

Haſue, July 5. The ſtate ſtates Bruyning late Preſident from the States at Frankfurt is lately returned from that Employment, and on Tueſday laſt gave an account of his Negotiations, and is believed he may in few Days be diſpatcht hence for Vicuna in quality of Envoy Extraordinary.

The States are alſo ſending a perſon to reſide at Salce as Conſul, with orders to complain Princes Muley liſhed Emperour of Morocco, Tuffaleh, and ſuch, in the name of the United Provinces, and to negotiate with him for the maintenance of a good Correfpondency and an eſtabliſhment of Trade in thoſe parts.

The Duke of Eaſt-Frieſland having ill reſented the ſeizing of one of the Civil Officers of that Province by the Biſhop of Munſter ordered upon account of a new cuſtom eſtabliſht by that ſtate Command at Bourking, has ſent the Baron de Kuyhuſen a Principal Officer of Eaſt-Frieſland, to inform the States of the whole matter, the better to induce them to take ſome effectual order in that affair, and to procure the liberty of the impriſoned Officers.

The Provinces ſeem generally to concur in the reſolution of fortifying the Frontiers and reinforcing the Garrisons. Captain Anſtma is ordered to march with his Company from the Garrison of Leeuwarden to dyſtel Schantz.

His Excellency S<sup>r</sup> Wm Temple is returned hither from Amſterdam, well ſatisfied with the civill reception he met with from the burgo-maſters of that City, as alſo from thoſe of Haerlem, on his return, who met him ſome diſtance from the Town with a Train of Horſe Coaches, conducting him to the Town-houſe, ſix Citizens being drawn up and ranſhed in the way as he paſt; and afterwarde exercised before him for his diſcharge: and the next morning he was again attended by the Magiſtrates, & by them conducted to the Water-ſide, to his Embarkment

Warsaw, June 20. On the 18<sup>th</sup> inſtant, the Militia of the ſeveral Provinces appeared in the Field in order to the election conſiſting of above 50000 men, crying out they would not depart till the thing was choſen; where-upon the Electors began to give their ſuffrages to the Duke of Neuberg, and Princes of Lorrain, the only candidates appearing for the Election, & in the concluſion it was found that the Prince of Lorrain had the majority by 50 votes; where-upon the favourers of the Prince of Condé intereſt, endeavored to add to the weaker ſide in hopes to make an equality of ſuffrages, & by that means

means to put a ſtop to the Election, believing the Aſſembly would not admit of a double vote, during theſe endeavors there happened ſo violent a ſtorm that they were forced to depart that night without any concluſion, with a promiſe to meet again the next morning, which they accordingly did, but then the 2 parties fortifying their ſides, and proceeding more warmly than before it was well to be leſt the beſiſs might occaſion a Ruin; in ſomuch as the Palatines of Poſonania and Carinthia, repreſenting the danger to the Electors, told them that they knew no better way for the prevention of theſe threatening miſchiefs, then to nominate a Piniſt; that is, ſome Nobleman of the ſame Country; nor did they know any Perſon of greater worth than Prince Michael Horibut Wiſniawſky, which nomination was received with general acclamations, all People crying out, Vivat, Vivat, and the ſaid Prince then preſent, was immediately forced by the Aſſembly to be covered and to ſit in a Chair which he reſuſed, urging his incapacity of ſupporting ſo weighty a Crown, but the Aſſembly not hearkning to his ſupplie obliged him with tears in his Eyes to accept of theſe honours; all reſt of the Provinces & Palatines gave in their ſuffrages to his choice, only the Grand Chancellor Paſz, the Principal Perſon of Lithuania, affirmed that he could not give his voice to any but the Prince of Lorrain, but was opposed by his brother the Palatin of Troſky, who ſhewed him the inconveniencies of reſuſing a Piniſt, but encouraging him to nominate one of his own ſide of the Country, which he ſeemed inclined to, and named the Prince Boguſlaus Ritzewic, who ſeemed to have a conſiderable party, but that of Wiſniawſky upon the competition prevailed, and in the heat killed 2 of all men who ſpoke over boldly againſt their choice, the Marshal of the Crown Sobieſky, and the Marshal of the Nobles retiring themſelves, proteſted againſt the Election, but the revailing party ſlighting them, ſaid they would ſoon make choice of new Marshals: they then demanded the preſence of the Biſhop of Cracow to proclaim the Election but he preſenting ſome indiſpoſition, would have excuſed himſelf, till they threatening to oblige the Biſhop of Cracow to ſupply this Office, he appeared in the field with the 2 Marshals, and according to cuſtom demanded 3 times, that if they were agreed upon the Election they ſhould name the Perſon which they did with great acclamations, accompanied with the diſcharge of all the
