London, Jan. 17. The following Address from the Inhabitants of Jersey was presented to His Majesty by Sir Hon. the Lord *Jermyn*, Governor, and *Edward Bayly* Esq; Bayliff of the said Island.

To the King's Most Excellent Majesty.

Your humble Address of the States of Your Majesty's Island of Jersey, and other Gentlemen of the said Island.

We prostrate our selves at Your Majesty's Feet, to declare our Abhorrence and Detestation of the King's Designs against Your Sacred Person and Government, by pretending to give the Title of Sovereign to the pretended Prince of Wales, and to acknowledge the many Favours received from Your Majesty, both from Your Majesty, and Your Royal Predecessors, and assure Your Majesty of our most hearty Resolution to Sacrifice cheerfully, if occasion offers, our Lives and Fortunes for maintaining Your Majesty's just and lawful Right to the Imperial Crown of Great Britain and Dominions; and also for preserving the same in the Protestant Line as by Law established; and Almighty GOD to grant Your Majesty a long and happy Reign. We are Your Majesty's most humble and dutiful Subjects.

Which Address His Majesty received very Graciously.

Madrid, Dec. 31. N.S. The Council of State of this Duchy have sent two Deputies to *Madrid*, to represent the Court, That the Inhabitants of this Duchy have been paid heavy Taxes this year; That they have been at a great Charge in furnishing the French Forces quartered upon them with divers Necessaries; and that they have sustained great Damages by the said Soldiers, who have behaved themselves as in an Enemy's Country, taking from the Country People Cattel, Corn, Hay, and other Provisions, without paying for the same; By which means the Country is quite exhausted, and unable to furnish the farther sum of Money which are demanded of them. They desire from *Granada*, that the Hospitals of that Place be full of French Soldiers.

Venice, Jan. 6. Our Senate being jealous of Count *d'Estrees*'s continuance in these Seas with the French Squadron under his Command, have given Orders for repairing their Forts at the *Lido* and *Chiuzza*, and are fitting out a good number of Gallies, and Men of War for our greater Security. Signior *Morosini* went from hence this week on his Embassy to *Rome*; he has Orders in his way thither to wait upon the Great Duke of *Tuscany*. Count *Castelbarco* is appointed by the Emperor to be his Commissary General in the State of *Mantua*, and he is accordingly thither to confer with Prince *Eugene*, and to raise Contributions upon the Inhabitants of the Duchy. The Germans have so closely besieg'd the City of *Mantua*, that Provisions are very scarce there, and several Quarrels have happened between the French Garrison, which consists of 8000 French Soldiers, and the Duke of *Mantua*'s Forces. The German Forces are quartered at present at *Ofizia*, *Marmirolo*, *Borghetto*, *Pontemalino*, *Revere*, *Favovita del Duca*, and *Verona*, on this side the *Po*, and at *St. Benedetto*, *Gratie*, *Guaftalla*, *Gonzago*, *Luzzara*, and *Verucola*, on the other side that River, over which they have several Bridges for their Communication; They are fortifying *Guaftalla*, for the Security of their Quarters on that side. Recruits arrive daily from *Germany*, by

the way of *Roveredo*. The French Forces continue in their Quarters in the *Cremoneze*. Prince *Eugene* has desired of the Pope, Passage for some German Troops towards *Naples*; And of Cardinal *Dada*, Legate of *Ferrara*, he demands Corn and other Necessaries for the Imperial Army for their Money. Cardinal *Giudice* is gone to *Civita Vecchia* to embark for *Sicily*. Letters from *Naples* say, the Gates of all the Churches in that City were kept shut on *Christmas* Eve, and so continued till 8 a Clock on *Christmas* day in the morning, and that strong Guards of Horse and Foot were posted in several Streets, to hinder the great concourse of People, who used to walk about all night on pretence of Devotion, and who 'twas feared might take the advantage of this opportunity to rise a second time.

Hamburgo, Jan. 17. The Duke of *Holstein Gottorp* intends shortly to return from *Sweden* to the Duchy of *Holstein*. Letters from *Warsaw* of the 6th Instant give an Account, that the first thing which the General Diet of *Poland* took under Consideration, was the State of Affairs in *Lithuania*; Some Deputies proposed, That Prince *Sapieha* and his Adherents should be declared Enemies to their Country, for having called in the *Swedes* to their Assistance; Others thought it more Adviseable, to endeavour first to bring Matters to an Accommodation, and to desire the King of *Poland* to employ his Authority for effecting the same; Which at last was resolved on, and Commissioners are appointed by the King for this purpose. The Diet have also represented to the King, That there were still some *Swedish* Forces left in the Dominions of *Poland*; He assured them, that he knew of none, and that if there were any, he would immediately give Orders for their being sent away.

Brussels, January 17. Commissions are daily giving out here for making new Levies both of Horse and Foot, in order to augment the Forces that are to be paid by this Country to 40 Battalions and 60 Squadrons; And for the more easy raising of Soldiers, Orders are sent to the Magistrates of all the Towns in the *Spanish Netherlands*, to furnish a certain number of Men, provided with Clothes and Arms, which are to be ready by the latter end of this Month. Prince *Serclaus of Tilly*, Commander in Chief of the Elector of *Cologne*'s Forces, is gone to *Liege*, to assist at the Meeting of the States of that Archbishoprick, and to propose to them to raise Forces for the Elector's Service, in the same manner as is done in this Country. Count *d'Urville* is raising here a Company of Musketers for the King of *Spain*'s Guard; which is to consist of 150 Men, all Gentlemen and Reformed Officers, who are to have a Crown a day, and the promise of being preferred in the Army. A considerable Sum of Money was brought this week from *France*, to pay the French Forces quartered in these Parts.

Paris, Jan. 18. N.S. The French King has lately had several Fits of the Gout; but is pretty well again. 'Tis said, that the Prince of *Conti* is to have the Chief Command of the French Army in *Italy* next Summer. Fresh Orders are given to the Reinforcements designed thither to hasten their March. The new Levies are begun for raising 8 Regiments of Foot, and when these are compleat, more Commissions will be given out

our for the same purpose. Marshal *Catinat* parted from *Cremona* the 5th Instant, and is expected here in few days. Letters from *Cremona* of the 9th Instant give an Account, that the Bridge which the French had at *Casal Maggiore*, upon the River *Po*, was very much damaged by the overflowing of that River occasioned by the great Rains; and that they had carried this Bridge up to *Cremona*, and were repairing it, and building Fortifications on both sides of the River to defend the same. That the Duke of *Moldens* had received a German Garrison into *Brescia*, and Marshal *Villeroi* was intimated, a private Negotiation was carried on between Prince *Eugene* and the Prince of *Parma*, for admitting the German Forces likewise into *Parma* and *Placentia*; Upon which he had ordered a Detachment of Horse and Foot under Command of Monsieur *Prezental* to pass over the *Po*, to endeavour to prevent the Germans; Monsieur *de St. Fremon*, and Monsieur *Biffi*, were ordered to *Milan* with a Detachment of French Forces, and the Marquis of *St. Cremon* was to command at *Cremona*; The Marquis of *Villeroi* was come thither from *Casal Maggiore*, which Post 'twas said the French intended to quit.

Paris, Jan. 25. NBS. Letters from Italy of the 14th Instant give an Account, that the Bridge which the French were making at *Cremona* over the *Po* was not yet finished for want of Boats, which had given the Germans time to prevent the Design of the French, of sending Forces into the *Parmesan*, General *Vaubonne* being marched thither with 800 Imperial Horse and some Foot, in order, as was believed, to put a Garrison into *Placentia* with the Consent of the Duke of *Parma*. Part of the French Horse ordered to Italy are arrived in *Dauphine*, and part of the Foot in *Provence*, from whence the latter are to pass by Sea to *Genoa*. The 3 Swiss Battalions of Foot which are in *Lige* have demanded, that they may march from thence, declaring that they will not serve against the Emperor and the Empire.

Kensington, Jan. 18. His Majesty has been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable *Thomas Earl of Pembroke and Montgomery* to be Lord High Admiral of England and Ireland, and the Dominions thereunto belonging.

Whereas by Advertisements in the Gazets in December, 1700, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty did acquaint all Persons Trading by Sea in the way of the Ships of Algiers, That (according to Agreement with that Government) all Ships or Vessels whatsoever of His Majesty's Subjects that should be brought into the said Port of Kingdom after the last day of September, 1701, without Passes; the Goods on board the said Ships or Vessels would be confiscated; but the Ships and Men set at liberty, and the Freight paid; And whereas, since that Agreement, it hath been represented to His Majesty by his Trading Subjects, that the same may be of dangerous Consequence to their Estates, Their Lordships do hereby give notice, That it hath been since positively agreed between His Majesty's Consul at Algiers and the said Government, that the former Article shall be void, and that the 4th Article made by Admiral Herbert (now Earl of Torrington) in the year 1692, shall stand firm and valid; which provides, That upon any Ship or Vessel's being free by an Algerine, not in any of the Seas appertaining to His Majesty's Dominions, the said Algerine may send on board one single Boat with two Sitters only; besides the ordinary Crew of Rowers, and that no more shall enter any such Merchant Ship or Vessel, without express Leave from the Commander thereof, but the two Sitters alone; and that upon producing a Pass under the Hand and Seal of the Lord High Admiral of England, or the Lord High Admiral of Scotland, or the Hands of the Lords

Commissioners of either of the said Kingdoms, the said Boat shall presently depart, and the Merchant Ship may proceed on her Voyage; And in regard several of His Majesty's Subjects are in divers remote parts of the World on long Voyages, and in case for that reason be supplied with the said Passes, and the Form and Manner agreed in the Royal said Article, their Lordships do hereby make give notice, That it is hereby declared, that Ships and Vessels under their Crowns shall have the same liberty whereunto, Passes have been formerly granted, and shall be lodged in the hands of the Governour or Governours of the Customs in His Majesty's several Plantations.

That it is hereby given, That the Transfer-Book of the Bank of England, relating to the East India will be sent to the Bank, but not into again till the General Court of the said Company, do alter the same, notwithstanding the former Order of the said General Court of the 28th Instant, relating to the putting up of the said Transfer-Book.
