Here is lately arrived a Letter from the Marquis de St. Andre Montbrun at Candia dated the 2 9th of May, importing, that the Turks were with all diligence mounting their Cavalry, and had lummon d in all the Inhabitants of the Island and employed them at their Works before the Town; and that the Viller gave out that he was relolved to engage the fuccors immediately upon their landing, but believed riot chartheir numbers were halfe lo confiderable as report made them tobe; the Marquis adding, that if the faid fuccors were fewer then the Turks were willing to b. lieve them, he made no doubt but that upon their apppearance they should be able to force the Torks from the breaches, and in spight of all their attempts to detend the Town for d year longer, though the Turks Were Masters of the Baftion St. Andre.

The Cardinal de Pendofme has lately given an account of a Letter written to him by the Confut of La Ciotar in Prowoned, giving him notice of the arrival there of a Back the 9th instantism 40 days from Candia, the Master of the feid Bark affirming, that at his departure from thole leas, the Sieut de Atmeras was with three men of War and one Pireship at the Island of Miles expecting the return of a Chaloup which he had some time before tent to Lariffe to found the intentions of the Ostoman Court, and to bring him an account of affairs concerning the Sieur de la Hay's one Ambassador; He farther tells, that three Venetian thips patting by the Sieut de Almeras, obliged them to sa-Inte the French Flag with & Guns, which he answered onely with 23 farther telling, that upon his way home--wards he discovered between the Illands of Sapleaga and Serigo on the 17th of June, a Fleet of about 70 fail, which he supposed to be the French Fleet making for Candia.

Letters from the Netherlands inform us, that although the Constable of Castille has been prevailed with to give Beave for the palsing of the Cosl-Boats, his Concession has hitherto been rendred ineffectial by the letting go the "Shiles", by which means the River and Channels are fo low drained, that no Boat is able to pals, nor if the Sluices ware stopt a can the Rivers be rendred again capable in near a Moneth's time to carry down the laid Boats, of

which we suppose ere this a Complaint has been made
