The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations are published with the approval of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, viz.:—

TEMPORARY (RECONSTRUCTION) REGULATIONS FOR FILLING VACANCIES IN THE SITUATION OF DRAUGHTSMAN IN THE SURVEY BRANCH, THE REDEMPTION COMMISSION.

1. Age

Candidates must have been born on or after 2nd August, 1915, and must be at least 19 years of age on the 1st January of the year in which they compete.

2. Sex

Both men and women are eligible.

3. Nationality

Candidates must be British subjects. They must also satisfy one of the following conditions:—

(a) If natural-born British subjects, they must either

(i) have at least one parent who is or was at death a British subject; or

(ii) have resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment;

(b) If naturalized British subjects, they must have resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment;

(c) If not qualified under (a) or (b) of this paragraph they must satisfy the Commissioners that they are so closely connected with His Majesty's dominions either by ancestry, upbringing or residence, or by reason of national service, that an exception may properly be made in their favour.

4. Health and Character

(i) Successful candidates must satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners as to their health and character.

(ii) The Commissioners reserve the right to give such preference to disabled persons or to particular classes of disabled persons as may be necessary in order to give effect to any general policy regarding the employment of such persons which may be adopted by His Majesty's Government, provided that the disability is not of a nature to interfere with the discharge of the duties of the class.

5. Examination

The subjects of examination and the marks they will carry are as follows:—

1. Drawing	300
2. Surveying	200
3. English	150
4. Arithmetic	150

Candidates must pass to the satisfaction of the Commissioners in drawing, in surveying, and in the examination as a whole.

6. Number of Attempts

No candidate may compete in more than two examinations under these regulations.

7. Candidates trained as Teachers or undergoing a course of study

(i) No person who is undergoing a course of study with the aid of a grant from public funds shall be eligible to compete under these Regulations before the completion of the course, unless he or she has previously obtained permission to do so from the authority which administers the grant.

(ii) Candidates who have been trained as teachers and upon whose training public money has been spent, cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate central education authority (e.g., the Ministry of Education, the Scottish Education Department, the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland) has been notified to the Civil Service Commissioners.

8. Fee

A fee of 5s. is payable by all candidates on admission to the examination.

The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations are published with the approval of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, viz.:—

REGULATIONS RESPECTING OPEN COMPETITIVE EXAMINATIONS FOR THE GRADE OF FEMALE SORTING ASSISTANT IN THE GENERAL POST OFFICE.

These regulations are liable to alteration from time to time.

1. Age

Candidates must be at least 15 and under 17 years of age on 1st April, 1947.

BUT Candidates who have served in any established post to which they were admitted with the certificate of the Civil Service Commissioners may deduct from their actual age any time not exceeding two years which they may have spent in such service before 1st April, 1947.

2. Nationality

Candidates must be British subjects. They must also satisfy one of the following conditions:—

(a) If natural-born British subjects, they must either

(i) have at least one parent who is or was at death a British subject; or

(ii) have resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment;

(b) If naturalized British subjects, they must have resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment;

(c) If not qualified under (a) or (b) of this paragraph they must satisfy the Commissioners that they are so closely connected with His Majesty's dominions either by ancestry, upbringing or residence, or by reason of national service, that an exception may properly be made in their favour.

3. Health and Character

Successful candidates must satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners as to their health and character.

4. Height

Candidates must be at least five feet in height without shoes.

5. Residence

Candidates must live with their parents or guardians within easy daily travelling distance of an office at which Sorting Assistants are employed, i.e., in the London Postal Area or not far outside it, or at Harrogate, or at Morecambe. The Post Office may refuse to appoint a candidate who, although successful in the examination, does not satisfy them that she fulfils this regulation.
