THE unspeakable Loss which these Kingdoms have sustained,  
by the deceas of the Heroick and Magnanimitous Prince  
William the Third, (our late Glorious Monarch and Deliverer)  
could not but deeply affect our Minds with dark and melancholy  
Loves.

*But since these black Clouds are entirely dispersed; by Your Majesty's ascending the Throne of these Your Kingdoms; we humbly crave Leave to express the Joy in: S it is joy that we received thenceupon, by a most hearty Congratulation of Your Sacred Majesty upon Your Accession to these Your Crowns.*

Our Majestys late most Gracious Declaration in Council hath  
demonstrated to the whole World, that the preservation of our  
Religion, our Laws, and our Liberties at home, and the Liberty of  
all Europe abroad, were the sole Ends which your Majesty de-  
signed, in taking upon You the Government of these Kingdoms.

We therefore humbly beg Leave to assure Your Majesty, That  
noising shall be wanting on our Parts, which may be expected  
from the most Loyal, most Dutiful, and most Grateful Subject,  
that may contribute to the Ease, Safety, and Security of Your  
Majesty's Royal Person and Government; And that those Arms  
wherein we are intrusted, shall always be ready in our Hands,  
and directed by our hearts, for Support and Defence of the  
same, against the Power of France, the pretended Prince of  
Wales, (the Instrument by him set up to disturb Your Quiet)  
and all other Invaders of Your Majesty's Right.

The following Address was presented to Her Majesty by the Hon. *Maurice Ashley* Esq; one of the Representatives in Parliament of the County of *Wiltshire*, being introduced by the Rt. Hon. the Earl of *Pembroke* and *Montgomery* Lord High Admiral of *England*, and Lord Lieutenant of the said County.

*To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.*  
The humble Address of the High Sheriff, Grand Jury, Justices  
of the Peace, and other Gentlemen of the County of Wilts,  
met and assembled at the Assizes for the said County, at the  
City of New Sarum; on the Eleventh Day of March, 1701.  
in the First Year of Your Majesty's Reign.

May it please Your Majesty,  
YOur Majeſty's Succession to the Crown of England being ſo  
well ſecured, ſeems by a wise Precaution to have been in-  
tended to avert the great affliction befalling this Nation in  
the Death of our late Sovereign King William the Third, of ever-  
blessed Memory, which we cannot mention but with the moit ſen-  
ſitive Grief, demonſtrating how dear and warraue to us our  
Crown'd Heads are.

But whilst we regret so great a Loss, we also beg Leave to Congratulate Your Majesty's happy Accession to the Throne, and to declare our entire Satisfaction therein, promising Your Majesty our ready and cheerful Concurrence, with all assurances which are or shall be given Your Majesty by the Representative Body of Your People for the Support of Your Government, whereby to enable Your Majesty to render Your Reign Great and Glorious and Your Subjects truly Happy; And we hope, that Providence hath reserved the Honour for Your Majesty, to put a stop to the Exorbitant Power of France, as Queen Elizabeth (of Glorious Memory) did heretofore to the Ambitious Designs of Spain; To which purpose we pray, That all the Blessings of Heaven may ever attend Your Royal Person and Government.
