The following Address from the Protestant Dissenting Ministers in the City of Dublin, and the South of Ireland, was presented to Her Majesty by His Excellency the Earl of Rochester Lord Lieutenant of Ireland.

To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Protestant Dissenting Ministers in the City of Dublin, and the South of Ireland.

May it please Your Majesty,

WE Your Majesties most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, do with the deepest Sorrow Consider that unspeakable Loss which these Kingdoms have sustained by the death of our late Excellent King, a Prince, whose incomparable Virtues, and truly Glorious Actions, render'd him the delight of all his Protestant Subjects, the Refuge and Protector of the whole Reformed Interest, and the Guardian of the Liberties of Europe, and will transmit his Name with the highest Honour to all succeeding Ages.

And yet under so afflictive a Calamity in so important a Juncture of Affairs, we cannot but adore the Goodness of Almighty God, who has preserved to us a Protestant Prince to succeed him, who under the strongest Temptations to the contrary, has shewn so unshaken a Constancy in the Profession of our holy Religion; And we do with the most loyal Affection Congratulate your Majesties happy Accession to the Throne, and assure You of our inviolable Fidelity, in opposition to all the Enemies of your Crown.

And now that the most high God, by whom Princes Reign, may inspire your Majesty with Wisdom and Courage in the defence of the Common Cause of England and her Allies, and give you the Honor of finishing that Glorious design, which our late King had enter'd upon, of Curbing the exorbitant Power of France, and of Restoring the Balance of Europe; That your Majesties Throne may be established in Righteousness, by the Suppression of Prophaneness and Vice, and the Encouragement of Piety and Virtue; That the Justice and Clemency of all your Administrations may give you the Advantage, and Pleasure of Reigning in the very hearts of your Subjects; And that the Glories of your long and prosperous Reign, may far out-shine those of the greatest Princes that ever sway'd the English Scepter. These are, May it please your Majesty, the sincere and ardent Wishes of Your Majesties, most Humble, most Obedient Subjects and Servants.

Which Address Her Majesty was pleas'd to receive very Graciously, and to Assure them of Her Protection.

From the Imperial Head Quarters at Luzzara, March 13. N. S. The 13th we received advice, that the French and Spanish Generals had held a great Council of War at Pavia; after which, the Duke of Vendosme went to Lodi, where a considerable Body of French Forces was drawing together, which, as we were informed the next day, is to consist of above 20 Regiments of Horse and Foot. The 15th an Account came from the

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the Blockade of Mantua. That 1000 French sallied out of that place, and attacked a Tower called *Tosfo*, in which were posted a Lieutenant of the Regiment of *Lichtenfeyn* with 40 Soldiers, who defended themselves with great Resolution, till the French having set fire to the Tower, they were put under a Necessity of surrendering or being burnt. The 16th, upon Advice that the French Forces continued their Preparations in *Pavia* and *Lodi*, Orders were sent to all the Imperial Regiments to be in a Readiness. The 17th Count *Meret*, who was exchanged for one of the French General Officers taken at *Cremona*, being recovered of his Wounds, arrived here from that City. We had an Account, That all the Enemy's Successes were arrived from France, consisting of 25000 Foot, besides the Horse. The 18th Count *Trautsmansdorf*, who commands the Blockade of Mantua, sent Letters to Prince *Engene*, confirming the Account of the Action at the Tower of *Tosfo*, and adding, That the French had 25 Soldiers killed, and a Colonel and 30 Soldiers wounded, and that the Germans had but 4 Men killed: He writ likewise, That our Men behaved themselves with so much Bravery, that Count *Tesse*, who commands the French in Mantua, sent a Trumpeter to him with a Compliment upon it. The 19th the *Sieur Mongon*, who was taken by the Germans in the Action of *Cremona*, and remained there upon Parole, came hither and surrendered himself. We received an Account, That the Reinforcement of Horse the Enemy have lately received from France consists of Eight Squadrons of Gen'd'Armes, Four of Carabiniers, Six of Dragoons, and 12 of other Horse. They continue to draw their Forces together near *Lodi*.

Vienna March 29. N. S. The Secretary of Count *Lewesteyn*, the Emperor's Envoy, arrived here this day from *Nordlingen*, and brings an Account, That the Circles of *Franconia*, *Swabia* and the *Upper Rhine*, and the Electoral Circle of the *Rhine*, are entered into an Association Offensive and Defensive with the Circle of *Austria*, and that they are very willing to enter into the Grand Alliance on certain Conditions, which are laid before the Emperor for his Approbation. The *Sieur Maret*, the French Secretary left here by the Marquis de *Villars*, has received Orders from the French Court, to propose a Cartel to be made between the Imperialists and the French, for the Exchange of the Prisoners taken in *Italy*. Count *Albeim* went from hence this Morning to *Innsbruck*, to remove Marshal *Villeroi* from that place to *Gratz* in *Syria*. The Prince *della Maccchia*, one of the Noblemen concerned in the late Rising at *Naples*, who made his Escape to the Imperial Army in *Italy*, arrived here from thence some days ago. Several Persons of Quality, who are to attend the King of the *Romans* during the Campaign, are preparing their Equipage with all possible expedition. The Imperial Forces which are to serve on the *Rhine*, continue their March, as do likewise the Reinforcements ordered to *Italy*.

Berlin, April 4. The King of *Prussia*, upon the Death of His late Majesty of *Great Britain*, has taken the Stiles of Prince of *Orange*, Count of *Lingen*, *Meurs*, *Buburn*, and *Lehrdam*, Marquis of *Bibere*, and *Bliffingen*, and Lord of *Breda*; and has resolved to take a Journey to *Cleves*. Letters from *Libau* in *Cowland* of the 28th Instant say, a Detachment of the Swedish Forces in *Lithuania* being sent to attack a Body of the Confederated Nobility, who were posted under the Command of the *Sieur Oginsky* at a Place called *Wyckum*, the latter retired with great Precipitation to the Frontiers of *Muscovy*, and the Swedes were marching in pursuit of them. A Body of 6000 Swedes was sent to *Wilda*, to demand Contributions of that City. Those Letters make no mention of the Ambassadors of the Republick of *Poland*, who, 'tis therefore supposed, were not yet come to the Swedish Camp.

Frankfort, April 5. Count *Nassau Weylburg*, General of the Electoral Palatine's Horse, Count *Pahlen*, and several other Officers of Note, are at present in this City; and have given directions for their Equipage to be got ready, in order to their taking the Field by the month of *May*. The Imperial Horse which were quartered near the *Rhine*, continue to draw together in the Neighborhood of *Philippsburg*, and will be joined in a day or two by a Regiment of Dragoons of 800 men, which the Bishop of *Wurzburg* has put into the Emperor's Service. The Forces which the Circles of *Austria*, *Swabia*, *Franconia*, and the Upper and Lower *Rhine*, have agreed to furnish for supporting the Common Cause, will shortly begin to march towards their several Rendezvous. The Fortifications of *Spires* are almost finish'd, and a Bridge of Boats is building near that Place over the *Rhine*.

Cologne, April 7. The Prince of *Nassau Saarbruck*, Monsieur *Doff*, and several other General Officers, in the Service of the States General, came two days ago from *Dusseldorp* to *Mulheim*, about two Leagues from hence, near which place 7 Dutch Regiments of Horse, and 6 of Foot, are encamp'd, having with them a Train of heavy Artillery, and several Regiments of Horse and Foot more are expected there; 'tis thought they design to attack the Fort the French have lately built near the *Rhine* over against *Ben*. The French wanting Boats and other Materials to finish the Bridge they had begun to make over the *Rhine* at *Keiserstaart*,

they have quite demolish'd it. The Bridge which the Elector of *Saxony* has ordered to be built at *Dusseldorp*, is very near finish'd. The French Garrisons at *Zons* and *Nuy* are changed so often, that it cannot be easily known how strong they are. They write from *Munster*, that the Bishop of that place has given orders for 4 Regiments of his Forces to be in a readiness to march, which, 'tis said, he intends to put into the Service of the States General.

Hamburgh, April 7. We have an account from *Brunswick* that there is at present a Difference between the two Dukes of *Wolfenbuttle*; that Duke *Rudolphus*, the Elder Brother, appears enclined to quit his Engagements with France; But his Brother Prince *Anthony* continues of an other mind. Our last Letters from the Swedish Army say, one of their Parties had defeated a strong Party of the *Sieur Oginsky's* Forces; that they killed divers of them, and took several Prisoners, with 4 peices of Cannon. The Swedish Forces in *Pomerania* are drawing together near *Stetin*, and are to be joynd by the Troops of the Duke of *Holslein*, who have Orders to march in 14 Day.

Hannover, April 7. The Elector of *Hannover* returned hither yesterday from *Engdorf*. The King of *Prussia* arrived here this day from *Berlin*, and intends, after having passed a day or two at this Court, to continue his Journey towards *Cleves*. The Elector of *Hannover*, and the Duke of *Cell*, have sent two of their Ministers to *Brunswick*, to treat with Duke *Rudolphus* of *Wolfenbuttle* concerning an Accommodation: But Duke *Anthony* his Brother shews hitherto no inclination to quit the French Interest. Monsieur *Fuchs* the King of *Prussia's* Minister is also gone thither, to endeavor to forward this Negotiation. In the mean time the Town of *Brunswick* is blockt up by the Forces of *Hannover* and *Cell*, and they raise Contributions in the Country of *Wolfenbuttle*.

Brussels, April 10. An Express arrived here yesterday from the Lower *Rhine*, with an account, that the Hostilities are already begun on that side by the Forces of the Allies; and that a Detachment of 3000 Men marched the 7th Instant from the Dutch Camp at *Mulheim* to *Stegberg*, not far from *Bon*, on the other side the *Rhine*, with a design, as 'tis believed, to attack the Fort lately built by the French on that River over against *Bon*. Upon these advices several orders have been given for the French and Spanish Forces to advance towards the Frontiers. The Regiments of French and Swiss Foot Guards, and the Horse which were quartered here, marched this morning to *Dieff*, and the Battalion of *Havre* is marched to *Zuerwey*; and a Regiment of Horse is sent to *Lierre*.

Hague, April 11. The States General having resolv'd to return an Answer to the Memorial presented to them the 31st past by Monsieur *Barre* the French Resident, the same was delivered to him on the 9th Instant, as follows.

That their H. and M. Lordships do always enough remember that happy time, in which their Republick was in a strict Confederacy with the Crown of France, being then united together by mutual Interests; That they have never done any Thing which might occasion any Change or Alteration therein; But that, to their great Regret, they have not been able to have the Honour to continue in the Affection of His said Majesty, as they have been in that of his Predecessors, of Glorious Memory, although they have always highly esteem'd his Friendship, and have given Proofs of their doing so upon every occasion, as much as could be expected and desired from a Free and Sovereign Republick; That their H. and M. Lordships have likewise constantly endeavour'd to contribute all they were able to the Preservation of the General Peace, provided they might have a reasonable Security for their State: And what they have done both before and after the Decesse of the late King of Spain, to attain to so good an End, is sufficiently known, in so much that they are well assured, that their good and sincere Intentions have appeared to the Eyes of all the World: But the Negotiation begun for finding out proper Means (if possible) to preserve the General Peace, having been broke off, by the recalling of the *Sieur Count d'Arville*, Ambassador Extraordinary from His said Majesty; And their H. and M. Lordships being in no wise secure of the Good-will of his said Majesty; seeing also their Barrier possess'd by his Troops, the Preparations for War on their Frontiers augmented daily, their State surrounded, and as it were, blockt up on every side, and the Efforts that have been used to shut it up entirely, as well as to deprive them of their Friends, they found themselves under a Necessity to Arms, likewise on their side, to put themselves into a Posture of Defence, to ask the Assistance of their Friends and Allies, and to enter into such other Engagements with them as they found necessary for their mutual Defence and Security; That their H. and M. Lordships do at present see clearly enough, by the said Memorial, that the Precautions they have taken are neither useless nor superfluous, since it does thereby appear, That his said Majesty is resolv'd upon a War, and stays only for a proper Season to put his numerous Armies upon Action; That as their H. and M. Lordships cannot see how they are guilty of casting any Reproaches upon his said Majesty, as they are charg'd with in the said Memorial, so they do not think they have deserv'd to be tax'd, as they are therein, with several Things; in regard to which they have asked with

all the Moderation that can be desired of a Republick that loves Peace and Quiet, having done nothing but what they have been forced to do for their own Defence, and what they can warrant by all manner of Right; so that they can justify the same before all reasonable Men. The Situation of Affairs being such, their H. and M. Lordships do not see of what use it would be to send any body to his Majesty, or for his Majesty to do them the Honour to send an Ambassador hither, since their H. and M. Lordships, by the Alliances which they have been obliged to make for their Defence and Security, are engaged not to enter upon any particular Negotiation; That they being used to observe their Alliances exactly, they are now no longer at Liberty to treat but in Conjunction with their Allies; And indeed the General Peace, which ought to be the Subject of this Negotiation, cannot be preserved without them. For what remains, their H. and M. Lordships are very much surpris'd to see that this whole Memorial seems founded upon this, That they are now more at Liberty to take such Resolutions as they think expedient than formerly; That doubtless this has Reference to the Death of His Majesty the late King of Great Britain, of Immortal Memory: Bur herein the said Sieur, Resident, has extremely deceiv'd himself, for want of understanding the Constitution of their Government: That he ought to know, That their H. and M. Lordships have heretofore had as much Liberty as a present to debate, and to take all such Resolutions as they judged necessary and useful for the Good and Preservation of their State. It is true they cannot enough deplore their Misfortune, to see themselves deprived of the Direction and Conduct of a Prince whose Wisdom, Moderation, and Valour, will be famed as long as the World endures; A Prince whose Heroick Actions, and whose Merits from this Republick will never be forgot, and in a Word, whose Death is lamented in this Country by all Persons whatsoever, from the meanest to the highest; That the Councils of His said Majesty having never had any other Aim both in Deed and in Word, than the Preservation of their Liberty and Religion; And their H. and M. Lordships being entirely convinced of this Truth, as having found the Benefit thereof; They are resolv'd to follow the same Principles, and not to depart from the Alliances contracted during the Life of His said Majesty, but to persist in the Measures taken pursuant to those Alliances; and, in short, to make use at all times of the Means God has put into their hands for the maintaining of their Liberty and Religion.

Upon the Receipt of this Answer the Resident immediately dispatched an Express to the French Court. The Earl of Marlborough had a Conference this afternoon with the Deputies of the States, and is to have another to-morrow; His Excellency intends to go from hence next Friday in order to embark for England if the Wind be fair. The Town of Keyserwert was invested the 7th Instant by the Forces of the Allies, and the Trenches were to be opened this day; and an Account is come, that the Allies had already attacked some of the French Guards that were posted near the Rhine.

Paris, April 11. N. S. On Monday last the French King received Advice from the Lower Rhine, that the Troops of the Elector Palatine had fired upon the French Forces near Bonn; which is looked upon here as the beginning of the War on that side. An Express arriv'd some days ago from Wolfenbuttel, which was soon after sent back; 'Tis very much feared here that those Princes will be forced to quit their Engagements with this Crown. The last Courier from Italy brings Letters of the 4th Instant from the French Camp at Pontenurs, which advise, that the Duke de Vendesme had caus'd a good quantity of Provisions to be brought together at Cremona for the use of the French Forces; but that he did not seem to have an Intention of advancing as yet towards the Dutchy of Modena; And on the other hand the Imperialists did not appear to be much alarm'd at the March of the French Forces, seeing they continu'd very quiet in their Quarters, and kept their Posts about Mantua. A Detachment of the Imperialists was posted behind the River Lenza, and the Duke of Modena has assist'd them with 6000 Men of his Militia to guard the Passage of that River. Here has been a Report, That Count Tefse, who commands at Mantua, had beaten a strong Party of Germans near Marnir lo, and that of the latter 500 were killed, wounded, and taken, and that Count Tefse himself and his Son were wounded; but the last Letters from the French Camp making no mention thereof, little Credit is given to it. They write from Rome, that the Definitive Sentence of Death against the Marquis del Vasto had been published there; And that a certain Frenchman having been ill treated by some of the Servants of the Imperial Ambassador, Cardinal Fanson and the Spanish Ambassador had Arr'd a good number of Men, and had acquainted the Pope that they would fight themselves; Whereupon the Emperor's Ambassador put himself into a Posture to oppose them; so that a kind of a War seem'd ready to break out between the Imperialists and the French and Spaniards in the City of Rome.

Morpeth, March 27. The High Sheriff of the County of Northumberland, upon the receipt of a Letter from the Lords of Her Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council with the sorrowful News of His late Majesty's Death, and D-

rections for Proclaiming Her most sacred Majesty Queen A N N E, immediately summoned the Bayliffs of this Corporation, and together with them, the other Officers, and other Inhabitants, being present, caus'd Her said Majesty to be Proclaim'd accordingly with great Solemnity at the Publick Crois, and also at two other places in this Corporation: After which they drank Her Majesties Health, and the day ended with ringing of Bells, and repeated Acclamations of Joy. He caus'd the like Solemn Proclamation to be made at Alnwick; the Chamberlains and Chief Magistrates of that Town, with a great many others, being present. The like at Hexham, the Chief Bayliff and other the Officers of that liberty, together with a great many others, being present. And the like at the respective Towns of Wooler, Rothbury, Warkworth, and Bellingham, being present at several of these Places to see the same performed.

St. James's, April 5. His Excellency the Earl of Marlborough returned this day from Holland.
