(3) If, pursuant to the last preceding paragraph, the said parsonage house be sold by us as aforesaid so much of the net proceeds of the sale as after con-sultation with the Bishop of the said diocese we shall deem sufficient shall be applied towards the cost of the modernisation and improvement of the paragraph the modernisation and improvement of the parsonage house of the united benefice in accordance with plans to be approved by us or by Queen Anne's Bounty. Provided that, pending completion of the said works of modernisation and improvement, the interest up to an annual sum of froo in respect of the net proceeds of sale shall be paid by us to the incumbent of the united benefice of the united benefice.

(b) upon the union taking effect or upon the cesser of the pension of £161 per annum now charged upon the revenues of the benefice of Lenton in favour of the Reverend Canon George Bass Vessey (whichever date shall be the later), the endowments specified in Part II of the said Schedule - Schedule,

Schedule, being in each case present endowments of the benefices of Lenton and Ingoldsby and in considera-tion of the said transfers we shall make from time to time such grants as we may deem appropriate in augmentation or endowment of benefices in the said diocese. Provided that, if the parsonage house of Ingoldsby be not sold under the Parsonages Measure, then pending modernisation and improvement as aforesaid of the parsonage house of the united benefice, such grant shall first be made by us from time to time to the incumbent of the united benefice as will amount together with any interest paid to him under paragraph 3 of this Scheme to an annual sum ξ_{TOO} . sum £100.

5. Patronage. After the union has taken effect the right of presentation to the united benefice shall be exercised by the patrons of the two benefices alternately, the patron of the benefice of Lenton having the first presentation to the united benefice to be made after the union.
