THE Examinations of the Persons concerned in the Design of Assassinating the Marquis del Vasto are taken, and the Pope has ordered them to be proceeded against with the utmost Severity. The said Marquis continues in the Imperial Ambassador's House for his Security, and 'tis said he will go with the Detachment Prince Eugene intends to send to the Kingdom of Naples; and that he has a Commission from the Emperor to command the Horse as Lieutenant General. Count Lamberg received an Express this week from Prince Eugene, upon which he had Audience of the Pope, to desire that the Germans might be supplied with Corn and other Provisions from the Ferrarrese, which the Pope has consented to, and Orders are sent accordingly to the Legate of Ferrara. Signior Fittini, the Pope's Nuncio Extraordinary to the French Court, and Signior Zandedary, who goes in the same Quality to the Court of Spain, began their respective Journeys this week. They write from Naples, that their Vice-Roy makes what Provision he can for the Defence of that Kingdom, and that he has sent away most of the Troops which were in and about Naples to strengthen the Frontier Garisons, and has given Directions to the Duke d'Atry, Governor of the Province of Abruzzo, to draw together the Militia to guard the Passes, and sent a French Engineer to view several of the Frontier Towns, and to give the necessary Orders for their being fortified; But the People grow every day more and more their Aversion to the French, and seem to wait only for a good opportunity to declare for the Emperor. The four Frigats which Count d'Estrees left behind on the Coast of Naples put to Sea the 17th past, in order to return likewise to Toulon.

Venice, Febr. 4. The Carnival is begun, and occasions the Resort of a great number of Strangers to this City. Orders are dispatched to Dalmatia, for sending over of 1500 Horse and 1000 Foot from thence to reinforce the Garrisons of Verona, and other Frontier Towns of this State. Our Preparations at Sea are continued; and to support these extraordinary Expenses several new Taxes are to be raised. According to our last Accounts from Mantua,

there happen frequent Disputes between the French Garison and the Inhabitants, and they wanted fresh Provisions and Necessaries, the Place being closely blocked up by the Germans.

From the Imperial Head Quarters at Luzzaro, Febr. 6. The 4th Instant, it was confirmed by our Intelligence, that the Enemy had abandoned their Posts on the Oglio, except Gazolo and Bozolo. Prince Eugene went to visit the Places we are Masters of on this side the Oglio, and being at Campidello, he received Advice, that the Enemy had abandoned Gazolo; He thereupon went thither, and found the Cattle as well as the Town in a very good Condition, and placed there a Garison of three Battalions. The Enemy left behind them in that Place the Boats and all the Materials they had provided for making a Bridge; as also 80 Sacks of Meal, and some Ammunition; Soon after Advice came also, that the French had abandoned Bozolo; A Party was immediately sent to know the truth of it, and it being found true, a Detachment were ordered to possess themselves of that Place; which was done accordingly, and they found there 200 Loads of Hay, as many Sacks of Meal, 30 Barrels of Gunpowder, with a proportionable quantity of Bullets, and other Ammunition. Orders were given likewise for taking Possession in the other Places that should be abandoned by the French. The 5th, we were informed, that the Enemy had quitted Casal-Maggiore, as likewise St. Martino, Torre-d'Oglio, and Viadana, and that they left in these Places a good quantity of Provisions and Ammunition. The Country People say, they cannot describe with what Contusion the Enemy after the Action of Cremona abandoned those Places. Prince Eugene returned hither this evening, having ordered a new Redoubt to be made at Torre-d'Oglio. The 6th, Prince Vaudemour sent Advice, that he had made himself Master of Bufseto, a considerable Place, where he took 152 Prisoners, most of them Irish, and found 6000 Sacks of Oats. Count Guido of Staremberg was sent from hence to view all the Places the French have abandoned. This day were brought hither 7 Standards, and two pair of Kettle-Drums, which were taken from the French in Cremona.

Vienna, Febr. 11. The Regiments of Horse of Gronsveld and Hohenzellerne, the Regiment of Solary, and another Regiment of Foot, which are all quartered in Hungary and Transylvania, are ordered to march forthwith to Italy, and more Forces will be very speedily sent thither. A great number of Pontons made of Leather, of a new Invention, very useful and light of Carriage, are sent to Italy for the use of our Forces there. Orders are given for hastening the Preparations for the Campaign on the Rhine, and particularly for providing great Magazines of Provisions and Ammunition on that side for the Service of the Imperial Forces. Adjutant General Chaveé arrived here this week from the Imperial Army in Italy, to give the Emperor an Account of the Action at Cremona; He had the Charge of conducting Marshal Villeroy to Usliano, where Prince Eugene made him

him a Visit. Marshal *Villeroy* is to be brought from thence to *Trent*, and so to *Inspruck*, and 'tis said he will afterwards be removed thither. Of the 400 *Germans* who were thought to have been killed in the Action at *Cremona*, about 150 were taken Prisoners by the *French*, who sent them back the next day with a Trumpeter, to be exchanged for a like number of *French* Prisoners.

Berlin, Febr. 18. Letters from *Warsaw* of the 8th Instant confirm the Account we had by our former Letters, of the breaking up of the Diet; and add, that things were in great disorder there, occasioned by the Advice of the King of *Sweden's* March towards *Warsaw*. 'Tis writ from *Libau* of the 11th, that the King of *Sweden* advanced towards *Poland*, and that, upon advice of a considerable Army of *Muscovites* drawing together towards the Borders of *Livonia*, it was said, a good part of the *Swedish* Army would be sent thither. Letters from *Stockholm* of the 5th Instant say, the Duke de *Croy*, who was taken Prisoner at the Battel of *Revel*, died lately in that City.

Cologne, Febr. 21. The *French* are drawing together a Body of about 20000 Men on the Lower Rhine, and it's said, the Elector of *Cologne* has received and accepted a Commission from *France* to command them. The *French* go on with building a Fort on the Rhine, over-against *Bon*; and they make Preparations at *Keyserwaer*, as if they expected a Siege. The Count d'*Arco*s, and divers other Persons of Quality, have, in compliance with the Emperor's Avocatoria, quitted the Elector of *Cologne's* Service, and most of the rest that are Subjects of the Empire intend to do the like.

Hamburg, Feb. 17. Levies are made in these Parts for the King of *Denmark's* Service, who has given Commissions for raising two new Regiments of Horse, and as many of Foot. Letters from *Warsaw* of the 7th Instant give an Account, that the six weeks, which is the usual time of the sitting of the Diet, being expired, some of the Deputies proposed the Prolongation of the Session for a few days, which the *Sieur Patz*, one of the Deputies, protested against, and departed out of the Assembly; The General of *Great Poland*, and some others of the Senators and Deputies, endeavoured to persuade him to return, and withdraw his Protest, but could not prevail; so the Diet broke up the 7th. According to the last Letters from *Courland*, the King of *Sweden* had sent Orders to *Livonia*, for all the Gentry and Militia to draw together, and post themselves on the Frontiers, to prevent the Excursions of the *Muscovites*; He had ordered about 3 or 4000 of his Forces to remain in *Courland*; and having thus provided for the Security of those two Provinces, was marched with the rest of his Forces to *Lithuania*, intending, as 'tis said, to march on to *Warsaw*; in order to which he had caused a great number of Sledges to be provided, for the more easy carriage of his Bagage and Ammunition.

Hague, Febr. 24. N. S. The Detachment of the Guards will begin their March from hence in two or three days, as 'tis thought, towards *Nimeguen*; Several of our best Engineers are ordered thither; as are likewise the Officers of the Artillery. We have Advice, of *Monfieur Coetignon's* being returned with his Squadron from the *West-Indies* to *Brest* without the *Spanish* Galeons, the Vice-Roy of *Mexico* ha-

ving refused to send them home with a *French* Squadron. They write from *Liege*, that upon some of the Magistrates of that Place shewing an Inclination to obey the Emperor's Avocatoria, the *French* Governor let them know, That if they did not entirely comply with the Elector of *Colgne's* Commands, the Town should be plundered; Like Threats were used to the States of *Liege*, who thereupon granted a Subsidy of 60000 Crowns, and promised to consent to whatever else should be demanded of them. Letters from *Italy* give an Account, that the late Action at *Cremona* has put the Affairs of the *French* in those Parts into such Disorder, that they have abandoned *Gazolo*, *Bozolo*, *St. Martino*, *Torre-d'Ossio*, and all their other Posts on the *Oglia*; as also *Viadana* and *Casal-Maggiore* on the *Po*; of which Places the *Germans* have possessed themselves. Letters from the North say, the King of *Sweden* was resolved to march with his Army directly to *Warsaw*.
