

thence early in the Spring to the Upper Rhine; and 'tis said, as soon as a sufficient number of Men are raised to recruit the Imperial Forces, Commissions will be given out for raising several new Regiments. The Emperor has appointed Count Breiner to be Commissary-General of his Armies. The States of the Lower Austria have granted the Emperor a Free Gift of 400000 Florins over and above their usual Contributions, in Consideration of the extraordinary Expences he is put to in the present Conjuncture. The Emperor has appointed Count Schlick to go his Envoy to the Elector of Bavaria. General Guttenstein is on his departure for the Imperial Army in Italy, and carries with him Bills for a considerable Sum of Money to pay the Forces. The Count de Berleps is made Chamberlain to the Emperor.

Frankfort, January 15. Count Nassau Weisburgh, General of the Elector Palatine's Forces, is returned hither from Spire, having been to view the Lines that are making to cover the Palatinate, which are in very good forwardness. He has recommended to the States of the Circle of the Upper Rhine to hasten the Levies for augmenting their Forces; of which he has the Chief Command, and to send those Forces they have already on foot to join the Elector Palatine's Troops, which the said States seem very willing to comply with.

Cologne, Jan. 17. Yesterday our Garrison received a Reinforcement of 400 Men of the Forces of the Circle of Westphalia. Baron Heyde, who Commands the King of Prussia's Forces in these Parts, and General Dopff, who has the Command of the Dutch Forces, arrived here the 14th Instant, and continued their Journey the same day to Dusseldorp; 'Tis said, the latter is shortly to receive into the Service of the States-General 2 Regiments of Horse, and 7 of Foot, of the King of Prussia's Forces, making together about 7000 Men, which are to be Commanded by the Margrave Albrecht of Brandenburg. The French Forces which were quartered on the Borders of Guelderland and in this Archbishoprick are in motion towards Bonn. 'Tis said, the Elector of Cologne intends shortly to remove from thence to Liege, and that as soon as he is gone out of Bonn, the French are to put into that Place a Garrison of 5000 Men. The Forces of the King of Prussia, the Elector Palatine, and the States-General, are drawing towards Keyserzwern, and 'tis said, they intend to cut off the Communication between that Place and the French Forces.

Hamburg, Jan. 17. The Duke of Holstein is shortly expected in these Parts from Sweden. Letters from Warsaw of the 5th Instant say, the Diet of that Kingdom were not yet come to any Resolution in the Matters before them, and that in the mean while the King of Sweden was advancing further into Lithuania with a strong Detachment of his Army.

Hague, Jan. 20. They are continuing in these Provinces the Levy of Seamen for the Service of this year. Several Officers who were come hither, are ordered to return to their respective Commands. The Deputies of Groningen and Ommelande have delivered to the States-General their several Pretensions, which in all probability will be soon adjusted. 'Tis said, an Agreement is made with the Landgrave of Hesse-Cassel, for his sending one Regiment of Foot more into the Service of the States. They write from Wolfenbittel, that the Sieur Odam was come thither from Berlin, and after he had finished his Negotiation with the Duke of Wolfenbittel, would proceed to the Court of Hanover. The Letters come in this day from the North say, the King of Sweden was in very good Health; That he continued to pursue Oginsky, and was enter'd into Wilna, the Capital City of Lithuania.

Paris, Jan. 18. N. S. The French King has resolved to make farther Levies of Men both in France and Spain; Commissions are accordingly given out for raising 8 Regiments of Foot, and for the easier effecting it, the Colonels are to have the Nomination of the Officers that are to serve under them; and as soon as these are compleat, other Regiments will be raised in like manner. The King has given the Government of Cognac to the Marquis de St. Viance, on Condition he pay off the Debts owing by the Sieur de la Caze, his Predecessor, which amount to 20000 Livres. Orders are given to the Reinforcements designed for the French Army in Italy to hasten their march, and the Fort which were to be Shipped off at Toulon by the 25th of the next Month, are now ordered to embark by the 10th. An Exprez dispatched by Marshal Villeroi the 8th Instant is arrived at the French Court, who brings an Account, that the Duke of Modena had admitted the German Forces into Bersello, a Place of great Advantage to them, both on account of its Strength and of its Situation; and that there being reason to suspect the Duke of Parma had a Design of receiving an Imperial Garrison likewise into Placentia, Marshal Villeroi had ordered a considerable Detachment under the Command of Monsieur de Praconal to pass the Po, in order to prevent them; Another French Detachment commanded by Monsieur de Barbieres was ordered to pass the

Po near Cremona, (whither the Bridge of Boats was removed for that purpose from Casal-Majore) and to possess themselves of Casal, and take Quarters in that part of the Marquis which belongs to the Duke of Mantua, and in the Territory of Alessandria. The rest of the French Forces are quartered in the Cremonese, part of them along the Po from Cremona to Casal-Majore, and part along the Oglio. The Marshal Villeroi makes great Compliments of the Italian Princes, who upon all Occasions, favour the Imperialists; And the Country People both in the Milanese and County of Cremona are ready to do the French all the Mischief they can; And few days before this Exprez came away, some Country People surprized and killed Marshal Villeroi's Steward, and four other of his Servants.
