

"Whereas we are satisfied that the President and Scholars of the College of Saint Mary Magdalen in the University of Oxford (hereinafter called 'the said President and Scholars') are the patrons or persons entitled to present or nominate to the said benefice in case the same were now vacant:

"And whereas the said President and Scholars desire to transfer the advowson of the said benefice to the Bishop of Chichester for the time being and are consenting to this Scheme (in testimony whereof they have affixed their common or corporate seal to this Scheme):

"And whereas we are satisfied that the transfer will tend to make better provision for the cure of souls:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend George, Bishop of Chichester (in testimony whereof he has executed this Scheme), we, the said Church Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice shall be transferred to the said George, Bishop of Chichester and his successors in the same Bishopric and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the Bishop of Chichester for the time being."

"And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately upon the publication of this Order in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Chichester.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Minister of Health, after giving 10 days' previous notice of his intention in that behalf, has, under the provisions of the Burial Act, 1853 (16 & 17 Vict. c. 134); as amended by subsequent enactments, made a Representation to His Majesty in Council that for the protection of the Public Health, the opening of any new burial ground in the Civil Parish of Newington, in the County of Kent, save with the previous approval of the Minister of Health, should be prohibited, and that burials should be discontinued therein as hereinafter directed:

And whereas by an Order in Council of the 27th April, 1948, Notice of such Representation was given, and it was ordered that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on the 31st day of May next, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. No new burial ground shall be opened in the said Civil Parish of Newington save with the previous approval of the Minister of Health, and burials shall be discontinued therein as follows, viz.:

*Newington*.—Forthwith and entirely in the Churchyard of the Parish Church of Saint Mary, Newington, Next Sittingbourne.

Provided that—

(a) In any vault or walled grave now existing in the said Churchyard, burial may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such vault or grave be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b) In any earthen grave now existing in the said Churchyard, the burial may be allowed of the body of any member of the family of the person or persons heretofore buried in such grave, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

(c) In the said Churchyard, in any grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place, the burial may be allowed of the body of any person for whom or of any member of a family for which such grave space has been reserved and appropriated as a burial place, with the exclusive right of burial therein, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

2. This Order may be cited as the Burial Grounds (Newington) Order, 1948.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Minister of Health, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the Parishes hereinafter mentioned and to the respective Ministers of the Methodist Churches and Unitarian Chapel also hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention in that behalf, has, under the provisions of the Burial Act, 1853, as amended by subsequent enactments, made a Representation to His Majesty in Council that, for the protection of the public health, burials should be discontinued in the following churchyards and graveyards, viz.:

*Manchester*.—1. St. Barnabas' Churchyard.

Forthwith and entirely in the Churchyard of St. Barnabas, Openshaw.

2. Blackley Methodist Churchyard.

Forthwith and entirely in the Churchyard of the Blackley Methodist Church, Exchange Street, Blackley.

3. Chorlton Methodist Church Graveyard.

Forthwith and entirely in the Graveyard of the Chorlton Methodist Church, Beech Road, Chorlton-cum-Hardy.

4. Blackley Unitarian Chapel Graveyard.

Forthwith and entirely in the Graveyard of the Blackley Unitarian Chapel, Chapel Lane, Blackley.

5. Christchurch Churchyard.

Forthwith and entirely in the Churchyard of Christ Church, Bradford-cum-Beswick.

Provided that—

In the earthen grave now existing in the Churchyard of Christ Church, Bradford-cum-Beswick, in which the remains of Robert Fishwick are interred, the burial may be allowed at her decease of the body of Elizabeth Alice Fishwick subject however to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a less depth than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground.

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give Notice of such Representation and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on the 3rd day of August next.

And His Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette, and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the Churches and Chapel of, or on some conspicuous places within the Parishes affected by such Representation one month before the said 3rd day of August.

CARRIAGE BY AIR ACT, 1932.
