

BOROUGH OF BRIDLINGTON.

TOWN AND COUNTRY PLANNING (GENERAL INTERIM DEVELOPMENT) ORDER, 1946.

NOTICE is hereby given that the Minister of Town and Country Planning on the 25th day of May, 1946, approved a Direction made by the Town Council under Article 5 of the Town and Country Planning (General Interim Development) Order, 1946, affecting the land coloured yellow on the plan attached thereto.

The effect of the said Direction is that the rebuilding, restoration or replacement of buildings and plant which have sustained war damage other than the restoration or replacement of plant, the carrying out of operations immediately necessary in consequence of war damage for avoiding danger to health or preventing the deterioration of any building or otherwise required for temporarily meeting the circumstances created by the damage, and the carrying out of any operations for the rebuilding, restoration or replacement of buildings which have sustained war damage, the cost of which exceeds £300 shall not be undertaken on any land included in the area coloured yellow on the said plan, without the permission of the Town Council as the Interim Development Authority.

A copy of the said Direction and of the map defining the area to which it relates, may be seen at all reasonable hours at the Town Clerk's Office, Town Hall, Bridlington.

LONDON COUNTY COUNCIL.

TOWN AND COUNTRY PLANNING (GENERAL INTERIM DEVELOPMENT) ORDER, 1946.

Direction made by the London County Council under Article 5.

NOTICE is hereby given that the London County Council has, with the consent of the Minister of Town and Country Planning, issued a Direction dated

6th May, 1946, prohibiting any development of the descriptions set out in the Schedule hereto on lands situate in the Metropolitan Boroughs of Stepney and Poplar unless permission therefor is granted on application made under the Town and Country Planning (General Interim Development) Order, 1946.

A copy of the said Direction and of a map defining the area to which it relates may be seen between the hours of 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. on weekdays, and 10 a.m. and 12 noon on Saturdays, at Room 3, The County Hall, Westminster Bridge, S.E.1, or at the Borough Engineer and Surveyor's Office, Municipal Offices, The London Fruit Exchange, Duval Street, E.1, or at Room 114, Poplar Town Hall, Bow Road, E.3.

And notice is also given that the said Direction will come into force on the 25th day of June, 1946.

THE SCHEDULE REFERRED TO.

Development prohibited unless permission is granted.

1. The rebuilding, restoration or replacement of buildings and plant which have sustained war damage, except the restoration or replacement of plant, the carrying out of operations immediately necessary in consequence of war damage for avoiding danger to health or preventing the deterioration of any building, or otherwise required for temporarily meeting the circumstances created by the damage, or the carrying out of any operations for the rebuilding, restoration or replacement of buildings which have sustained war damage, the cost of which in any of the above excepted cases does not exceed £100.

2. The carrying out of alterations to existing buildings and of operations required for the maintenance of existing buildings except the carrying out of alterations to or operations required for the maintenance of any building, the cost of which does not exceed £100, in any period of twelve months.

NOTE.—The following diseases were eradicated from Great Britain in the years indicated :— Cattle plague or rinder-pest (*pestis-bovina*), 1877; pleuro-pneumonia (*peripneumonia contagiosa bovim*), 1808; sheep pox (*variola ovium*), 1850; rabies, 1922; epizootic lymphangitis (*lymphangitis epizootica*), 1906; and glanders (including farcy) (*malleus*), 1928. Dourine (*exanthema coitale paralyticum*) has never existed in Great Britain.

No case of Fowl Pest (*pestis avium*) has been confirmed in Great Britain since the 11th January, 1937, the date as from which the disease was first notifiable. So far as is known, however, Fowl Pest has not existed in Great Britain since 1933.
