

The Passage over the Po as he expected, he was forced to send
ever his Foot in Boats; but this way proved very tedious, so that
they arrived late, and very much tired. The Fight lasted near 12
Hours, (during which time nothing was to be seen but Blood and
Fire,) and night coming on, and the Germans being deprived of
the Advantage of receiving any Succours, and believing the
French would draw together the Troops they had at *Bozolo*, *Ga-
zale*, *Casal Maggiore*, and the Neighbouring Towns, to cut off their
Retreat, Prince Eugene thought fit to retire, which he did with
great Order, and without any Pursuit from the French. This
Action cost us about 300 Men; among the Slain are reckoned
Count *Leiningen*, Baron *Fryburgh* Lieutenant Colonel of Horse,
and some other Officers; and among the Wounded are Count
Merci, and Count *Koufflein* Lieutenant Colonel of Foot, the last
of whom was so dangerously Wounded, that he was left behind in
the Town. Count *Dietrichstein*, who was on the other side the Po
with Prince *Vaudemour*, had one of his Legs shot off. We brought
away 50 French Officers Prisoners, and 400 Soldiers, and above
500 Horse belonging to their Cavalry and Artillery. The 2d, we
received Advice, That the Enemy had quitted all their Posts near
the *Oglia*, except *Bozolo*, and Orders were sent to Count *Herber-
stein*, who commands the German Forces on that side, to take Pos-
session of them. The 3d, divers Deserters came over to us, who
give an Account, That the Enemy in the Action of *Cremona* lost
above 2000 Men.

Venice, Febr. 2. A French Officer is arrived here from *Mantua*,
who reports, that he got out of that Place with very great hazard
and difficulty, the Germans keeping it very closely blocked up;
That the Garrison are in want of many Necessaries, particularly of
Hay and Oats, and Wood for Firing; And that the Inhabitants
are extremely dissatisfied with the Duke, for having put them un-
der the French Yoke. The Pope has consented, that the Germans
should provide themselves with Corn in the *Ferrarese*, and they
are getting together a good number of Boats on the Po, to be sent
down for this purpose to *Ferrara*. Letters from *Naples* say, Count
d'Elvres is failed from thence with the four biggest Men of War
of his Squadron, and one Bomb-Vessel, leaving behind him two
Men of War, two Fireships, and 4 Bomb-Ketches.

Warsaw, Febr. 1. The Diet of Poland have at length made
choice of the *Sieur Szembek*, the Crown Referendary, to be their
Marshal. They have also chosen 6 Deputies to go in the name of
the Republic to the King of Sweden, to desire him to withdraw
his Troops out of *Lithuania*, whose Instructions are already drawn
up and approved by the King of Poland and the Diet, and they
will begin their Journey in few days. Two of the Princes of the
Houfe of Sapieha are come hither, and the Great General of *Li-
thuania*, who is the Chief of that Family, is shortly expected, in
order to perfect the Agreement lately concluded between them and
the Considered Nobility of *Lithuania*.

Viennois, Feb. 5. This Court appear resolved to go on with the
Design of sending a Body of Horse and Foot from Prince Eugene's
Army to the Kingdom of Naples, where both the Nobility and
People are generally inclined to favour the Emperor's Interest.
Tis said, this Detachment is to consist of *Serini's* Regiment of
Dragoons, *Commerci's* and *Corbelli's* Cuirassiers, and *Mansfeld*,
Nigrelli and *Guttensteyn's* Foot, which will make together above
10000 Men. The Generals appointed to Command them are,
Prince Commerci, Count *Aversberg*, General of the Artillery;
Count *Serini*, Baron *Uhlefeld*, and Count *Guttensteyn*, Majors Ge-
neral; and in order to the Executing this Design, Count *Avers-
berg*, and the two other General Officers last mentioned, went
this Week to Italy, together with the Duke of *Theleff*, the Che-
valier *Grimaldi* his Brother, and the Marquis *Loirano*; three Nea-
opolitan Noblemen, who came hither for Refuge upon the suc-
cess of the late Attempt on the City of Naples; and intend to go
with the Imperial Troops on this Expedition: And in the room of
this Detachment, farther Reinforcements are to be sent to Italy,
to make up the Imperial Army to 50000 Men. The Secretary of
Count *Straatman*, the Emperor's Ambassador at *Warsaw*, arrived
here the 3d Instant, with the Treaty concluded there the 16th past
with the King of Poland; for 10000 Saxon Horse and Foot to en-
ter into the Emperor's Service. 'Tis said, the Bishop of *Hilde-
sheim* being so old, that there is reason to expect the Bishoprick
may suddenly become vacant, the Emperor has writ to the Elec-
tor of Hanover, to desire him to put a Garrison of his Forces in-
to that Place, to prevent its falling into the Hands of the Elec-
tor of Cologne, who is Coadjutor of the said Bishoprick.

Cologne, Febr. 14. The Emperor's *Avocataria* to the Civil and
Military Officers, Soldiers, and others, in the Elector of *Cologne's*
Service, who are born Subjects of the Empire, were published
here yesterday; as was likewise an Imperial Mandate, directed to
the Elector and his Councillors, requiring them on pain of the
Imperial Ban to quit the French Interest, and to send the pretended
Forces of the Circle of *Burgundy* out of the Bishopricks of *Cologne*
and *Liege*, and the Territories thereunto belonging. These Man-
dates from the Imperial Chancery have put the Elector's Ministers
under a great uneasiness. At the same time the Marquis of *Mon-
travel*, who commands the French Forces in these Parts, threatens
to cause the Houses of all those who shall retire from the Elector
of *Cologne's* Service without his Leave, to be burnt, and their
Estates to be ravaged. Count *Coringsek*, the Elector's High
Steward, has obtained his Dimission, and is gone to *Vienne*; and
the like has been desired by many more of the Elector's Officers,
but is not yet granted. The French have at present 3 Regiments of
Foot and 10 Squadrons of Horse very near *Bon*; and there are at
present 22 Companies of French Foot at *Meckenheim* within 3 hours
of *Bon*, and 23 at *Rheinbeck*.

Hague, Febr. 17. Orders are given for two Battalions
of the Regiment of Foot-Guards to be in a readiness to
march towards the Frontiers, and the Regiment of Horse-
Guards are so to follow them in few days; Most of the Forces
which lay in *Friseland* are in motion towards the
Rhine. The Admirals *Allemande* and *Callemberg* are return-
ed hither. Our Sea Preparations are carried on with
great diligence, and are in good forwardness.

Paris, Febr. 18. N.S. Several Couriers have arrived
here this week from Italy with farther Accounts of the
Action of *Cremona*; The Publick Relations endeavour to
disguise the Loss the French sustained; but Letters from

particular hands own they had about 2000 Men
and 60 Officers and 400 Soldiers taken Prisoners.
Marquis de *Cremona* Lieutenant General is dead of
Wounds, as is likewise the Spanish Governor of the Town.
The Marquis of *Crequi* is come nearer to the
The Forces under his Command, having quitted *Cremona*
Maggiore, and the other Places in the *Cremonese*, of which
the Germans have possessed themselves. The French Em-
