St. James's, June 8. The following Address of the **Twelve thousand Men**, was presented to Her Majesty by the **Rt. Hon. the Earl of Radnor**, Lord Warden of the **Stannaries**,

To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the **Gentlemen, Boulders, Adventurers, Miners, and others**, concerned in the **Stannaries and Duchy of Cornwall.**

Most Gracious Sovereign,

Having paid some part of the **Tribute of Tears** that is due to our late Sovereign **Lord William III.** of most glorious Memory, we most humbly and heartily congratulate Your Majesty's happy Accession to the **Throne of these Kingdoms**, your undoubted Right, which is the only Corner we were capable of, after the unspeakable Loss of the best, the bravest, and best of **Kings**; into whom (next Heaven) we owe not only the Enjoyment of our Religion, Liberty and Property, but also the Blessing of Your Majesty's auspicious Reign over us.

Your Majesty's Exemplary Piety, Justice, and Prudence, before they became Ornaments to the Crown, gave us an earnest of the Happiness we were to enjoy under your Government; And all your Subjects join in a dutiful Admiration of these your Princely Virtues, which have already rendered all Parties to such a degree of Unanimity, as will surpass the only Hope of our Enemies, and make the Prophecies of our late Gracious Sovereign, leaving no Distinction among us, but of those who are in the present Establishment in Church and State, and those who mean a Popish Prince and a French Government.

The Eyes of the World are fixed on Your Majesty, as the only Power on Earth from whom the injured Princes and States of Europe can hope for a Redress of their Wrongs. We beseech Almighty God to bless and preserve Your Majesty to direct your Councils, and prosper your Arms, that you may successfully execute the great Trust reposed in you by the King for the good of Mankind: The accomplishment of which seems to be an Honour reserved for Your Majesty, as a Reward of your Zeal for the Church of England in a former Reign; of your Compassion for your Country then ready to be enslaved, and of your Heroick Contempt of all Danger, that threatened you for concurring with Your Royal Brother, of ever Blessed Memory, in the Glorious War of our Deliverance.

The following Address was presented to Her Majesty by the **Rt. Rev. Edward Lord Bishop of St. Asaph**, and several of the Clergy of the said Diocese.

To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the **Bishop, Dean and Chapter, and the Clergy**, of the Diocese of **St. Asaph.**

May it please Your Majesty,

As you have been for want of a ready Will and entire Obedience that we have not before this attended Your Majesty with our hearty Congratulations, as well as Condolence for the Death of the late King.

We do assure Your Majesty none rejoice more sincerely at your happy Accession to the Throne of your Royal Ancestors, and confident of your fixed Resolutions to renounce all unchristian Power.

Your Majesty having begun your Reign with Publick Acts and Demonstrations of an exemplary Piety and distinguished Wisdom, of singular Bounty and Munificence, of Care for the established Church, and Concern for the Succession in the Protestant Line, we cannot but express the Sense of Gratitude, in imploring the Divine Goodness for Your Majesty's long and prosperous Reign over us.

We do crave Leave to assure Your Majesty of our entire and irrevocable Faith and Allegiance, (a Natural and Constitutional Principle of our Country and Ancestors) and that we will to the utmost of our Power, defend Your Majesty's lawful and Rightful Title to these Kingdoms against all your Enemies, and particularly the pretended Prince of Wales.

By that Grace of God, by which you Reign, secure the Royal Person, and establish your Throne in the steady Affection of your People, as well as by the Triumphs of your Army.

To Queen ANNE, over England, &c.

The Humble and Thankfull Acknowledgment of the People commonly called **Quakers**, from their Yearly General Meeting in **London** the 30th Day of the Third Month, called **May** 1702. presented to Her Majesty by **William Penn Esq;** accompanied by several of the said General Meeting.

May it please the Queen,
We thy Peaceable and Dutiful Subjects, met from most Parts of thy Dominions, at our usual Yearly Meeting, for the Promotion of Piety and Charity, being deeply affected with thy Wise and Noble Resolution in thy late Speech at the Prorogation of the Parliament, to preserve and maintain the Act of Toleration, for the Ease and Quiet of all thy People, could not but in Gratitude esteem our selves engaged both to thank Almighty God for that favourable Influence, and to renew and render our humble and hearty Acknowledgments to the Queen for the same; assuring Her (on behalf of all our Friends) of our Sincere Affection and Christian Obedience.

And we beseech God, the Fountain of Wisdom and Goodness, so to direct all thy Councils and Undertakings, that Righteousness, which exalts a Nation, and Mercy and Justice, that establish a Throne, may be the Character of thy Reign, and the Blessings of these Kingdoms under it.

I am very glad you are so well pleased with what I have said; and you may depend upon My Protection.

An humble Address of the **Bishop and Clergy of the Dioceses of Killala and Achery**; was presented to Her Majesty by his Excellency the **Earl of Rochester**, Lord Lieutenant of **Ireland.**

Which Adresses Her Majesty received very graciously.

Warsaw, May 28. N.S. The King of Sweden came the 22d Instant to **Prege**, upon the **River Wyffel**; after which his Majesty took a view of this City, and of several Monasteries in our neighbourhood; and the 25th he summoned the **Weywode Polotsky**, our Governor, to surrender, which he soon consented to, and accordingly the next morning, about break of day, the Forces of **Poland**, which were in **Garison** here, marched out of the **Cattle**; and 400 **Swedish** Foot took possession of it. The **Swedes** observe strict Discipline, and tell the Inhabitants of this Place that they design to maintain a good Correspondence and Friendship with them; About 15000 **Swedes** more are shortly expected here, and it is said, the King of **Sweden** intends to leave a strong **Garison** in this Place, and to march with the rest of his Army towards **Cracaw**, to find the King of **Poland**; who according to some of our late Accounts from thence, was on his departure from that Place, intending to go to **Silesia**, in order to head his own Troops, which are marching through that Country to **Poland**, and had caused a great Magazine of Provisions to be prepared for them at **Tarnowitz**, on the Frontiers of this Kingdom. We hear the best part of the Army of the Crown is arrived at the **Rendezvous** near **Lemberg**; but that those Forces are in an ill Condition, and little dependence can be had upon them.

Paris, June 5. N.S. The **Comte de Toulon**, High Admiral of **France**, went post from hence the 29th past towards **Toulon**, with **Monieur de Rebinques**, Lieutenant General of the **French** Fleet, in order to command the **French** Men of War which are fixed out in that Harbour. The 31st, the Deputies of the Clergy of **France**, who are met at **St. Germans en Laye**, went in a Body to **Versailles** to wait upon the King, being conducted by **Monieur de Granger**, Master of the Ceremonies, and introduced by **Monieur Ponchartrain**, one of the Secretaries of State: The **Cardinal de Noailles** complimented the King in their Names, and they afterwards had Audience in like manner of the **Dauphin**. The

2d Instant, the King sent his Commissioners to them, to demand a Supply towards defraying the great Expenses he is at in this difficult Conjunction. The King being informed, that the Marquis of Varentes, Governor of Metz, and Commander in Chief of the French Forces in the Bishopricks of Metz, Toul, and Verdun, was taken by a German Party near Chateau-Sainis, in the Duke of Lorraine's Territories, he has writ to that Duke, Requiring him to reclaim the said Marquis; adding, That he wondered the Duke maintained his Neutrality no better, then to suffer the German Parties to make Excursions into the Territories belonging to the Dutchy of Lorraine. Letters from Naples of the 18th past say, the Cardinal de Medicis was come thither on board his Brother the Great Duke's Gallies, to compliment the King of Spain; and that the King has put off his Publick Entry into Naples till the 22d.

Falmouth, June 3. Her Majesty's Ship the Bonetta Sloop, Captain Carmoche Commander, is come in here, who on the 31st of the last Month met with a Portuguese Ship bound from O-Porto to London; the Master whereof reports, That the 23d he met with the Squadron of Her Majesty's Ships commanded by Sir John Munden 25 Leagues off Cape Finister, bearing North-West, and that they had taken two French Ships richly laden from Martinico. This morning Captain Carmoche met the May-Flower, from the Canaries; James Tresten Master, bound to this Place; who says, the War was not yet declared in the Canaries when he came away, but that all the English Merchants there were imprisoned by the Governor, upon the probability of a War. The said Captain also met this day with Her Majesty's Ships the Bedford, Eagle, and Kent; the Eagle has taken a French Fly-boat of about 400 Tun, that had been to carry Provisions to the French Squadron in the West-Indies; the Master of which Ship gives an Account, that none of that Squadron are left in the West-Indies, several Ships being lost; and the rest returned to France, and that most of the Seamen that were on board the said Squadron died in the Voyage; Three of the Men of War belonging to it came out with him; but he lost their Company 12 hours before he was taken.

Plymouth, June 7. Her Majesty's Ship the Exeter came in here this day with a retaken Dutch Ship called the Humber of about 120 Tun, laden with Wine and other Commodities, and 2 small French Prizes, and Captain Edward Owen, Commander of Her Majesty's Ship the Rochester, has brought in a Pink called the Sarah of Dublin, laden with Provisions, which he retook from a French Privateer. The Nicholson of London, John Books Master, from Virginia, the Bartholomew of London from the Bay of Campeche, and several other homeward-bound Merchant Ships, are come into this Port.

Bristol, June 8. This day came in here, the Katherine Sloop from Antegoa, and the Navis Merchant from New-Orleans, under Convoy of Her Majesty's Ship the Bridgewater, which is since put to Sea again. The Devonshire of this Port is also arrived from Antegoa.

Cowes, June 8. Several Draughts out of Colonel Holt's, Colonel Sanderson's, and Colonel Gibson's Regiments of Foot, are come over from Portsmouth, and have joined others of Her Majesty's Forces encamped in this Island.

Portsmouth, June 9. Her Majesty's Ships the Eagle, Bedford, and Kent, are come to Spithead from Ireland, having on board Lieutenant General Erle's Regiment of Foot, which is ordered to the Camp in the Isle of Wight. Sir George Rooke continues at Spithead with Her Majesty's Fleet.

Deale, June 9. Yesterday came to the Downes Her Majesty's Ship the Romney, and under her Convoy the Decebs, the Mansfield, and the Julian, from the East-Indies, the Betty from Lisbon, and several other homeward-bound Merchant Ships.
