ving received Orders to return to France.

Braffeir, Jan. 27. The States of Brahant mer this week, and have appointed Deputies to fettle the Methods of railing the Capitation Tax in this Province. Paris, Febr. 1. N. S. Marshal Catinat arrived here the 28th past from Italy, and waited upon the French King yesterday. Divers Officers who had leave to come hither from Flanders and Gelderland, are ordered to return immediately to their respective Commands.
