Bruffels, July 12. Several expresses have within these two days been lent hither from Mons to the Duke of Aer-Jehop, advising him that the French forces are drawn together from their Garillons to the number of 10 or 12 thousand mens and are matching towards Mons, notwithflanding the liberty given by the Conitable of Castille for the free passage of the Coal-boats, which was the only pretence they had for motion 3 and from Aeth we are told, that 3 pieces of Cannon are fent from thence for the fervice of their Atmy, which gives us some apprehensions left they may intend to the forme attempt upon Mons and Conde, both places being but thinly Garrion'd, and in no excellent posture to make any confi erable resistance, of all which the Duke d' Aerfehot has this morning by an Express, given intelligence to the Confizile of Castille which may probably occasion his speedy terurn hither.

This half week by Order from the Prince de Chimajar Governour of Luxen bough, a German Collonel was brought priloner hither, and under a Guard fent hence and commit ed priloner to the Cittadel at Antwerp.

Antwerp, July 13. We are in these parts much allarum'd at the motion of the French forces in such numbers towards Monse. The Confiable of Caffille is this day returning to Eruffile, and has ordered the mess confiderable forces of all the Provinces to draw into a body, and to be in readines upon any occession that may require their service; most of the forces of this Province are already marched towards Eruffels, and the reft are ordered to be in readines also to march upon three hours warning.

The Sickness is broken out with much violence at Meshelens and leveral houles are infected at Dermond, Aloft and Liet.

Paris, July 13. Letters from Madrid advife us, that the Queen Regent was lately recovered from a violent and dangerous dittemper, for which the had been twice let blood, and that the King of Spain was still observed to be fickly and weak:

His Majesty seems much distatisfied with the Duke of Lorrain, and has hely dispatch a Gentleman to Lorrain, he has also fignifyd his displative against the Chevalier d' Harcoure, who against His Majesties express Order went into Poland, where he strongly negotiated for the interest of Prince Charles of Lorrains and has ordered his Abby of Royaumont to be seled.

The Bifhop of Befiers has by his Letters defired to be

recalled from his employment in *Foland*, in whole place tis believed may be fent the Cheyalier de Gremonville.

The Cardinal de Vendofme is faid to be relapled, and in great darger.

From Venice we are told, that the belieged in Candia have made a flout and fuccessful faily upon the Turks at the Bastion St. Andre, and have beat them out of a conficerable part of it.

conficerable part of it. Hague, Iuly 13. The Heer Hannchenbeing late'y chofen by the Hans-Towns to appear here as their Refidents, has accordingly in his Audience delivered to the States his Credentials, and is now entred upon the Charge in the room of the deceated Heer Ait2ma.

The Count de Benthem has by another Letter to the States delivered to it em by his Secretary, defired that his Children may be reftored to him, which they have taken into their confideration.

On Wednetday next the States of Holland will be a<sup>2</sup> gain Affembled her, where the Deputies from the States of 2 caland intend to apply themselves to them for the Ratification of the agreement make between both the faid States in reference to the Court of Juftice, and leveral other effsirs which had been under dispute.

This week the Heers Meerman and Staveniffe as Commiffioners from the States General have had leveral conferences with the Spanish Ambasiador.

Captain de Barry, who commanded in the Ship of Vander Zaen in the dilpute sgainit the Admiral of Algiers, wherein the faid Vander Zaen was unhappily killed, is committed to prilon, being scculed for not giving a fignal of the death of the faid Commander, and for retiring from the fight at fuch a time when the Algier thip was wholly dilabled from making any farther oppetition. Captain Swaert is allo committed , for having followed de Barry in his retreat. Orders are also fent to Captain Van Lier, who was also concerned in the fame sction, to return home from the Streights, to answer to the same accufacion ; whole plea of their - bligation to follow their Admirals Flag, which was born by Vander Zaens Ship, may probably excule the two later from the feverity of that Sentence, which 'tis conceived will be given against the former.

Yesterday was seint hence for Rot terdam the Baggage, with several servants of the Heer Rorecl delign'd Amballador into England, himself intending in a day or two to follow, but to continue 5 or 6 days in Z aland, which he intends to visit on his way for England.

The 11th inftant his Highnels the vince of Tuscany went from Amflordam intending for Hirricht, and to pais from thence to Boisseduc to go afterwards to Liege, and from thence (as is supposed) into France. Hull, July 5. This last week arrived here the supply

Hull, July 5. This last week arrived here the supply of this place, laden with Tobacco from Virginia, four Vessels from Normay with Deals, one from Rotterdam, and three from Smeden laden with Iron, Pitch, and Tarre.

Daver, July 6. This morning arrived here the Earl of Winchilfca, from Calice, on his return from his Embally into the Levant, and is now upon his way for London. We hear of one Veffel of this Port which has lately fallen into the hands of fome of the Sally Men of War, the Pyrates of which place have four Veffels abroad in courfe, one a Dogget-boat with fix Guns, the ether more inconfiderable of four and two Guns apiece. They have upon the Stocks two Veffels of greater force, one of 12, the other of 30 Guns, which they intend to fet out fpeedily to Ses. The Emperour of Morbaco is in the Field with a great Army, and tis commonly faid defigned for Santa Gruz, though his intentions are not yet difcovered.
