Naples, Dec. 21. N. S. The Count d'Estrees is expecting Orders from the French Court, whether he shall continue here with the Squadron of French Men of War under his Command, or return to Thoulon. He has taken a view of the Fourier of this City. or return to Thoulon. He has taken a view of the Fortifications of this City, and of feveral other Places along this Coast, and has given Directions for repairing them. Our Vice-Roy consults him in all Affairs of Importance, and he takes upon him to direct several Matters, which gives great Offence to our Nobility, who cannot quit their natural Aversion to the French, or see without the highest Concern a Foreigner at the head of the Administration of the Government here. The breaking of the Bank of the Amunciata and the general Decay firation of the Government here. The breaking of the Bank of the Annunciara, and the general Decay of our Trade, occasion great Murmurings, and particularly the Silk-Weavers, and several other Artificers, who, for want of Work, are reduced to a starving Condition, and impute their Missortune to the ill Conduct of our Vice-Roy, and the other Ministers employed by the Court of Spain; They threaten to Pife and plunder their Houses if some Means here to Rife, and plunder their Houses, if some Means be not found out to subsist them, and express a great. Venice, Jan. 6. Advices from the Imperial Army of the 4th Instant give an Account, that a great quantity of Provisions and Forage was come from the Country or Tirol by the Lake de Garda to Dezenzano, from whence the same would be distributed among the several Regiments in their respective Quarters. The French Forces continue in their Ouarters in the Cremoneze. The Weather is so bad, that neither side can send out any Parties. The Germans do still keep the City of Mantia. closely blocked up, insomuch that the Garrison of that Place begin to want fresh Provisions and Forage, and a great number of their Men are fallen lick. This faid, Prince Engene intends shortly to send a strong Detachments to Naples, to support those that are well enclined to the Emperor's Interest in that Kingdom, who seem to wait only for a sit opportunity to declare themselves.
