Hampden-Court, Decem. 20. The following Address from the North-Riding of the County of York, was presented to His Majesty by the Rt. Hon. the Earl of Essex.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Lord Lieutenant, Deputy Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, Militia-Officers, and other Gentlemen, Freeholders of the North-Riding of the County of York.

WE think our selves extremely happy under the Government of so Great and Wise a Prince, who has not only delivered us from the worst of Evils, but still preserves us in the Enjoyment of the greatest Blessings. We cannot therefore but appear concerned, and with the greatest Indignation protest against the Proclaiming the pretended Prince of Wales King of these Reains by the French King, who has so often Owned and Acknowledged Your Majesty's Just and Lawful Title to the Crowns of Great Britain and Ireland. It is plain there is no Faith to be kept with that Monarch; and we doubt not but that it was done with an intention to put new Life into a Party mourning for their deceased abdicated King, and lay a foundation for fresh and lasting Troubles in these Kingdoms.

We take this Opportunity, Great Sir, upon Your Return to us, to Congratulate that great Blessing, and assure Your Majesty, that we will not only defend Your Royal Person, affect and maintain Your Possession of these Imperial Reains, but will, to the utmost of our Power, support and make good the late Acts of Parliament made for continuing the descent of the Crown in the Protestant Line.

The following Address from the Borough of Knarvesburgh was presented to His Majesty by the Rt. Hon. the Earl of Burlington, High-Steward of the Royalty of Knarvesburgh, and Lord Lieutenant of the West-Riding of the County of York.

To His most Excellent Majesty William III. by the Grace of God, King of England, Scotland, France, and Ireland, Defender of the Faith, &c.

The humble Address of the Bayliff, Burgesses elect, Borough-men, and other Inhabitants of Your Majesty's Ancient and Royal Borough of Knarvesburgh, within Your Duchy of Lancaster and County of York.

WE Your Majesty's most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, having a deep sense of the many and unspeakable Blessings we now enjoy under Your Majesty's most happy and glorious Reign over us, (which God long continue) and as of our perfect Abhorrence and Detestation of the Injury offered by the French King to Your Majesty's Person and Government, in Proclaiming the pretended Prince of Wales King of these Your Majesty's Dominions; do in all Humility beg leave to assure Your Majesty, That, in Conjunction with the rest of Your Majesty's good and faithful Subjects, we shall be always ready, to the utmost of our Power and Abilities, to stand by and support Your Majesty and Your Government; together with such Alliances as Your Majesty shall in Your great Wisdom think fit to make, for the common Good of Your Majesty's Dominions and Alliance, against the Exorbitant Power of France, the pretended Prince of Wales, and all other Your Majesty's Enemies whatsoever.

The following Address from the Borough of Boroughbridge was presented to His Majesty by the Rt. Hon. Sir Henry Guedrick Kt. & Bar. and Sir Brian Staplyton Bar. Representatives for the ensuing Parliament.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Burgesses and Inhabitants of the Ancient Borough of Boroughbridge in the County of York.

WE the Burgesses and Inhabitants of Your Majesty's said Borough do humbly crave leave to express our Protestation of the late Injustice and Indignity of Your Majesty by the French King, in Proclaiming

the pretended Prince of Wales King of these Your Majesty's Reains and Dominions, in manifest Violation of Solemn and Publick Faith; and upon this occasion presume humbly to address Your Majesty, with Assurances of our constant Fidelity to Your Majesty, and that we will be ready always with our utmost Power to support, maintain, and defend Your Sacred Person, Royal Dignity and Government, against the French King, the pretended Prince of Wales, and all their Adherents, and all other Your Majesty's Enemies whatsoever.

In which firm Resolution, we have made an Unanimous Choice of such Representatives of this Borough for the ensuing Parliament, as (we doubt not) will demonstrate a hearty and effectual Zeal for these Ends, according to the Desire of us, Your Majesty's most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects.

The following Address from the County of Glamorgan, was presented to His Majesty by Tho. Mansell Esq; introduced by his Grace the Duke of Ormond.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Deputy Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, Gentlemen, and Freeholders, of the County of Glamorgan.

WE Your Majesty's most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, having a deep sense of the great Things Your Majesty hath done for this Nation, and being fully convinced that the Happiness and Prosperity of England, the Preservation of the Protestant Religion, and the Balance of Europe, so all (under Divine Providence) entirely depend upon the Safety of Your Majesty's Royal Person and Government; are inuenced as well by our Affection and Interest, as by our Allegiance to Your Majesty, to declare our Abhorrence of the late unjust Proceedings of the French King, in Proclaiming the pretended Prince of Wales King of England, Scotland, and Ireland, contrary to Your Majesty's legal Right and Title, his own Acknowledgement, and several Acts of Parliament for settling the Succession of the Crown in the Protestant Line; and therefore we humbly crave leave on this Occasion to assure Your Majesty, That we will always be ready, to the utmost of our Power, to defend and maintain Your Majesty's Undoubted Rights to the Imperial Crown of these Your Reains, against the French King, the pretended Prince of Wales, and all other Pretenders and Invaders whatsoever.

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Also a Quarterly General
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Venice, Dec. 10. N. S. A Reinforcement of 400 Foot, lately arrived from *Dalmatia*, was sent from hence this week to *Verona*. About 1000 Foot more are come to the *Lido*, part of them from *Dalmatia*, and the rest from the *Mores*, from whence more Forces are shortly expected. Orders are sent to *Paaua* to repair the Fortifications of that Place, and some of these Forces will be sent thither to strengthen the Garrison. We are expected to hear that Prince *Commerci* has attacked *Goito*, who having joined the *Danish* Forces, and the two Regiments of Foot lately come from *Germany*, is now at the head of above 20000 Men, and there is no doubt but they will take that Place, which is a Post of great Consequence for the Defence of the *Mantuan*. A strong Detachment of the *German* Forces are posted along the *Oglio*, to oppose the Passage of any Succours the *French* might send to *Goito*.

Frankfort, Dec. 17. The Prince of *Nassau Weilburgh*, who lately came hither from *Dusseldorp*, went the 15th to *Nemstad*, to command the Elector Palatine's Forces which are posted there. Major-General *Jordan*, Envoy from the King of *Poland* to the *French* Court, passed by here this week in his way thither. The Diet of the Circle of the *Upper Rhine* are still assembled, to agree upon the Supplies to be raised for augmenting their Forces. The Work of the new Lines in these Parts is carried on with as much dispatch, as the Season will allow of. Several Companies of Foot of the Elector Palatine's Forces are marched to *Keyserlautern*, and Orders are given to repair and augment the Fortifications of that Place, which may be of good use for covering the *Hautsruh*.

Brussels, Dec. 19. The States of *Brabant* met the 17th Instant, when an extraordinary Supply was demanded of them for maintaining the Forces, and other urgent Occasions, and it was proposed to raise the same by a Capitation Tax, as has been practised in *France*, which occasioned a general dissatisfaction; But the Members of this Assembly were given to understand, That their only business was to approve of what was thought convenient and necessary by the Court; So the States, who are sensible that they are not in a condition to insist upon their Privileges since they are brought under a Foreign Power, consented to the raising of 120000 Florins by a Capitation. An Express arrived here the 17th from *Ghent*, with Advice, that the Governor at *Sas Van Ghent* had caused divers pieces of Cannon to be fired upon a Fort the *French* were building near that Place; Upon which *Marshal Boufflers* dispatched one of his Aides-de-Camp to the *French* Court, to receive the King's Orders. The Levies are begun for augmenting the 6 old *Flemish* Regiments of Foot with a Battalion each, which are to be compleat by the beginning of *March*. An Officer, who is a Native of *Liege*, has undertaken to raise a Regiment of Foot of his own Countrymen. The Recruiting of our *Horle* is delayed till these Levies are finished. Colonel *Pemaloeza* is made Governor of *Newport*, in the room of *Monfieur Aguiet*, who died some days ago. They write from *Liege*, that the Meeting of the States of that Bishoprick is appointed for the 2d of the next Month, against which time the Elector of *Cologne* is expected there, who 'tis said intends to demand of them a considerable Subsidy, and to propose the raising of more Forces.

Paris, Dec. 24. N. S. The *French* King has given Orders for making up the Reinforcement which is now to be sent to *Italy* to 30 Battalions, and as many Squadrons, who are to begin their march the 2d of the next month. The Horse are to go by the way of *Piedmont*, and the Foot to *Toulon*, from whence they are to be sent by Sea to the Coast of *Genouev*, and from thence to march to the *Milaneze*. The Officers of these Forces have desired that their march may be delayed for some time, to the end they may get ready their Equipages, and recruit their several Troops and Companies; but 'tis thought this will not be granted, the King desiring that these Troops may be in the *Milaneze* very early in the Spring; and as for recruiting them, that is to be done by making a Draught out of the Regiments in the several Garrisons, which are to be made up by the respective Towns where such Garrisons are. 'Tis talked here, that in a short time further Supplies of Men will be sent to *Italy*, this Court being resolved to make their utmost Efforts on that side the next year. The Marquis of *Dreux*, who married the Daughter of *Monfieur Chamillard*, Comptroller-General of the Fi-

nances, is come hither from the *French* Army in *Italy* to take Possession of the Office of Introdutor of Ambassadors, which he bought some time ago of the Marquis of *Blainville*. The Count de *Bezans*, who lately came from thence to give the King an Account of the Condition of the Army, is sent back with fresh Instructions to *Marthal Villeroi*. The last Letters from *Italy* give an Account, that the *French* Army continued near *St. Giovanni in Croce*, and that they were making a Bridge over the *Po* at *Casal-Maggiore*; But the Duke of *Parma* had caused the Militia of his Country to take Arms, and had posted them along the *Po*, to guard the Passes over that River. The *French* had abandoned *Borghetto*, a considerable Post on the *Po*, where they had built a Bridge, and the *German* had possessed themselves of that Town, as likewise of several other Places wherein were *French* Garrisons. 'Tis reported, that the *French* have likewise abandoned *Goito*, the Garrison whereof were to rejoin the Army, or if they could not do that with safety, to retire to the City of *Mantua*; If this be so, the Imperialists are entire Masters of all the Duchy of *Mantua*, except the Capital City, which they intend to block up this Winter. The last Letters from *Cadix* bring an Account, that the *French* Squadron commanded by the Count de *Chateaurenault* were driven back into that Port by bad weather.
