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ON the 28th of May last we received Advice of the Death of His late Majesty, and of Her present Majesty's happy Succession to the Throne: The Council and the General Assembly were then sitting, and the Members of the Council immediately took the Oath of Allegiance to Her Majesty. The next day the Council, attended by the Representatives in the General Assembly, the Ministers, Justices of the Peace, Gentlemen, Merchants, and other Inhabitants, Proclaimed Her Majesty, the Troop of Guards and the Regiment of Militia being in Arms, when the Proclamation was ended, fired three Volleys, which were followed with Huzzas, and loud Acclamations of God Save Queen Anne, and the Cannon of the Castle and Forts, and of Her Majesty's Ship the Gosport, and the Merchant Ships then in our Port, was discharged. In the evening the Company was entertained at the Town-House, and other Places, and all other Demonstrations of Joy were given suitable to the Occasion. The 31st Instant, the Members of the Council and other Gentlemen of the Town went into Mourning for the Death of His late Majesty. The Bells were tolled from 8 till 10 in the-morning, and from 2 till 4 in the afternoon; Funeral Sermons were preached in all the Churches, and the Guns of the Castle and Forts, and of the Ships in our Port, were all discharged.

Windsor, July 19. The following Address was presented to Her Majesty by *Constituens Phipps Esq;* introduced by the Rt. Hon. the Earl of Nottingham, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State.

To Her most Excellent Majesty Anne, by the Grace of God, of England, Scotland, France and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, &c.

The humble Address of the Council and Representatives of Your Majesty's Province of the *Massachusetts-Bay* in *New-England*, in General Court assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,
THE Surprising Intelligence of the Awful Stroke of Divine Providence, in the Death of our late Sovereign Lord King William III. of ever Glorious Memory, led us with no little Consideration, and very sensibly affected us with a deep Sorrow for so unspeakable a Loss; with we humbly crave leave to Condole with Your Majesty and our Nation; and at the same time most heartily to Congratulate Your Majesty's happy Accession to the Throne, whereby our Grief is alleviated, in that Your Majesty's known Zeal for, and firm Adherence to, the Protestant Religion, gives us Assurance of enjoying Prosperity under Your Majesty's auspicious Reign, which God grant may be long and prosperous.

Humly beseeching Your Majesty, That the benign Influence of Your Royal Goodness and Protection may be extended to Your Majesty's good Subjects in this Province, at so great a distance from the Royal Seat.

That Almighty God would afford Your Majesty the Assistance of all Divine Grace, and shall be the hearty and fervent Prayer of Your Majesty's most Dutiful, Loyal, and Obedient Subjects.

The following Address was presented to Her Majesty by the Rt. Hon. *Ralph Lord Grey of Warke*, late Governor of the Island of *Barbadoes*.

To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the President and Council administering the Government of Your Majesty's Island of *Barbadoes*, together with the principal Officers and Inhabitants thereof, now assembled in the chief Town of the said Island, with one Tongue and Heart joyfully to Proclaim Your Majesty, our Sovereign Lady, *Anne, by the Grace of God, Queen of England, Scotland, France and Ireland*, and of the Territories and Dominions thereto belonging, Defender of the Faith, &c.

Great Sovereign,
Should we not at this time, and on this Solemn and Great Occasion, humbly crave Your Royal Leave to

stify and declare our great and unexpressible Joy for Your Majesty's Accession to the Thrones of Your Royal Ancestors, we should most justly think our selves unworthy of that Character of Duty and Loyalty which we and the rest of the Inhabitants of this Place have ever, with great Zeal, not only professed, but have been always steady in: And therefore, as we esteem it the greatest of Happinesses, we most humbly present our selves at Your Royal Feet, with Hearts full of Dutiful Obedience and Loyalty to Your Majesty, equal to the best of Your Subjects; and with our most hearty and fervent Prayers to Almighty God to preserve Your Life and happy Reign over us for many many Years, for the good of Church and State; and that Your Majesty may be Glorious and Successful in all Your Undertakings; and preserve the Bullance of Europe, against the Overgrowing and Exorbitant Power of the French King; and all others that shall attempt to disturb the Peace thereof, or of any of Your Kingdoms or Dominions, especially in the Score of the supposed Prince of Wales, whose Pretensions we abhor and renounce from the bottom of our Hearts, being ready to offer up the last drop of our Blood, and the utmost Penny of our Fortunes, in Defence of Your Majesty's Right to Your Crowns and Dominions in our several Stations.

Permit us, Royal Madam, before we subscribe, to Condole with You for the Death of His late Majesty King William III. of ever blessed Memory, whose Renowned and Heroick Actions will be the Wonder of future Ages, and imitated by none but Your Royal Self, his immediate and undoubted Successor to the Throne, as the most deserving it, not only by Right of Birth, but by Your most Excellent Perfections and Knowledge, as well in Religious as Civil Affairs of Government, to the unspeakable Blessing of Your Majesty's Dutiful Subjects: In which number we do assure Your Majesty we are, and will continue to be, Your Majesty's most Loyal, most Dutiful, and Obedient Subjects.
Bridge-Town, May 18. 1702.

Which Addresses Her Majesty received very graciously.

Madrid, June 29. The Queen of Spain is expected here to-morrow from Saragossa. The States of the Kingdom of Arragon have presented her with 100000 Crowns, which she has sent away to Italy towards defraying the King's Expences. The Count de Tholouse, Great Admiral of France, is made General of all the Naval Forces of Spain. An Officer of the French King's Finances, who was here some time since to take an Account of the present Condition of the Revenues of this Crown, and to make Report thereof to the French Court, in order to the finding out of new Methods for improving the same, is returned to this Place with fresh Instructions, and it is rumoured, that many new Taxes are to be laid upon this Country by his Direction, which occasions great Murmurings. They write from Cadiz, that the new Fortifications of that Place are finishing with all possible diligence, and that a Reinforcement of 800 Men is lately come into that Garison.

Rome, July 1. N. S. The 28th part being the Feast of St. Peter, was observed here as usual, with great Solemnity. It is customary on that day to present to the Pope the Yearly Tribute for the Kingdom of Naples; but the Matter of the Investiture not being yet settled, he prevailed with the Imperial and Spanish Ambassadors to content themselves with entering a Protest, to save the Rights of their respective Masters, fearing what might be the Consequence of suffering them to assert the same, by offering to pay this Tribute, and making use of Force to prevent each other's doing it. The present Posture of Affairs in the Kingdom of Naples giving occasion to expect new Troubles, especially in the Province of *Abruzzo*, bordering on the Pope's Territories, where it is said a considerable number of the Inhabitants who favour the Emperor's Interest have taken up Arms, and ruine the Estates of those of the French Faction, the Pope hath given Orders for new Levies to be made for the better Security of his Frontiers. Don *Livio Odescalchi* hath made over his Estate in the *Milanese* (which is sequestrated by the Government there because of his adhering to the Emperor) unto the Count of *Borromeo*, his Nephew, who is gone thither to claim it.

From the Imperial Camp near Montanara, July 2. Prince Eugene having resolved to raise some Works before the Gate of Mantua called the Pradella, out of which the Garrison used frequently to send Parties, which were very troublesome to us, 100 Pioneers began that Work the 27th past, being guarded by 100 Grenadiers and 300 Foot, supported by 300 Horse. The Enemy ply'd them with their Cannon, but to little purpose; and about one the next morning they made a Sally with 2000 Men, but were repul'd with Loss, and on our side 6 Men, were killed and 8 wounded. The 28th, our Guard there was increased to near 1800 Men, which very much alarmed the Inhabitants of Mantua, who expected nothing less than a sudden Bombardment. The Enemy Cannonaded all day from several Batteries, but did us no other Mischief than the killing of two Men, and wounding a few more. We had Intelligence, that the Enemy had sent three Brigades of Foot into Mantua, and expected they would make some great Effort to drive us from our new Post; upon which General Haxthausen with 4 Imperial and 2 Danish Battalions of Foot, and Count Bagni with 5 Battalions, were conveniently posted to prevent it; But we received an Account the 29th, that the Enemy had countermanded their three Brigades, and the 5 Battalions under Count Bagni returned to their former Posts; but General Haxthausen remained with his Body of Foot near Pradella. The 30th, the Enemy seeing the little execution their Cannon did upon our new Works, ceased to fire. We made a general Forage beyond Pescoldo and Borgolotte under a Guard of 300 Horse and 150 Foot, commanded by Count Arberg. The Enemy were foraging thereabouts at the same time with a very strong Guard; Count Arberg ordered a Lieutenant or Horse with 30 Troopis to advance towards them, who killed between 20 and 30, and took 10 Prisoners, and between 50 and 60 Horses, which were immediately sent higher; and Count Arberg sent two Detachments more to attack the Enemy, who pushed them to their main Body; but the Enemy having received a Reinforcement from their Army, obliged our Men to give way; but Count Arberg coming up with the rest of his Troops, repul'd the Enemy thrice, and remained Master of the field: Towards the latter end of this vigorous Action, Prince Eugene having notice of it, sent the Margrave of Anspach with a strong Body of Men to support Count Arberg, and mounting on Horseback himself, followed with another Body, but both these Detachments arrived after the Engagement was over: We lost in this Action a Captain of Dragoons, a Captain of Horse, 6 Troopis, and had 5 wounded; and on the side of the Enemy were killed a Colonel, my Lord Gaimoy's Son, who was a Lieutenant-Colonel, a Captain of Carabimiers, and many Troopis and Soldiers. This day we foraged on the side of Pescoldo under a Guard of 300 Horse, 200 Hussars, and 400 Foot, without any Opposition; and we have an Account, that Count Trauttmansdorf, whose Body lies on the other side the Mincio, has done the like.

Tientsin, July 8. N. S. Letters from the Imperial Camp in Italy of the 2d Instant give an Account, That the Duke of Anjou was arrived at Picignone, and that a considerable Detachment having been sent him by the Duke de Vendome, Prince Eugene had renounced Guaitalia, and had ordered the Margrave of Anspach to be ready to march with a Body of Horse and Foot to oppose the Enemy if they should attack Berfello. Prince Eugene has published a Proclamation, That no Person of what Nation or Quality never do presume to carry Provisions into Mantua, on pain of Death. That City is in as great Distress as ever. There are Letters from Italy of the 8th which say, the French have lost since the beginning of this Campaign 15000 Men by Sicknefs, and Desertions; or Killed being out upon Parties; That their Hospitals at Cremona are full of sick and Wounded Men, and that Forage and Provisions were extremely scarce in their Camp, while Prince Eugene has enough in his to subsist his Troops 3 or 4 Months. The Duke of Savoy, upon some Disgust in the interview he had with the Duke of Anjou, was returned to Turin, and had plainly refused 6000 Men more which were desired of him by the French. It is said, the Detachment which the French designed to send from Italy to Marshal Gaimat's Army, is countermanded; and that a Party of Imperialists has taken Prisoners the Amozziados sent by the Duke of Mantua to compliment the Duke of Anjou on his Arrival in the Duchy of Milan.

Portsmouth, July 21. Sir John Manners, Rear-Admiral of the Red, hoisted his Flag this day on the Mizzen-top-mast of Her Majesty's Ship the Victory.
