**S**T. James's, April 18. The following Address from the Governors of the Charity for Relief of the Poor Widows and Children of Clergy-Men, was presented to Her Majesty by Sir Thomas More their Vice-President; Introduced by his Grace the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, their President.

### To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Governors of the Charity for Relief of the Poor Widows and Children of Clergy-Men.

May it please Your Majesty,  
**W**E Your Majesties most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Sons of the Clergy, (who have been early instructed in Loyalty, and the other good Principles of the established Church of England) do think our selves obliged to Condone with Your Majesty the inexpressible Loss of our late Sovereign, of glorious Memory; And also most heartily to Congratulate Your Majesties happy Accession to the Throne, who have always been a Support and Ornament of our Church, and we trust will long be its Defender.

We doubt not but that our Corporation is an Evidence, notwithstanding the Objections of our Adversaries of the Church of Rome, that a married Clergy may be prosperous, and useful to that Nation and Government unto which they belong; And we think our selves in Duty bound, upon this Solemn Occasion, to make a publick Profession of our unshaken Loyalty and Allegiance to Your Majesty, & tho' at the same time we are fully persuaded, that Your Majesties own Pious Life, and Religious Concern for the Glory of God, and the Publick Good, will always be the strongest Support of your Throne.

Most Gracious Sovereign, we beg Leave to offer to Your Majesty our most hearty Thanks for your most Gracious Assurances of protecting our Church, and securing the Succession to the Crown in the Protestant Line, & for your timely Care to discourage all manner of Prophanation, and Fornication by your Authority, as you have ever done by your Example.

And we beseech Almighty God, the King of Kings, to protect your Sacred Person, to establish your Throne, to give Success to all your Undertakings against your Enemies at home and abroad, and long continue to Your Majesty a Blessing to Europe, and in especial manner to this Church and Nation.

In Testimony whereof, we have caused our Common Seal to be hereunto affixed the 14th day of April, 1702. and in the First Year of Your Majesties Reign.

The following Address from the County of Middlesex was presented to Her Majesty by John Austin Esq; one of their Representatives in Parliament, and divers other Gentlemen of the said County, introduced by his Grace the Duke of Somerset, Lord President of Her Majesties Council.

### To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Deputy Lieutenants, Gentlemen, and Freeholders, of the County of Middlesex.

Most Gracious Sovereign,  
**W**E Your Majesties most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, the Deputy Lieutenants, Gentlemen, and Freeholders, of the County of Middlesex, deeply afflicted at the unspeakable Loss of our late King, of ever blessed Memory, the Asserter and Restorer of our Religion and Liberties; humbly crave leave to Condone with Your Majesty on this so sad an Occasion.

### To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Chichester.

May it please Your Majesty,  
**W**E Your Majesties most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Dean and Chapter of your Cathedral Church of Chichester, do beg Leave humbly to Condone with Your Majesty the inexpressible Loss, which we of these Kingdoms, and all Your Majesties Allies, have sustained, by the Death of our late Sovereign King William, by whom it pleased God to deliver our Country and State, and to prefer the Protestant Religion, and the Liberty of Europe.

We do therefore humbly assure your Majesty, that we will, with all possible Zeal and Fidelity, endeavour to prefer your Sacred Person and Government; against all your Enemies whatsoever; and that we will make it our constant Prayer, that God will direct your Councils, strengthen your Hands, and prosper your Undertakings; That he will grant Your Majesty a long and happy Life; and that he will make your Reign glorious to your Self, and a Blessing to your People.

The following Address from the County of Cornwall was presented to Her Majesty by the Hon. John Granville and James Butler Esq; their Representatives in Parliament.

### To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the High Sheriff and Grand Jury of the County of Cornwall, met and assembled at the Assizes held for the said County at Truro, March 25. 1702.

**W**E render unsighed Thanks to Almighty God, since he hath been pleased to take to his Eternal Mercy the Soul of our late Sovereign, King William the Third, (not only the great Champion and Defender of the Protestant Religion and Property, but also of Just and Righteous Monarchy in opposition to Arbitrary and Despotic Power), that after an especial manner, without the Noise of War, and Garrisons stained in Blood, by an unquestionable Right, he hath called Your Majesty to the Throne and Dominion of Your Ancestors; In the Enjoyment whereof, we humbly pray Almighty God to give Your Majesty a happy Series of prosperous Years, for the immortal Fame and Glory of your Self and Royal Successors; as also for the good Peace and Tranquility of your Subjects, in Church and State, as by Law established.

And this we think ourselves not only indispensably obliged unto, in imitation of our Ancestors, who Signallized themselves in those particulars, in the Cause of Your Royal Grandfather King Charles the Martyr (who recognized their Valour, Conduct, and Faintheartedness by a Letter to them, Decr'd 1643). The Copy whereof is still preserved in our Parochial Churches. But also by the Laws of God and the Land, from which we resolve never to Deviate.

The following Address from the City of Carlisle, in the County of Cumberland, was presented to Her Majesty by Philip Howard and James Lowther Esq; their Representatives in Parliament, introduced by the Earl Marshal of England, Lord Lieutenant of the said County.

To Her Sacred Majesty, Anne, by the Grace of God, of England, Scotland, France, and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, &c. The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, Bayliffs, and Citizens, of Your Majesties City of Carlisle in the County of Cumberland.
