

Sussex have made a Direction under Article 5 of the above-mentioned Order affecting land south of Brighton Road in the Parish of Lancing between the Worthing Borough Boundary and Shoreham-by-Sea Urban District boundary, and also including an area of land between Old Salts Farm Road south of the Southern Railway line to the Shoreham Urban District boundary, more particularly shown on the plan attached to the said Direction and thereon edged blue.

(2) That the effect of this Direction is that the carrying out of alterations to, or operations required for the maintenance of, any existing building on the said land is no longer automatically permitted development and should not be undertaken without the Council's permission: provided that this Direction shall not apply to alterations or maintenance works to any building the cost of which does not exceed £10 in any period of 12 months.

(3) The Direction and plan referred to may be seen at all reasonable hours at the Council Offices, 15 Mill Road, Worthing.

NOTICE is hereby given that by the Morecambe and Heysham (Food) Order, 1946, dated the sixteenth day of November, 1946, the Minister of Health has declared that on and after the ninth day of December, 1946—

(a) the provisions of section 14 of the Food and Drugs Act, 1938, shall be in force in the Borough of Morecambe and Heysham,

(b) the provisions of section 88 (Registration of premises used for manufacture, etc., of potted meats) of the Morecambe Corporation Act, 1924, shall be repealed; and

(c) the provisions of section 116 (Registration in county districts of premises used in connection with the sale of ice-cream or preserved food) of the Lancashire County Council (Rivers Board and General Powers) Act, 1938, shall be repealed as respects the borough.

NOTE.—The following diseases were eradicated from Great Britain in the years indicated:— Cattle plague or rinder-pest (*pestis bovina*), 1877; pleuro-pneumonia (*peripneumonia contagiosa bovum*), 1898; sheep pox (*variola ovium*), 1850; rabies, 1922; epizootic lymphangitis (*lymphangitis epizootica*), 1906; and glanders (including fatcy) (*malleus*), 1928. Dourine (*exanthema coitale paralyticum*) has never existed in Great Britain.

No case of Fowl Pest (*pestis avium*) has been confirmed in Great Britain since the 11th January, 1937, the date as from which the disease was first notifiable. So far as is known, however, Fowl Pest has not existed in Great Britain since 1933.
