Whitehall, June 25. This day their Excellencies Baron Licr and Monsieur van Haren, Ambassadors Extraordinary from the States General of the United Provinces to Her Majesty, made their Publick Entry; Being received at Greenwich by the Rt. Hon. the Earl of Essex, Sir Charles Cottrell Master of the Ceremonies, and six Gentlemen of the Privy Chamber, and brought by Water in one of Her Majesty's Barges, attended by several other Barges to the Tower, where they were complimented at their Landing by the Rt. Hon. the Lord Lucas, as Governor of the Tower, and saluted by a Discharge of the Cannon, the Standard being displayed. Their Excellencies were conducted from thence in one of Her Majesty's Coaches, followed by a Coach of His Royal Highness Prince George of Denmark, four of the Ambassadors own Coaches, one with 3 Horses, and the rest with 6 Horses apiece, and many Coaches of the Nobility with 6 Horses each, to the Cockpit, where an Apartment was prepared for them during the time their Excellencies are to be entertained by Her Majesty; Their Excellencies being arrived there, were complimented in Her Majesty's Name by the Rt. Hon. the Lord Guilford, and on the Part of His Royal Highness Prince George of Denmark by the Rt. Hon. the Lord Delaware Groom of the Stole to His Royal Highness. Their Excellencies had a numerous Retinue, which were all in Mourning upon the Occasion of His late Majesty's Death.

Westminster, June 22. This day His Royal Highness Prince George of Denmark came to the Court of Chancery, and there took the Oaths, and subscribed the Tests appointed by Act of Parliament.

Westminster, June 23. William Fuller having, in pursuance of the Orders of the House of Lords and the House of Commons, been prosecuted upon an Information for being an Impostor, and for publishing Two false and scandalous Libels, falsely pretended to be sworn to by one Thomas Jones; the one Entituled, *Original Letters of the late King, and others, to his greatest Friends in England*; the other Entituled, *Twenty six Depositions of Persons of Quality and Worth, respecting upon the Ministers of the late King William*, and upon several Members of both Houses of Parliament, and being fully convicted thereof, he was this day brought to the *Queen's-Bench Bar*, where Sentence was pronounced against him as follows; That the said Fuller go into all the Courts at Westminster, with a Paper denoting his Offence; That he pay a Fine of a Thousand Marks; That he stand Three times in the Pillory; That he be sent to the House of Correction in London, there to be whip't the third

day of July next, and to be kept at hard Labour till the 24th day of October next; and that he continue in Prison till he has paid the above-said Fine.
