Permit us therefore (Great Princes) by this our humble Address, in some measure to express the Joys we have conceived, at your Majesties most Auspicious Reign over us: And further to assure your Majesty, that we will always hereafter, with the utmost of our power and abilities, stand by and defend your Majesty, in your most sacred Person and Government, as well against the pretended Prince of Wales, and his Adherents, as against all other your Majesties Enemies whatsoever.

Nor shall our Addresses to Heaven be wanting, for the prosperity of your Majesties Arms, both by Sea and Land, against the Common Enemy, as well for the preservation of your Majesties People, and Government at home, as for the Safety and encouragement of your Allies abroad. And that God will bless your Majesty, with a long and happy Reign over us, and with a people true, that may succeed your Majesty in the Government of these Realms, and of all other your Majesties Dominions and Countries, is all that shall be always the constant and hearty Prayers of (Gracious Sovereign) your Majesties most dutiful and Loyal Subjects.

The humble Address of the Recorder, Minister, Church-Warden, and other principal Inhabitants of Your Incorporation of Bridgewater, in the County of Somerset.

Most Gracious Sovereign,
