 Falenouth, June 28

Yesterday arrived at the onset of Hamburg laden with Deals, bound for Bourdeaux; who met the East India Fleet of Hollanders with some men of war their Convoy, entering the Texel. The same day came in Speedwell of Amsterdam with Piece Goods, intending for the Barbadoes.

The Honours Adventure, which put into this Port from Barbadoes, all again taken in her goods, and intends with the first fair wind to put to Sea for Holland.

Birdington, June 24. By the Master of a Ship belonging to this Town, we are informed, that the 18th instant in his passage to Sunderland, he took up at Sea a boat with 4 men, 3 of them belonging to his Majesty's Ship the Forrester, employed as Convoy to the Ireland Fleet, by whom he had this account that upon intelligence that a Danish Pirate much infesting those Seas, had plundered several Ships both English and Others, and had lately possessed himself of a Pinck belonging to Hamburgh, wherein the Captain of the Pirates had embarked himself with severals of his men and 2 small guns; supposing her fitter for his purposes, as being a better Sailer than his own Vessel: the Forrester after some little enquiry had seized the said Pinck, and leaving the said Hamburgers on board, intrusted the Master to convey her into England; who upon a view of a Holland Dogger boat, upon a pretence of buying Fish, forced the few English that were aboard to put themselves into the boat, and putting all his sails, directing his course for Hamburgh. These men were all taken up about 4 or 5 leagues from the land, and set on shore at liberty.

Plymouth, June 25. The 21 instant sailed out of this Port 12 or 14 sail of ship bound for Newfoundland, Portugal, & the Straights.

There are since put into this Port 5 Ships of London outward bound, and this day 2 French Ships laden with Salt, 3 or 4 Vessels laden with Timber for the Isles of Wight.

Genova, June 25. On Wednesday last was made choice of for the Government of this Republic for the following 2 years, the Signiors Gio. Battista domellino, Paolo Casella, and Gio. Dominio Spinola, Senators; and Signior Giust Matteo Durazzo, and Francisco Maria Imp reale. Procurators.

Yesterday morning was elected Duke, Luigi Francesco Garbarino, and in the afternoon the same day according to a late decree, was crowned King of Corsica, having been attended in this Ceremony by all the Nobility.

This day he is to go in state to the Domo to receive the Sacrament.

On Sunday last returned hither the Genoa Convoy from Cadix under the conduct of Signior Marco Doric, richly laden, but touching at any Spanish Port in their Voyage.

Yesterday 5 of the States put out to Sea upon intelligence that 3 Turkish Gallies had been discovered upon these Coasts.

From Turin we are told that the Dutchess of Savoy had lately been so indisposed as to sleep her bed for several days, but is again restored to the great satisfaction of that Court.

The 12th instant the Pope's Nuncio had an Audience from the Duke, in which he made him a present of severall Reliques of the Bodies of ancient Saints sent to him by the Cardinal Patron, in acknowledgment of many favours formerly received from the Duke, while the said Duke had received with great Veneration, and had ordered them to be sent to the Venetia where he intends to order the Erection of a costly Altar, whereon they are to be reposed.

Vienna, June 23. The Regiment of Borja is hastening forward on the Expedition for the relief of Candia, and many young Gentlemen of great quality offer themselves as Volunteers, & amongst others a son of General Souches.

The Marquis de Sade having fallen in profession of his Charge as General & Governour of Waradin, is lately returned hither, & may in few days depart hence in company with the Marquis de Durlac for Natisbonne.

His Imperial Majesty has been pleased to nominate the Baron de Waldersdorf his Chancellor, to succeed in the Bishoprick of Vienna, who has been sent to Rome to desire the Popes confirmation.

The Emperor has ordered the Bishop of Bismund to go to the 3^d of Natisbonne under of character as his Commissoner, who has in order thereunto fixed up an honourable Train to attend him, among whom are 6 Trumpeters, 8 Pages, 10 Persons of his Guard, and severall Gentlemen his attendants.

Hague, July 5. The *Stee* *Hamel* *Braynink* late *President* from the *States* at *Frankfort* is lately returned from that Employment, and on *Tuesday* last gave an account of his *Negotiations*, and is believed he may in few Days be dispatched hence for *Vicuna* in quality of *Envoy Extraordinary*.

The *States* are also sending a person to reside at *Salce* as *Consul*, with orders to complain *Prince* *Muley* *Irshad* *Emperour* of *Morocco*, *Tuz* *Taffala*, and *Sud*, in the name of the *United Provinces*, and to negotiate with him for the maintenance of a good *Correspondency* and an establishment of *Trades* in those parts.

The *Duke* of *East-Friesland* having ill resented the seizing of one of the *Civil Officers* of that *Province* by the *Bishop* of *Munster* ordered upon account of a new custom established by that *State* *Command* at *Bourking*, has sent the *Baron* *de* *Huyhuisen* a *Principal Officer* of *East-Friesland*, to inform the *States* of the whole matter, the better to induce them to take some effectual order in that affair, and to procure the liberty of the imprisoned Officers.

The *Provinces* seem generally to concur in the resolution of fortifying the *Frontiers* and reinforcing the *Garrisons*. *Captain* *Arntsm* is ordered to march with his *Company* from the *Garrison* of *Leewarden* to *Dylest* *Schantz*.

His *Excellency* *S^r* *Wm* *Temple* is returned hither from *Amsterdam*, well satisfied with the civil reception he met with from the *Burgomasters* of that *City*, as also from those of *Haerlem*, on his return, who met him some distance from the *Town* with a *train* of *Horses*, *Coaches*, conducting him to the *Town-house*, *Citizens* being drawn up and ranged in the way as he past; and afterward exercised before him for his divestment: and the next morning he was again attended by the *Magistrates*, & by them conducted to the *Water-side*, to his *Embarkment*.

Warsaw, June 20. On the 18th instant, the *Militia* of the several *Provinces* appeared in the *Field* in order to the election consisting of above 50000 men, crying out they would not depart till the thing was chosen; whereupon the *Electors* began to give their suffrages to the *Duke* of *Neuberg*, and *Princes* of *Lorraine*, the only candidates appearing for the election, & in the conclusion it was found that the *Prince* of *Lorraine* had the majority by 50 votes; whereupon the favourers of the *Prince* of *Condé* interested, endeavored to add to the weaker side in hopes to make an equality of suffrages, & by that means

means to put a stop to the election, believing the *Assembly* would not admit of a double vote, during these endeavors there happened so violent a storm that they were forced to depart that night without any conclusion, with a promise to meet again the next morning, which they accordingly did, but then the 2 parties fortifying their interests and proceeding more warmly than before it was well to be lest the business might occasion a *Rept*; inasmuch as the *Palatin* of *Pojanica* and *Carissia*, representing the danger to the *Electors*, told them that they knew no better way for the prevention of those threatening mischiefs, then to nominate a *Priest*; that is, some *Nobleman* of the *own Country*; nor did they know any Person of greater worth than *Prince* *Michael* *Horibut* *Wisniawiesky*, which nomination was received with general acclamations, all *People* crying out, *Vivat*, *Vivat*, and the said *Prince* then present, was immediately forced by the *Assembly* to be covered and to take a *Chair* which he refused, urging his incapacity of supplying so weighty a *Crown*, but the *Assembly* not hearkening to his *Pro*ogy obliged him with tears in his *Eyes* to accept of the *honour*; all the rest of the *Provinces* & *Palatinates* gave in their suffrages to his choice, only the *Grand Chancellor* *Patz*, the *Principal Person* of *Lithuania*, affirmed that he could not give his voice to any but the *Prince* of *Lorraine*, but was opposed by his brother the *Palatin* of *Trofsky*, who showed him the inconveniencies of refusing a *Priest*, but encouraging him to nominate one of his own side of the *Country*, which he seemed inclined to, and named the *Prince* *Bohuslaus* *Petzewic*, who seemed to have a considerable party, but that of *Wisniawiesky* upon the competition prevailed, and in the heat killed & by all men who spoke over boldly against their choice, the *Marshal* of the *Crown* *Sobiesky*, and the *Marshal* of the *Nobles* retiring themselves, protested against the election, but the revailing party slighting them, said they would soon make choice of new *Marshals*: they then demanded the presence of the *Bishop* of *Cracow* to proclaim the election but he pretending some indisposition, would have excused himself, till they threatening to oblige the *Bishop* of *Cracow* to supply this Office, he appeared in the *field* with the 2 *Marshals*, and according to custom demanded 3 times, that if they were agreed upon the election they should name the Person which they did with great acclamations, accompanied with the discharge of all

the Canon in the neighbouring parts about 8 in the evening they concluded the nomination, and of the King was solemnly proclaimed, and by 10 conducted to the Castle the next day he was attended by the D^{ty} of Normandy, and the Emperor's Ambassador to the St. Johns Church, where he took his Oaths according to the Agreements, and afterwards dined with the Primate, which ended, he went into the field visit'g the several waywoodships, and Provinces, giving th^m his thanks for the sufferings.
