Harwich, March 20.

He Success and Truc-love sailed hence this morn-The Garland and Marmaid intend to go out to morrow. The Centurion and Welcome are fitting out, and will speedily be ready for the

On Sunday last passed by us towards the North, about 100r 12 Sail, one or more of them Men of War, and convoy to the rest. Towards the Evening a Gun was fired by one of them in Oufly-Bay; the next morning they were gone out of our fight.

Deal, March 20. Last night the Society brought in here a Dutch prize laden with Wines, which she chaced under the Castle of Deep, who fired many Guns, the French coming down in multitudes with what arms they had in her defence; but some Guns fired from the ship, quickly dispersed them, who were willing for their own lafety to luffer the prize to be quietly brought of.

Lyme, March 21. Yesterday Captain Alford with two Barks of this Town laden with Lockerams from Fersey and Guernferscame in hither with several other Merchants, under the convoy of the Richmond, bound for other Ports. They tell us that the French King bath prohibited any English Drapery to be

brough into his Dominions, on pain of death.

Plymouth, March 19. The Elizabeth hath taken feveral, prizes laden with Wine and Salt, but pretend to be Hamburghers; one of them is in Falmouth, the other the brought, into this Port.

The Nightingale hath likewise sent in four prizes into Falmouth with the same lading and pretences.

Yesterday the Seriings brought in a prize with French Wines, having taken another of 30 Guns, and about 500 Tun, with Salt and Wine from St. Lucar, but pretends to be a Spaniard, and by contrary winds is driven into Torbay.

Venice, March 2. The Soldiery raised in the Territories of the Church of Rome, are marched to Ancona, where they are to be mixed with 6000 old Venetian Soldiers, and then to be transported into Candia; upon which place, this Republick bends its whole force, endeavoring to eject the Turks, who are in that Island, especially at Canca where they are reduced to great streights. Ten Ships with all sorts of Provisions, and 400 fresh Soldiers from hence with recruits, are ready to fet fail thither with the next fair wind.

A Veilel from Cataro informs us, that the Turks have had lately a great mutiny, that proceeded so high, that coming to blows, an hundred Turks were flain.

Zwoll, March 17. Here is a fresh prohibition published against the exporting of Wines, Brandies, Beer, Barley, Cheese, or any such like provisions, upon pain of confiscation, except as much only as shall be judged necessary for the supply of the inhabitants round about.

Rome, Feb. 28. The Cardinal Conti in consequence of his promotion, hath refigned up the Government of the City into the hands of the Pope, who bestowed it upon the Sieur forromeo, who the same time had his Oath given him by his Holiness; who hath likewise conferred the charge of Auditor General, vacant by the promotion of Cardinal Paluzzi, upon the Sieur Caracciolo; and on the Sieur Bonacorfi, that of Treasurer General, late in the hands of Cardinal Corfini; and on the Sieur Ravizza, that of Secretary to the Council, the employment which Cardinal Rasponi formerly enjoyed.

St. Germain en Laye, March 26. On the 21 instant, the King gave audience to a Chiaoux, sent by the King and Bassa of Tunis, for the radification of the Treaty made with them by the Duke de Beaufors, in His Majesties name for the freedom of Commerce, and the mutual release of prisoners and flaves. The Sieur Bonneuil (according to the duty of his place) introducing him: the 22 he gave audience to the Enveye of the Duke of Wirtemberg, whom the Sieur de Bonneuil attended in the Kings Coach. The Popes Nuntiokad likewife his on the 24 instant.

Raab, Feb. 26. The Count Palassi Imbre renders himself every day more and more confiderable and formidable to thefe who have order to reduce him, especially to the Palatine of Hungary, whole Countrey he particularly threatens. But his Troops (being onely composed of Vag. bonds, and perions without interest or power, not easily disciplined) we hope, without much trouble, will be reduced. He hath had some private conferences with the Bassa of Erfa, of whom he demanded protection, and a place of retreat in Transilvania; for which, he was offered a Castle conveniently scituated; but the Palatine hath so powerfully represented it to the Bassa, as a thing that would infinitely disgust the Ottoman Court, as being a manifest breach of the Alliance between the two Empires, that he hath promised not to give him any assistance.

Paris, March 26. The French King, the better to put an end to the differences between the Parliament and Clergy of France, hath given order to these latter to produce what they have to shew for their Rights and Privileges; and what their pretentions are to a precedency, which is the point in dispute.

The Mint is employed in coyning a new money, which (we talk ) shall be called Cavallo.

The Duke Mazarine is at the last dismissed from the charge he had of being Great Master of the Artillery; The King, as they lay, having in recompence divided the Admiralty into two parts, and made him Admiral of the Ocean, with permission to bear in his Standard the Armes of Britagne.

The Parliament of Rollen has committed fix Curates to prison, they being discovered to have had several private meetings and affemblies, in order to a Reformation in Religi-A Priest and one woman are sent likewise to the Bastile, being found over buse upon the account of Religion, with a design to have followed Mr. de Pompone into Swedeland, there to propagate their new opinion.

The Cardinal Urfini lately took his leave of their Man jesties at St. Germanes, to return to Rome, to whom the King at his farewel, shewed all his Family in Armes: towards the carrying on of his Warrs, the King has been forced to take Five hundred thousand Livers intended to have been laid out in building the Louvre.

Paris, Ditto. We heare from Liege, that the Elector of Cologne has received a present from the Marquis de Cassel Rodrigo, of seven Mules laden with Silver, Plate, and several rarities of great value, which gives no small jealousie of their intentions to this Court; the King being so very zealous against the Bishop of Munster, that by his Envoye, he tells all the Princes of the Rhine, as we are made to believe here, that he shall declare himself an Enemy to any Prince or State, that shall give him affistance in this War.

The Priest sent to the Bastile, is supposed to be the Sieur de Villars, a revolted Jesuite; he hath had the question ordinary and extraordinary, to force him to a confession, having (as the report is here) leveral pieces found about him, in favor of the English against France; with the pattentions of the King of England to this Crown, as also a Letter of intelligence and correspondency of some Frontier Town of ours with England.

Highress the Duke of Brandenburgh, hoth his last Audience in order to his return. Hannibal Schefieds hath had private conference with the King, he and Mr. Bunninghen being observed frequently together, and in great intimacy.

Here high been much stir about the four differning Bishops, against whom the Popes Nuncia lately brought to the King a Brief of Interdiction, desiring him likewise to the his authority for the putting it in execution: All means possible are made the of to bring them to submission, and to this purpose a Formulaire is drawn up, which they are desired to sign: They began if fit to press in upon the Bishop of Ang. ar, but he recolvet, as the rest likewise do, to suffer all the rigors of their Bulls, rather then subscribe in. An Assembly of the Cergy hat a been held several days about this affair, but the King hath sent to press them to a result, and to press a day for their dissolution within sisteen days after his Message. He hath nominated 4 Archbishops, 4 Counsellors of State, and 4 of the Parliament, to advise with him about this Brief against those Bishops who refuse to sign the Formulaire. The Chancellor, as is said, having already advised him, to desire the Pope to lend his Ball, and so to proceed to nominate new Bishops in their rooms.

St. Omer, March 18. The States of Arton some daies since assembled in the great place of this City, where a Theatre was crefted for that Ceremony, in the midst of it was placed the Portrayture of the King of Spaine, under a Cloth of State 2, the P. esident of the Counsell for that Province, according to the Commission received from the Marquist de Castel Rodrigo, sware in the hands of the Bishop, in the name of his Catholick Majesty, to observe their Privileizes, and then took an Oath of Obedience from the Bishop, in behalf of those States, which was performed with the siring of their Cannon, and the usual Acclamations, afterwards they were treated in the Town-house, and the next day by the Count St. Veraux, the Governor, who threw amongs the people several pieces of money; concluding the Ceremony with an entertainment of Fireworks.

Munster, March 23. The Conferences here between his Highness of this place, and the Deputies of the Elector of Brandenburgh have ended in this, That a meeting he appointed about the beginning of the next moneth in some convenient place, for the consulting about the common peace and security of this Circle of the Empire: To which, they are satisfied of his Highmesses perfect inclinations; and that it hath been by great necessary, and after the abuse of a long and suffering patience, that he hath been obliged by way of Arms to do himself justice upon his Neighbors. However his Highmess hath declared be cannot conclude any thing in relation to the present War, without the participation and consent of his Allies.

Bruxelles, March 20. On the 18 instant, the Duke de Verazuas, formerly Camp-Master General of the Armies in the Low Countryes, left this City to return into Spain, where he is to enter upon the command of the Sea forces of his Catholick Majesty, void by the Death of the Duke d'Avero: the Marquis de Cassel Rodrigo, and all the Nobility of this City aecompanying him out of Town.

Hazue, March 25. The Sieur Beverning tells us what success the Elector of Brandenburghs Mediation with the Bishop hath hitherto had, that it hath onely produced a meeting to be had the next moneth between the Princes of the Circle of Westphalia; which we are much dis-satisfied here to finde the Elector so easily accept of, judging by all these delays, it is not in earnest he intends to espouse our Alliance; and therefore order is given to Beverning to represent to him the necessary of present action upon the enemy, ere his fresh recruits, which we are told, are very forward, and the season of the year prevent us in the advantages we promised our selves against him from that Electors forces. We have not yet sound the effects of the great Deputation from Zealand, a sew days will show them: In the mean time, it is observed, the propose every where begin to speak factiously for the Prince; and indeed it is seared, how in reason or policy to our own quier, the Propositions said to be made in his savor, can be resulted, or wholly laid aside at this time.

The Mediation of this Elector at Manifer, together with the joynt Application of the Elector of Colon, the Duke of Newborgh, and the Duke of Franfwick Wolfenbuttel, have at last inclined the Bishop to agree, that a meeting shall be had about the beginning of next moneth, between the Princes of this Circle of the Empire, 2: Dortmands, for the deliberating further of what concerns the peace and good of this rant of the Empire, which they are lensible is already much distracted, and may, if a timely union prevent it not, be in a much further danger from some of our Foreign Neighbors, who they suspect are not forry for this occasion of bringing a force into the Empire.

The Sieur de Blumenthal, our Envoyé to the Flench King, is daily expected back; by whom we are to be further instructed of the intentions and defires of that Court, in the profecution of this Summers War.

Portus Weymouth, Mirch 21. Here arrived the nineteenth two Vessels from the Isle of Guernsey, viz. The Providence of Weymo th, laden with Fruit, and a French Vessels from S. Miloes with Linnen Cloth, having for their convoyate Guernsey Flegat when they came out, but being separated by stoom, the Frovidence within two Leagues of Portland was chaced by a Flench Sloop, but out sailed him. The St. Miloes man reports, that the people about these pans murmul exceedingly at the war with England, and avoid all they can possibly the affishance of the Dutch; the Scamen resusing the service of their Merchants, and these that have any stocks on ship-board, taking care to withdraw them.

Portsmo.th, March 22. The Deptsord Fregat met with a Vessel not far from Guernsey, which she took and brought into the Isle of Wight: She is laden with Wines for Bourdeaux, and as the Master presends, is bound for Ostend.

Bristol, March 17. Captain Wood hath raised lately in these parts two hundred stout and able Scamen for Lis Majesties service, and went almost a week since from hence with them: they were very willing to serve in the employment, and a great part of them (by reason of the numbers that feely offered themselves) so earnest to be listed, that they employed and made friends to the Captain to accept them.

Burton, March 19. Cap. Pool, who with his Fregat, was ordered to ly upon the Coasts of this Country for their security; coming lately in his Long-boar to the Town of Shoreham, in his absence, his Lieutenant discovered a Shallop, which he presently made up to, and after some dispute,

boarded and took, with a great many French.

Harwich, March 24. Yesteriay sayled from hence the Mermaid and the Success: the last night came in the Black-Eagle Offering, Convoy to any ships that were bound Northwards. These Coasts have been of late, and still are very clear from Pickaroons.

On Thursday last was lanched at Tarmouth, a Fish Rate Fregat, called the Sweepstakes, which by the judgment of all Soamen that have seen her, is the best ship of her Rate that hath been seen.
