Lyme, Iuly 3. '

The 3 instant put in here the Merchants Adventure of this place from Morlaix, but is fraught for Southampton; the next day arrived the Tane of this place also from Morlaix, but with Little other advice belides the continuance of the French pres parations for the encrease of their Fleet and Naval strength, with her came out from thence two ships of London; one of Briftol, and one from Exeter, all of them proceeding for their respective Ports.

Deal, Iuly 4. Within these three days arrived about 14 Tail of Merchant ships in the Downs homewards bound, and amongst them three from Smirna and Zant, and one

thip of Zante bound for Amsterdam.

Naples, June 17. The Count de Vivonne with his Fleet of Gallies has appeared before this Port and received the Compliments of the Vice-roy, and after a little stay went

off again to lea intending for Messida.

The Vice-roy having intelligence that several of the Corfairs of Barbary have been lately upon the Coast, plying about the feas to the great interruption of Commerce, and had taken two Tarrans laden with Merchants Goods to I considerable value, within view of Sardignia, has ordered a squadron of his Gallies to be fitted out to sea to secure the Merchants, and put a stop to these depredations. A Bark arriving here yesterday in the morning from Ifiria informs us, that on Sunday morning last were discovered from thence a Fleet of about 40 fail making with a fair wind for the Levant, supposed to be part of the French fuccors deligned for Candia.

From Sardignia we are told that the infurrection is there appealed, and the true Authors and Actors of the death

of the Marquis Lutani discovered.

Madrid, fune 19. According to the Agreement lately made with Don fuan of Austria, Her Majesty the Queen Regent has been pleased to order the necessary dispatches to be issued out, investing him with the Title of Vicar General of the Kingdom of Arragon, which the gave into the hands of Monsegnior Borromeo, the Patriarch of Alexandria, the Popes Nuncio residing in this Court, who immediately sent them away by one of his Gentlemen to Don Juan, who received them with many expressions of his gractitude to the Queen, to whom he writ a Letter expressing the great sence he had of the Queens kindness, and his readiness to serve her on all occasions. He yesterday depasted from Guadalaxara, intending to relide at Saragossa, and has received the Complements of the Sate and Clergy by persons deputed for that pur-

Pose.
On Monday last their Majesties, with the Foreign Ministers, and great numbers of the Nobility, went to the great place of this City to be Spectators of the Bull Sports, which have not been used before since the death of the late King; but this Recreation p oved Tragical, by the death of \$2 persons, whose courages could not guard them against

the violence of these Wild Bulls.

Rome, June 22. On Monday last was held a Consistory in the Quirinal, wherein the Pope gave Audience to several of the Cardinals, who proposed several Vacant Bishopricks within the Countries under their potection; amongst others the Cardinal Orsino exhibited the Nomination to leveral of the Vacencies in Portugal.

The Count de Vivonne General of the French Gallies has been received, complemented, and treated at Givita Vecchia with all imaginable respects and kindness in the name of the Pope by Mansegnior Castaldi shar Commission. ry General of this Ecclesiastical Aimy, and great stores of fresh provisions were ordered to be sent aboard him and the rest of the Gallies under his, Command, then Rope ha-Ving received much facisfaction upon the account given him of the good Equipage not only of those Gallies, but also of the rest of the French Elect; and dismiss, them some dayes fince with his Benediction to pursue their Voyage : the Count being also much pleased with the extraordinary Civilities which he received during his abode there, and all the Officers and soldiers with the presents and supplies which were given them.

Here is lately arrived a Courrier from Spain with Letters to the Maquils d'Afterga their Ambassador in this Court, who immediately upon the receipt of thom, gave a Visit to Father Nithard lately Confessor to the Queen Regent, and tis supposed he may by this give him a difmission from his Charge of Inquisitor General of Spains and at the same time his Commission to appear under the Characterof Ambaflador Extraordinary

Dantsick, June 29. Since the Election of the New
King of Poland those of the Senatorian Order, who at the beginning seemed to protest against the Election, as carried on with violence by the Nobless, have complied with the reft, and seem much satisfied with what has past; but the Hayvodes and the Nobles would not dismis the great Assembly till all the Members of the States Had wern Fidelity to their now elected Sovereign. The Archbishop of Gnesne has entertained His Majesty with a great Feast, and presented him with a whole service of Plate. The Prince Lubomirski has made him a Present of a rich Coach and fix Neopolitan Horses, and a considerable sum of Moneys, and the Emperous Ambassadour with another Coach and six Horses.

From Ukrania they have intelligence that the Coffacks beyond the Nipre were summoned in to repair to their General Dorosensko, and those on this side the same River, were affembled with their General Suchahitz, each of their Generals intending the deposing of the other; and that the latter had called in the Tartars for his afliftance.

Vienna, June 30. The Emperour having taken an ac-account of his Plenipotentiaries lately resurned from Hungary, of the state of affairs in that Kingdom ; is resolved to give them the latisfaction of permitting them to cail a General Diet, and has thoughts of conferring the Charge of Palatine of Hungary upon the Count de Rothal. Several of the Nobility and grea est Persons of Hungary are daily expected here, with whom the Emperous intends to have some Conference, in order to the lettlement of all affairs, in relation to the faid Diet, and to confider with them of the best and most effectual Method of giving them a just squissaction of all their Grievan-

The fears they had in that Kingdom of some disturbantces from the Turka, begin to vanish, fince all the supernumerary forces which were in the Turkish Garrisons in Albania and Bossina. are marching for Morea, to be tran-Sported from the nee into Canea.

The disturbances at Constantinop'e are said to be some-what appeared, the Grand Segniot having promited to return again to that City, as soon as he shall have seen the structure again to that City, as soon as he shall have seen the structure of this Summers. War upon the Vanctians, to which it is people have no small aversion; considering their great lots of men and their little success hitherto, after a long Siege; befules the great rumors spread amongst them of the great strength of the Christians; which is drawing togeter for the relief of the besinged; which have had so great influence upon them, that soon Turks which were ordered to be transported from Noreximo Candia, fell into a mutiny and resuled the services.

Brussels, July 12. Several expresses have within these two days been sent hither from Mons to the Duke of Aer-schop, advising him that the French series are drawn to gether from their Garisons to the number of 10 or 12 thousand mens and are matching towards Mons, notwith standing the liberty given by the Constable of Castille for the free passage of the Coal-boats, which was the only pretence they had fir motion 3 and from Aeth we are rold, that 3 pieces of Cannon are sent from thence for the service of their Army, which gives us some apprehensions less they may intend to make some attempt upon Mons and Conde, both places being but thinly Garri on'd, and in no excellent possure to make any considerable resistance, of all which the Duke d' Aerschot has this morning by an Express, given intelligence to the Constable of Castille which may probably occasion his speedy return hither.

This tast week by Order from the Prince de Chimas's Governour of Luxen bough, a German Collonel was brought prisoner hither, and under a Guard sent hence and committed prisoner to the Cittadel at Antwerp.

Antwerp, July 13. We are in these parts much allarum'd at the motion of the French forces in such numbers towards Mons. The Constable of Cassille is this day returning to Erussills, and has ordered the most considerable forces of all the Provinces to draw into a body, and to be in readiness upon any occision that may require their service; most of the torces of this Province are already marched towards Erussills, and the rest are ordered to be in readiness also to march upon three hours warning.

The Sickness is broken out with much violence at Mechelen, and several houses are infected at Dermond, Alost and Liet.

Paris, Iuly 13. Letters from Madrid advise us, that the Queen Regent was lately recovered from a violent and dangerous dittemper, for which she had been twice let blood, and that the King of Spain was still observed to be sickly and weak:

Hague, Inly 13. The Heer Hanneken being late'y chofen by the Hans-Towns to appear here as their Resident, has accordingly in his Audience delivered to the States his Credentials, and is now entred upon the Charge in the room of the deceated Heer Airana.

The Count de Benthem has by another Letter to the States delivered to it em by his Secretary, defired that his Children may be reftored to him, which they have taken into their confideration.

On Wednesday next the Stares of Holland will be adgain Assembled her, where the Deputies from the States of Zealand intend to apply themselves to them for the Ratification of the agreement make between both the said States in reference to the Court of Justice, and several other offsirs which had been under dispute.

This week the Heers Meerman and Stavenisse as Commissioners from the States General have had several conferences with the Spanish Ambassador.

Captain de Barry, who commended in the Ship of Vander Zaen in the dilpute sgainit the Admiral of Algiers, wherein the faid Vander Zaen was unhappily killed, is committed to prison, being accused for not giving a signal of the death of the faid Commander, and for retiring from the fight at such a time when the Algier ship was wholly disabled from making any farther opposition. Captain Swaert is also committed, for having followed de Barry in his retreat. Orders are also sent to Captain Van Lier, who was also concerned in the same sction, to return home from the Streights, to answer to the same accufacion; whose plea of their - bligation to follow their Admirals Flag, which was born by Vander Zaens Ship, may probably excule the two later from the severity of that Sentence, which 'tis conceived will be given against the former.

Yesterday was sent hence for Rotterdam the Baggage with several servents of the Heer Boreel design'd Ambailador into England, himself intending in a day or two to follow, but to continue 5 or 6 days in Zaland, which he intends to visit on his way for England.

The 11th instant his Highness the rrince of Tuscant went from Ansterdam intending for Herceht, and to pass from thence to Boisseduc to go afterwards to Liege, and from thence (as is supposed) into France.

Hull, July 5. This last week arrived here the supply of this place, laden with Tobacco from Virginia, four Vessels from Norway with Deals, one from Rotterdam, and three from Smeden laden with Iron, Pitch, and

Dever, July 6. This morning arrived here the Earl of Winchilfea, from Calice, on his return from his Embally into the Levant, and is now upon his way for London. We hear of one Vessel of this Port which has lately sallen into the hands of some of the Sally Menos War, the Pyrates of which place have sour Vessels abroad in course, one a Dogger-boat with six Guns, the other more inconsiderable of sour and two Guns apiece. They have upon the Stocks two Vessels of greater force, one of 12, the other of 30 Guns, which they intend to set out speedily to Ses. The Emperour of Morrocco is in the Field with a great Army, and tis commonly said designed for Santa Cruz, though his intentions are not yet discovered.
