From the French Camp at Colorno, July 24. N. S.

THE 19th Instant, the Duke of Vendosme went to *Castellvetto*, where the Forces which lately passed the *Po* at *Cremona* were encamped, and marched with them to *Corse-Maggiore*; The 20th he encamped at *San-Secondo*, on the River *Taro* near *Casal-Maggiore*, whither our Bridge of Boats was brought down from *Cremona*, which was made ready the 21st. The King of Spain came away that day from *Cremona*, and arrived the 22d at *Casal-Maggiore*, where he found the rest of the Forces that were ordered to join the Army from the Camp of *Rivaria*. That day we received an Account, That Prince *Eugene* had withdrawn his Forces which were posted along the River *Lenza*, and had caused his Bridge of Boats over that River to be broken down, and that he was encamped with the best part of his Army near the River *Croffolo*; whereupon the Duke of Vendosme passed over the River *Taro* with a Body of Horse and Dragoons, and marched to *Colorno*, to secure the Stone Bridge there over the River *Parma*. The rest of the Army followed in two Columns, one of which was to ford over the *Taro*, and the other was to pass over a Bridge of Boats we had made on that River: But scarce 7 Battalions had passed over, when the River swelled so high, by reason of a great Rain that fell the night before, that it carried away our Bridge; however by the next day two other Bridges of Boats were prepared, over which the rest of those Forces marched, and they came up to our Camp; and then the Duke of Vendosme went to *Casal-Maggiore*, and directed the Forces which were there to pass over the *Po*, and they came and encamped at *Sacco*, within 2 Miles of *Colorno*. The King of Spain remains at *Casal-Maggiore* with the Gendarmerie, which attends him as a Guard, the Carabiniers, 2 Regiments of Spanish Horse, and the Brigade of Marines. To morrow the Army will march in three Columns, and will pass over the *Parma* upon the Stone Bridge above-mentioned, and upon 2 Bridges of Boats which we have lately made, and will encamp at *Sorbolo*, on the River *Lenza*, whither the King of Spain intends to come that day from *Casal-Maggiore*. And the 26th we are to pass over the *Lenza*, and to march to *Castellvovo*, near the River *Croffolo*. We are told, that Prince *Eugene* has withdrawn his Forces which were encamped near *Bersello*, and has taken part of his Artillery out of that Place, leaving only a Garison of 1500 Men there, and but 10000 Men in his Camp near *Mantua*.

Vienna, July 26. New Levies are making with very good Success in several parts of the Emperor's Hereditary Dominions, for recruiting and augmenting his Forces; And it is said he intends to take into his Service several Regiments more of the Forces of such Princes of the Empire as shall be willing to lend them, and to raise the Militia in his own Dominions, which amounts to 30000 Men, and employ them in garisoning his fortified Places during the War.

From the Imperial Camp before Landau, July 31. The King of the Romans arrived here the 28th Instant from *Hesselsberg*, and was entertained with a Discharge of

220 Cannon-shot and 237 Bombs against the Town of *Landau*, which did great execution there. Two new Batteries are raised against it, and all our other Works are carried on with the greatest Diligence and Application. Last night a Party of about 50 Granadiers made a feint Attack upon the Citadel, in order to entice the French to destroy some of their own Mines, which had this Effect, that upon the Approach of our Men, the French who were upon the Counterscarp retired and set fire to two Mines, but our Granadiers, instead of pursuing the Enemy, returned to their Trenches. We hope in few days to have prepared all Matters, so as to be able to make a general Attack upon the Counterscarp.

Hamburgh, August 4. Letters from *Cracow* of the 26th past say, the King of Poland continues encamped near that Place, having got some part of his Forces together again, and expected to be shortly joined by the 8000 Saxons from *Silesia*. These Letters add, That he did not lose above 15 or 1600 Men in the late Engagement with the Swedes, and that Lieutenant-General *Tramp*, and several other Officers of Note, who were reported to have been killed, were come to *Cracow*. Some Deserters from the Swedish Army report, That the Duke of *Holslein Gessorp* had received a Wound in that Action, of which he is since dead; But this wants Confirmation.

From the Camp of the Allies at *Peer*, Aug. 7. On Saturday the 5th Instant the Army marched from *Petit-Bruggel*, and encamped in this Place, having the River *Dennell* on our Right, *Erlicum* on our Left, and *Peer* in our Front, where most of the Generals have taken their Quarters. The Enemy have likewise removed their Camp from *Hasselt*, and have now their head Quarters at *Bringen*, not far from *Diest*, on the *Demer*, having a small Rivulet before them. Our Army will continue here some days, while the necessary Preparations are making for some Siege, which his Excellency the Earl of *Mirlborough* is to cover with the main Army. In the mean time our Forces will be employed in dismantling *Peer* and *Ercy*, two small walled Towns that have been of great use to the Enemy, in securing their Convoys. We shall likewise attack *Wegert*, another walled Town lying between this Place and *Veris*, where they have had a considerable Garison all this Summer, but have now quitted the Town, and left only 100 Men to defend the Castle. The Earl Rivers arrived here last Thursday night from *Holland*, as Monsieur *d'Obam*, General of Horse in the Service of the States, and the Earl of *Albemarle*, did this day.

Paris, Aug. 5. A Courier arrived here the 3d Instant from the King of Spain's Army in *Italy*, who brings an Account, That the 26th of the last month it passed over the River *Lenza* in several Columns, and encamped at *Castell-Novo*; That the Duke of Vendosme having Intelligence that General *Vicenti* was encamped at *Santa-Vittoria* with 3 Regiments of Horse and 1 of Dragoons, marched from the Camp about 2 that afternoon with 25 Squadrons of Horse and 14 Companies of Granadiers to attack them, but meeting with a more vigorous Resistance than he expected, he sent to the King of Spain for more Forces, who came with them himself, accompanied by all the Officers of Note that were left in the Camp, so that the Germans were at last forced to give way, and retired towards their main Army; That we had a great number of Officers and Soldiers killed and wounded in this Action, and among the last were the Marquis of *Quartign* and Mr. *Shelton*. The Enemy's Loss is said to be greater than ours, having left behind them many of their Men slain and taken Prisoners, in the number of which last is reckoned the *Her Starckenberg*, Lieutenant-Colonel of the Regiment of *Darmstadt*, and their Baggage: And that the Duke of Vendosme led the Forces he first took with him, and 4 Brigades of Foot, near the Place where this Action happened, and returned with the King of Spain and the rest of the Troops to the Army, which was to encamp the 27th, and to continue their March.

Hague, Aug. 1. N. S. Our freshest Accounts from the Confederate Army commanded by the Earl of Marlborough say, they are encamped between Feer and Bray. The Duke of Burgundy's Army has repulsed the former at Dieff, and is encamped not far from that Town, where it has been joined by the Marquis of Baffar, and the Prince de Tilly, with the Forces under their Command, but is yet inferior to ours by number. The Duke of Burgundy's Orders to march with the Confederate Forces which lie at Kijferwart, Muzem and other Places on the Lower Rhine; it is said, a strong Detachment of the Garrison of Miftrich is to join them, and that they will undertake the Siege of Feer, or of some other Place on the Maefe, for which purpose a very considerable Train of Artillery, with a considerable quantity of Ammunition, Bombs, &c. was sent that way some days ago from Deff; And that General Ouborn is to have the Chief Direction of the Siege. The States General have lately made a Promotion of several General Officers. Sir David Mitchell is frequently in Conference with the Deputies of the Admiralty.

Plymouth, July 24. Her Majesty's Ship the *Swallow* came into this Port yesterday, with the *James O'Connell*, *James Mitchell*, and the *Albatross*, *the two Moor Matton*, born of *London*, and bound for *Cork*, and the *John and Elizabeth*, *Thomas Perbrook*, *Master*, and the *Thomas and Martin*, *Thomas Perbrook*, *Master*, both bound for *London*, as did likewise Her Majesty's Ships the *S. Anne* and *Morant*, with the *Professor*, *William Williams*, *Master*, and the *Hannah*, *John Wigginton*, *Master*, both bound to *Chiltham*, the *Dutchess Duke*, *Dutton Leggett*, *Master*, for *Bristol*, and 13 small Vessels from the Isle of *Wight*, for *London*; all which Ships sailed again this day. The *Robert*, *John Spring*, *Master*, arrived here this day from *London*, and the *Albatross*, *Thomas Bond*, *Master*, from *Solway*.
