crossick with Salt, intending to put to Sea again with the first fair winds, the Market here not encouraging him to unlade.

Hull, June 18. This week failed hence 100000 of this place laden with Cloth for Danzig, one for Amsterdam, and two for Dort, and several Vessels for Norway and the Coasts.

Weymouth, June 19. Several ships of London and other Ports, which have been sometime detained here by contrary winds, are lately put to Sea for Newfoundland with whom sailed three ships of this Port for the same place. The 18th instant arrived here the Paradise of London in four weeks from Virginia.

Naples, June 4. The Vice-Roy having been informed that the Popes General Don Vincenzo Rospigliosi was with the Gallies under his Command, by contrary winds obliged to make some stay in the seas of Nisita near Portugal. sent immediately to complement him and present him a quantity of fresh Provisions, as did also the Popes Nuncio the Cardinal Archbishop and Prince de Castel a Mart. His Excellency presented him likewise with 70 Slaves for the service of his Gallies, and has offered to raise 60000 foot, which shall be in readiness if occasion require it to reinforce the Army designed for that Expedition.

From Otranto we are advised, that between that City and Gallipoli the Christians had lately taken two Turkish prizes, and made above 80 prisoners.

By the way of Malta we had Letters from Candia of April 22. assuring us, that the whole force of the Vicer at that time before the Town exceeded not 20000 men, and these ingreat want of provisions, and that the Garrison consisted of 12000 stout soldiers, and had great abundance of all Necessaries. They farther advise us, that the Squadron of the Maltese Gallies were at Messina, waiting for News of the appearance of the rest of the sycors wherewith they were to joyn.

Rome, June 8. On Monday morning last the Colledge of Cardinals went to a solemn Mass in the Church of Santa Maria d' Araceli in celebration of a new Holiday in honour of the new admitted St. Pietro d' Alcantara, and for the greater solemnity thereof, the Pope was pleased on horseback after dinner to visit the same Church in much state attended by the Princes and Nobility, and was received at the door by Cardinal Chigi.

The next morning the Pope held a private Consistory in the Quirinal, where he gave Audience to several of the Cardinals for the disposal of several vacant Bishopricks, and Ecclesiastical dignities, and amongst others, of the so long vacant Bishopricks in Portugal.

The same day arrived here a Courier from Thoulon with the certain advice of the departure of the French Fleet on their intended expedition for the succouring of Candia, which is hoped may in few days joyn with the rest of the Auxiliary forces at the appointed Rendezvous at Cerigo; our last advice from Naples assuring us, that the General Vincenzo Rospigliosi had touched there with the Popes Squadron of Gallies, and was put again to sea in pursuance of his voyage.

The same evening the Popes dispatch away a Courier

with all diligence for Poland with Letters to Monseigneur Marischotti his Nuncio about several affairs of importance in reference to the Election.

The Pope continue his resentment of what lately passed in Genoua as to the dismissal of his Inquisitor-General; and has ordered an exhortatory Brief to be given to the Genoua Resident to be forthwith sent to the Senate, requiring them within 30 days after the receipt thereof, to readmit him to the same power and charge as before, under pain of Excommunication.

Stockholm, June 11. The Chiaux from Tartary is departed hence on his return homewards, but it has not been thought necessary as yet to dispatch thither in his company the Sieur Lillivande, only one Officer being sent with him, to treat and conclude for the ransome of such Swedes as can be found to be prisoners amongst them.

His Excellency the Earl of Carlisle is yet incognito, but is this day intending to go from hence to a place called the Dead sea, to make his Compliments to their Majesties who are there for the present diverting themselves.

Madrid, June 12. It is now confidently reported that all things are at the last fully concluded between the Queen Regent and Don Juan of Austria, on whom the Queen has conferred the Vice-Royalty of Arragon, with the Title of Vicar-General of all that which the King possesseth belonging to the Crown of Arragon, and that of Captain-General by Land and Sea, and the 4th instant gave Order to the Vice-Chancellor of the Council of Arragon, that dispatches should be made in the said Council conformable to this Resolution which hath been accordingly obeyed; and that Don Juan has written a Letter to the Queen full of Respects and acknowledgements of her favour upon the agreement, but yet still insisting upon his care for the ease of the people from their burdens. His Highness is said to be now preparing to leave Guadalaxara, intending on Monday the 17th instant to depart thence for Saragoze, the place he designs for his Residence; so that now all things are in a peaceable posture, the Queen and the whole Court seeming intirely satisfied with the good issue of this affair.

Vienna, June 16. The Count Serini, the Count de Rothal, and the Chancellour of Hungary, are returned hither from Eperies in the Upper Hungary, where the Commissioners appointed to meet there for the satisfaction of Grievances, had agreed, that the Hungarians who upon their own accounts had made the late incursion into Transylvania, should be obliged to make a Compensation for the damage sustained; and for other incursions which were made by the Imperial Garrisons, they were contented to remit the consideration thereof to His Imperial Majesty, an Envoye being to be sent from Prince Abassi, to know the Emperours resolution in this Point. The Commissioners also having assured the people of that Kingdom of His Imperial Majesties pleasure that a General Diet shall in little time be held for the better settlement of all affairs, to their full satisfaction. The Deputies of both Hungaries being ordered to repair hither, to know His Imperial Majesties further pleasure in several things which are to fall under consideration in order to the General Assembly.

Here is lately arrived a Courier from the Count Schaffgotsch, the Emperours Ambassadour in Poland, confirming to us the great probability of the good success of the Prince of Lorrain in his pretensions to the Crown of Poland, and that the Election may be finished, in three weeks.

*Colognes June 25.* Since the return of the Lieutenant-General *Steenbolwert* from the Court of the Duke of *Lorraine*, there are great hopes at the endeavors used by the Mediators for the reconciliation of all differences between his Electoral Highness Palatine and the Duke may at the last meet with a peaceable Issue, the said Duke having promised to give effectual Order to his Commissioners at *Weissenburg* to remove all obstacles on his part.

From *Switzerland* we are advised, that the Deputies of all the lesser Cantons had been received with much civility by the Count *Cassari* the Spanish Ambassador at *Lucern*, for that they had over-hastily been prevailed with to receive their Treason with *France* and to receive part of their pensions without first satisfying the intention of the rest, and much more considerable part of the Cantons by whose Deputies, especially the Isle of *Schwitz*, they have been all severally separated with this their unusual procedure in an affair of so great a concernment to the publick interest. The said Deputies having written to the French Resident at *Geneve* to let him know that they renounce all that has been done by the said Deputies. The Elector of *Neurz* has summoned the most considerable Prelates of that Chapter to appear at *Wurtzburgh*, it being as yet uncertain whether it be for the Election of a Coadjutor; which the Bishop of *Spire* seems to have some pretence, by reason of the great numbers of his friends and allies or to advise there upon several Points which are now under the consideration of the Commissioners of foreign Princes in relation to the *Witling*.

*Hague June 27.* The Rhinegraves Train is here arrived from *Marsbricht*, and himself daily expected. The Spanish Ambassador has lately given in to the States an account of all Acts and Instruments, and what yet has past of concernment between the Commissioners of both Crowns during their so long conference at *Lillt*.

Captain *Evers* has lately written hither from *Lisbonne* informing that he had received some discourteous usage from the Portugals in their River, upon pretext that some ship of theirs had met with the like roughness in *Holland* whereupon the States have ordered complaint to be made to the Portugals Ambassador residing here, and that inquiry be made what reason has been given the Portugals in any part under the said States jurisdiction for this proceeding, that so the like may be prevented for the future, and satisfaction given by the parties offending.

The Province of *Utrecht* has declared their consent for the reinforcement of our Companies, and that a general review be taken in Summer of all the Army; we daily expect likewise the resolution of the rest of the Provinces.

*Amsterdam June 28.* Here are lately arrived several of the soldiers belonging to two of our *East India* ships which are safely put into the *Texel*, laden with great quantities of *Pepper*, *Salt-peters*, *Nutmegs*, and other Commodities, we daily expect to hear news of the arrival of the rest of the Fleet.

On Monday last arrived here the Prince of *Suscunia* Train, His Highness is daily expected in person from *North-Holland*.

*Brussels June 28.* On Friday last His Excellency the Constable of *Castille* went hence for *Malines*, attended by his Guards, and has been since honourably received at *Antwerp*; from whence we may suddenly expect his return.

The Fortifications at *Dendermond* are now finished, and the place rendered as considerable for strength as any within these Provinces.

From *Dills* we are told, that our Commissioners have given in a Memorial containing their Answer to the French Pretensions upon *Conde*, the Fort *Lincque*, and *Sluces of Niraport*; which do not at all satisfy them, who still continue to demand satisfaction; threatening upon refusal to search it by the way of Arms.

This City having multiplied their Complaints against the insolencies and misbehaviors of the Spanish Soldiers here in *Caution*, the Constable fearing lest their patience long provoked might at the last break into a popular fu-

ry, ordered the Count *Marcin* to take some speedy and effectual care to provide for the peace of the City, who in order thereunto, sent for all the Captains of the Count de *Montrois* Regiment; to whom he represented the just grounds of Complaint against the disorders of the Soldiers; farther acquainting them that he had strict Order from his Excellency to take from them their Commission, if they did not speedily take care to establish a better discipline amongst their Companies.

From *France Comte* we are informed, that the Fortifications of *Dole* are much advanced and near perfection, and that the City had offered the sum of 3 or 400 thousand Florins for the re-establishment of the Parliament in that City as formerly, and that the Citadel at *Beaugrenon* was completed.

The Sieur *Maffie* is by the Prince d' *Arenberghs* permission arrived here to take care of his private affairs, intending in little time to return to the Command of his Regiment in *Burgundy*.

*Paris June 29.* Here is lately arrived a Letter from the Sieur d' *Almeras*, informing, that being with 4 ships under his Command; arrived at the Gulle of *Sabina* about the beginning of *May*, with a design of taking upon him an Ambassadour intended from the Grand Seigneur; one of his Officers lying for Orders at the Court at *Larissa*; came to him in much haste and privacy as he was at an Anchor in the Gulle called *Vold*, to let him know that the Grand Seigneur being transported with a violent passion upon the news of His Most Christian Majesties preparation for the Voyage of *Candia*, had given Order to 45 Gallies which were lying about *Negropont* to take in with them Men and Arms were in readiness; and to endeavor his to prison; whereupon the Sieur d' *Almeras* immediately by purchase to join as soon as he should see with the Duke de *Beaufort*, from whom he expects farther Orders; but that he fears that Monsieur de la *Haye* the Ambassadour is before this secured and made prisoner at *Larissa*.

A Tartane from *Smirna* arriving at *Marseilles* tells us that the Sieur d' *Almeras* was safely arrived with his 4 men of war at the Isle of *Mila* near *Candia*.

A Courier which left *Thoulon* the 22 instants tells us of a small vessel which met our Fleet in very good Order as far as *Sicily*, sailing with a fair wind for *Malta*, and is believed is ere this arrived at *Cerigo* the place of Rendezvous.

*Bristol June 19.* This week arrived here six of our Ships from *Virginia*, three from *Barbadoes* and *Neurz*; one from *Lisbonne*, and four from *Bourdeaux*, *Rochelle*, and *St. Martins*; all the ships which sailed hence this last year for *America*, are safely returned, two only being yet expected which were left out at Sea; and may be withheld from their Port by contrary winds.

*Portsmouth June 20.* This Morning the wind being fair; invited His Excellency the Spanish Ambassador to alter his resolution of going by Land to *Plymouth*; and to embark himself with his Family upon His Majesty's Ship the *Portland*; in order to his return for *Spain*.

*Landguard point June 22.* Yesterday arrived in the *Gumfleet* one of our ship with women of War and a Gallioe Hoys all of the same Company, from the Northwards; and at this morning sailing towards the River, supposed to be employed for the transportation of the Danish Ambassador.

*Gravesend June 23.* The Danish Ambassador is arrived at the Buoy of the *Nore*, and may be expected here the next Tide.
