WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 22nd day of January, 1948, in the words and figures following, that is to say—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1936, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Cyril, Archbishop of York (in witness whereof he has signed the Scheme), for effecting the union of the benefice of Thirsk and the benefice of South Kilvington both situate in the diocese of York.

"SCHEME.

"1 *Union of Benefices* The benefice of Thirsk and the benefice of South Kilvington shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Thirsk with South Kilvington', but the parishes of the said benefices shall continue in all respects distinct.

"2 *Taking effect of union.* Upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme is published in the London Gazette the union shall forthwith take effect and the Reverend Harry Broughton if he is then Incumbent of the said benefice of Thirsk shall with his consent (testified by his signature hereto), be the first incumbent of the united benefice

"3 *Parsonage House.* Upon the union taking effect the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Thirsk shall be the house of residence of the incumbent of the united benefice

"4. *Clerical or other assistance.* (1) Upon the union taking effect a curate shall be employed by the incumbent to assist him in performing the duties of the united benefice and such curate shall, unless the Archbishop of York otherwise from time to time permits, reside within the parish of Thirsk, but in the event of the services of a whole-time curate not being available, the incumbent shall employ such other clerical or such lay assistance as the Archbishop shall from time to time direct

(2) There shall be appropriated as a fund towards the cost of providing such assistance as aforesaid—

(i) upon the union taking effect, a part of the endowments of the united benefice, namely, so much of the moneys appropriated by Queen Anne's Bounty to the benefice of South Kilvington pursuant to the Tithe Act, 1936, as will produce £275 per annum, and

(ii) upon the union taking effect or upon the cesser of the pension of £148 per annum now charged upon the revenues of the benefice of South Kilvington in favour of the Reverend Benjamin Ward Wood (whichever date shall be the later) a further part of the said endowments, namely, so much of the said moneys as will produce £25 per annum,

and the said fund shall be paid by Queen Anne's Bounty to the diocesan board of finance of the diocese as trustees to apply the same accordingly."

And whereas the provisions of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1936, and the Union of

Benefices Rules, 1926 to 1930, relating to the preparation and submission of this Scheme have been duly complied with:

"SCHEME

"1 Upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme is published in the London Gazette the parish of Saint Peter, Ipswich, and the parish of Saint Mary at the Quay, Ipswich, shall forthwith be permanently united together and form one parish for ecclesiastical purposes.

"2 The Parish church of the parish of Saint Peter, Ipswich, shall be the parish church of the united parish.

"3 Upon the union taking effect the marriage registers in duplicate current at the church of Saint Mary at the Quay, Ipswich, shall be sent by the incumbent of the united benefice to the Registrar General to be closed officially.

"4 Upon the union taking effect the church of Saint Mary at the Quay, Ipswich, shall, subject to the provisions of the said Measures, be appropriated for any educational or charitable purpose or purposes in connection with the Church of England having in view the spiritual, intellectual, moral or social welfare of the parishioners of the united parish of Saint Peter with Saint Mary at the Quay, Ipswich, and others or either exclusively or in conjunction with any such purpose as aforesaid for use or occupation by any diocesan body or organisation or otherwise for the furtherance of the work of the Church of England or the administration of its affairs, and such appropriation shall be subject to such conditions, regulations and provisions as the Bishop of Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich shall by Deed made pursuant to the 24th Section of the Union of Benefices Measure, 1923, declare and appoint."
