*Kensington, Jan. 22.*  
**T**his day the Lord Archbishop, the Bishops, and the rest of the Clergy of the Province of Canterbury, in Convocation assembled, attended His Majesty, and presented the following Address.

The humble Address of the Archbishop, Bishops, and the rest of the Clergy of the Province of Canterbury, in Convocation assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

*WE humbly beg Leave to lay before Your Majesty, now we are Assembled in Convocation, the deep Repentment that every one of us had, at our first Hearing of the great Indignity which the French King offer'd to Your Majesty and Your People, in Declaring the Pretended Prince of Wales to be King of Your Majesties Realms and Dominions.*

*And we do hereupon take Occasion to Renew our Sincere Protestations of a Firm and Unshaken Allegiance to Your Majesty; humbly Assuring Your Majesty, That we will do our utmost Endeavours, by God's Assistance, in our respective Places and Stations, to Defend Your Sacred Person, and to Maintain Your Majesties Rightful Title to the Imperial Crown of these Realms, and the Succession thereof in the Protestant Line, as now by Law Establish'd. against the said Pretended Prince, and other Your Majesties Open and Secret Enemies.*

*We will always, according to our especial Duty, use it our earnest Prayer to God, That he will by continue Your Majesties happy Reign over us, that You may Perfect all those great Works, in which He hath hitherto Wonderfully Conducted You with so much Glory and Success, for the Peace and Welfare of these Kingdoms, the Support of all Your Allies, the Safety and Tranquillity of Europe, and the Preserving the Protestant Religion, both here in this Church of England by Law Establish'd, and in all other Protestant Churches.*

To which His Majesty was pleas'd to return the following most Gracious Answer.

My Lords, and the rest of the Clergy,  
*I Cannot but be very much Pleas'd with those Expressions of your Affection to Me, and your Concern for the Honour of the Nation; For Maintaining the Succession to the Crown in the Protestant Line; And for the Preservation of the Protestant Churches. And I am glad of this Opportunity to give you fresh Assurances of My firm Resolution, in especial manner, to Protect and Support the Church of England as by Law Establish'd.*

*Rome, Jan. 7. N. S. Orders are sent to Signior Spadza, who at present resides at Cologne as the Pope's Nuncio, to repair to Vienna with the Character of Nuncio Extraordinary, and Signior*

*Fieschi, and Signior Zanedary, who are appointed to go in the same Quality to the Courts of France and Spain, prepare for their departure. The Pope has published an Order, to forbid the raising of Soldiers within his Territories for any Foreign Prince whatsoever; And has given out Commissions for raising more Forces for his own Service. The Duke of Parma's Envoy had Audience of the Pope this week, to desire he would assist him with some Forces, and 'tis said, the Pope has promised to send 4 Troops of Dragoons to reinforce the Garrison of Parma. The French and Spanish Ministers here have of late used great Endeavours to bring the Differences between the Pope and the Duke of Savoy, about the Right of Nomination to the vacant Bishopricks and Abbies in Piedmont, to an Accommodation; but have not hitherto made any considerable Progress in that Affair. 'Tis said, Prince Eugene is sending a strong Detachment of Horse and Foot to the Kingdom of Naples, where the Nobility and People seem generally dissatisfied with the present Administration of the Government.*

*Milan, January 7. Two French Regiments of Foot are marched to Vigevano, where they are to quarter, and the Forces of this Duchy are likewise in few days to march into Winter Quarters. The French Fortes in these Parts are very much weakened by the Losses they suffered during the last Campaign, as well in their several Encounters with the Germans, as by Sickness and Desertion, and several Officers are sent to France out of each Regiment to raise Recruits. Divers Inhabitants of this Duchy have brought in their Accounts of the Cattle, Corn, and Forage, taken from them, and other Damages they have sustained by the French Soldiers; but are not like to obtain any Satisfaction for the same. The Conde de las Torres, General of the Horse, and the Conde d'Aguilar, are commanded to repair to Spain, and 'tis believed, the Chancellor of Milan, and several other Persons of Quality, will soon receive the like Orders, to make way for the Absolute Government of the French in this Country. We have Advice, that a Ship which lately sailed from Genoa with Spanish Soldiers on board for Naples, is cast away on the Coast of that Kingdom.*

*Venice, Jan. 13. Several Men of War and Gallies are fitted out here for the Security of the Gulph. The Venetian Militia of Terra-firma, which were raised last Summer, are sent home, but are to draw together again in the Spring. A considerable Sum of Money was lately sent to Brescia to pay the Venetian Forces; Money is likewise remitted to Dalmatia to pay the Forces in that Country. An Order is published, forbidding all Persons, except the Soldiers who are upon Duty, to carry Pistols, or any other Fire-Arms, about them in this City. The Imperial Ambassador here has received an Express, with the News of the Germans having put a Garrison into Bressla, of strong and well situated Place in the Duchy of*

*Adenz*; That Prince *Eugene* sent afterwards a Detachment of Horse and Foot into the *Parma*, and that he presses the Duke of *Parma* to admit the *German* Forces into *Piacenza*, *Borgo St. Domino*, and other Places which are Fiefs of the Empire; The *French* on the other hand content themselves with guarding the Country of *Cremona*, in expectation that considerable Succours will arrive from *France* early in the Spring. They write from *Naples*, that they had an Earthquake some days ago near that Place; That most of the Forces lately arrived there from *Catalonia* and the *Milmeze* are sent to the *Abruzzo*, upon some Apprehensions they have of Prince *Eugene's* sending a Detachment that way; And that Count *d'Estrees* was preparing to return to *Toulon* with the Squadron of *French* Men of War under his Command.

*Frankfort, Jan. 15.* Several *French* Regiments in *Alsace*, *Lorraine*, and the *Franche Comte*, being ordered to *Italy* to reinforce the *French* Army, are accordingly marching from their Quarters. The States of *Swabia*, and those of *Franconia*, are shortly to meet, in order to augment their Forces, according to the Example of the Circle of the *Upper-Rhine*. They write from *Bamberg*, where the Elector of *Mentz* is at present, that Monsieur *d'Isberville*, the *French* Envoy, was shortly expected there from *Coblenz*, to take his Audience of Leave of his Electoral Highness, having received Orders to return to *France*.

*Brussels, Jan. 27.* The States of *Brabant* met this week, and have appointed Deputies to settle the Methods of raising the Capitation Tax in this Province. The Forces to be paid by the *Spanish Netherlands* are to be made up to 40000 Men, which is above four times the number they were during the late War, and the several Provinces are to furnish each a certain number of Men; They have accordingly begun these Levies; but Men are very hard to be got, inasmuch that they talk of obliging all the younger sort of Men to call Lots who shall enter into the Service, which has made great numbers of them retire out of the *Spanish* Dominions. Orders are given for adding 5 Men to each Troop of Horse. The Marquis of *Bedmar* is nominated by the Court of *Spain* to succeed the Duke of *Escalona* as Vice-Roy of *Sicily*; but itays for the Approbation of the *French* Court. 'Tis said, the Count of *Bergelick* will be made Intendant-General of the *Spanish Netherlands*, and he does already take upon him, tho he has yet no Commission, to act as such, by giving Directions to the Receivers-General to pay considerable Sums of Money, without acquainting either the Treasurer-General, or the Council of the Finances; which Practice is altogether unusual here. They write from *Spain*, that the Trade in that Kingdom is very low, and Money extremely scarce; and that the Merchants of *Seville* and *Cadiz* are very much dissatisfied at the Liberty given to the *French* to Trade in the *Spanish West-Indies*; And that Monsieur *Dorry*, a *Frenchman*, is sent to the Court of *France*, with a particular Account of the State of the Publick Revenues of *Spain*, and the Dominions thereunto belonging.

*Paris, Febr. 1.* N. S. Marshal *Catinat* arrived here the 28th past from *Italy*, and waited upon the *French* King yesterday. Divers Officers who had leave to come hither from *Flanders* and *Gelderland*, are ordered to return immediately to their respective Commands. The King yesterday made a Promotion of Military Officers, of whom 17 are advanced to the Command of Lieutenant-General, 48 to that of Marshal de Camp, and 39 are made Brigadiers-General. Letters from *Italy* of the 20th instant give an Account, that Marshal *Villeroi* sent from *Cremona* on the 15th 300 Horse and 200 Foot, with Orders to pass the *Pe*, and to advance to the River *Origina*, and to live at Discretion in the Villages thereabouts; That they were joined the 17th by 250 Horse, and 600 Foot, under the Command of Monsieur *Prajan*, who was to establish his Head Quarters at *Comite-Maggiore* on the River *Larda*, and the *Seurs de Viandenil* and *Ruffe* were posted near the *Po* over-against *Placentia* with a Body of Horse; Marshal *Villeroi* had again pressed the Duke of *Parma* to admit a *French* Garrison into that Town; but he refused to do it, alledging, He ought not to give Offence to the *German*, who were Masters of his whole Country except some few Places, since the *French* were not in a condition to protect him. The *German* Forces under General *Vaubonne* continued near *Parma*, and we expect by our next to hear of their being admitted into the Town. The news continues, that a Detachment of *German* Forces are marched towards *Naples*.
