A PROCLAMATION.

ANNE R.

Whereas it has been Represented to Us, That the Meeting of Our Parliament on the Eighth Day of October next (to which the same is now Prorogued) will be Inconvenient to Our Subjects who are Members of Parliament, and likewise Employed in Our service in the Countrey where they dwell; We therefore, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, have Resolved to defer the Meeting of Our said Parliament to the Twentieth Day of the said Month. And We do hereby Direct the Keeper of Our Great Seal of England to Prepare a Writ Patent under the Great Seal, for Proroguing Our said Parliament to the Twentieth Day of October next, on which Day the said Parliament shall Sit for the Discharge of their Weighty Affairs. And hereof We do Require the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Barons and Burgesses of the said Parliament to take Notice to give their Attendance at Westminster on the Twentieth Day of October next.

Given at Our Court at Bath the Sixth Day of September, 1702. In the First Year of Our Reign.

GOD Save the QUEEN.

Rome, Aug. 10. N. S. The Pope has called home his Troops he formerly lent to the Duke of Parma to garrison his Towns of Parma and Piacenza, in order to enable him the better to obtain a Neutrality between the Emperor and France, and it is said they are to join those which are on the Borders of the Kingdom of Naples under the Command of Signior Falconieri, who has Orders to hinder the Executions made upon the Pope's Subjects by those who are in Arms against the Emperor in the Province of Abruzzo, and not to give them any Disturbance so long as they keep out of the Ecclesiastical Territories. The Pope has given Directions for finishing certain Works which were begun by his Ambassador at Civitavecchia and Port Nettuno for the Security of those Ports, and has ordered a considerable Sum of Money to be paid out of his Treasury for that purpose. He has directed the Congregation of the Inquisition to proceed with Dispatch against the Jesuits, upon Complaint, That they allow their Converts to retain a great part of their former Superstitions and Superfluities, and to mix them with the Rites of the Romish Church; which Matter has been long depending, but through the Artifice of the Jesuits, and the great Interest they have made to delay it, could never be determined. A Congregation also is appointed to inspect the Conduct of those in Religious Orders that live in Monasteries, with Intent to reform many Abuses that are crept into them, and to oblige them to a more strict Observance of the Rules prescribed them by the Founders of their Orders.

Riga, August 24. The 19th Instant we had Account, that the Muscovites were retired from the neighbourhood of Dantz; but the next day we received Advice, that as they were

actually marching in order to return home, they were met by one of their Generals, who came with Orders from the Czar for them to return, and to Spoil the Country of Livonia on this side, which they are now putting in Execution; and yesterday our Governor being informed, that they had plundered and burnt several Houses about 7 Leagues from hence, sent out a Party of 400 Horse to observe them, who fell upon 1000 of their Horse and routed them; but our Men having Intelligence, that a Body of 12000 of the Enemy were not far off, retired, bringing with them 20 Prisoners, who report, that the rest of their Army is coming up, to the number of 60000 Men, under the Command of General Ozeremet, and that they plunder and burn all before them, and many of the Country People to avoid their Fury have taken Refuge here. In the mean time General Schlippenbach is getting together what Force he can near Pernau, in order to oppose them.

Venna, Aug. 30. Te Deum was sung in our Churches last Sunday, with a triple Discharge of our Cannon, for the Joy of Prince Eugene's late Victory over the French Army in Italy; of which we received a particular Account by Count Simonetti, who arrived from his Highness's Camp two days ago. The Duke of Caserta is also arrived from thence. The Emperor has given Orders for adding 2 Troops to each Regiment of his Horse that is in Hungary.

Berlin, Sept. 5. The Electress Dowager of Hanover, who came to see the Queen of Prussia her Daughter, parted from Lutzbourg some days ago in order to return home; She was nobly entertained at Potsdam by the King of Prussia, and one of his Principal Officers waited upon her Electoral Highness to the Frontiers. That King has made Monsieur Wartenleben Field-Marshal of his Forces. The Czar of Muscovy's Ambassador has lately had Audience of Leave of the King at Potsdam, and will depart from hence in few days for Muscovy.

Hamburg, Sept. 8. N. S. Letters from Warsaw give an Account, that the King of Poland was with his Army near Sandomir, where a great number of the Nobility met together on Horleback to consult what Measures to take in the present Conjunction; this Assembly was not without some Disorder, and the Weywode of Kalitz, who was present, being accused of Corresponding with the Swedes, narrowly escaped being cut in pieces; They generally appeared inclined to assist the King of Poland, but in the first place to endeavour to accommodate Matters between him and the King of Sweden; Which other Letters from Poland give us hopes of, the Cardinal Primate employing his Endeavours for that purpose with good Success. In the mean time the Muscovites continue to destroy the Country of Livonia, and according to our Accounts from Riga they were advanced within 10 Miles of that Place with an Army of 80000 Men, and a considerable Train of Artillery.

Falmouth, Sept. 5. Five Dutch Privateers have brought into this Port since the 3d Instant six French Prizes, one of them a Ship of above 200 Tuns laden with Whalebone, &c. from Greenland, one from Martinico, one from Rochel laden with Salt and Brandy, and the other three from the Bank of Newfoundland.

Plymouth, Sept. 6. This day came in here a Merchant Ship from *Jamaica*, the Master whereof reports, that being in the Latitude of 35 Degrees he saw 34 Sail of Ships, which by the Circumstances he judges to be the Spanish Gallies, having White Colours and a Ragged Staff in the middle of the Ensign.

Trynmouth, Sept. 7. About 300 Sail of Light Colliers sailed from hence the 3d Instant for *New-castle*, under Convoy of Her Majesty's Ships the *Dover* and *Ips*.

Canter, Sept. 7. A Dutch Privateer sent in fifteen last night a French Privateer belonging to *Spain*, of 12 Guns, 6 Patereroes, and 72 Men, which he took in the Bay of *Biscay*.

Plymouth, Sept. 8. Her Majesty's Ship the *Newfield* came to *Spithead* the 6th Instant with four French Prizes, one of them laden with Logwood and Sugar, and another with Oil. Yesterday Her Majesty's Ship the *Sarborough* arrived at *Spithead* from *Jamaica*, having spent 8 weeks and 5 days in her Passage; She left the Island very healthy, as also the Squadron of Her Majesty's Ships commanded by Vice-Admiral *Benbow*, who intended to sail from thence in few days.

Whitehall, Sept. 9. Letters from *Lisbon* of the 25th of *August*, O. S. bring us the following Particulars concerning our Fleet; That on the 9th of *August* as they passed the Cape St. *Vincent*, and being come to *Lagos* Bay, the Admiral sent ashore for Refreshments only, (without coming to an Anchor) which were sent immediately to him. On the 15th our Forces, under the Command of his Grace the Duke of *Ormond*, landed between a Place called *La Rota* and Port St. *Mary's*, the Spaniards from *Cadiz* opposing them, but after a great many of their Men were killed, and the Governor of *La Rota* was mortally wounded, they were routed and run away, and the Fort thereupon surrendered. On the 16th they marched to a Place called the *Canuclar*, passing behind the Fort *Santa Catalina* and Port St. *Mary's*, and took the Castles there, where the Spanish and French Men of War lay, so that those Ships seemed to be at our Mercy. That day they came to Port St. *Mary's*, where there was no appearance of Resistance; and the Express who brought the Letters affirms, that in his fight they took Possession of that Port. By an Express from *Lagos* on the 22d we had Advice, that there was heard at that Place, although 42 Leagues distant from *Cadiz*, a great noise of firing of great Guns without intermission. There are Reports of the Surrender of *Cadiz*, which although not altogether certain, yet from the Measures taken we have reason to expect News of good Success.

His Grace the Duke of *Ormond*, at his first coming on the Spanish Coast, published a Declaration dated the 21st of *August*, N. S. setting forth, That Her Majesty the Queen of Great-Britain having been pleased to give him the Command of the Forces which Her Majesty has joined with those of the States-General, for asserting the Rights of the House of *Austria*, in pursuance of their Treaties of Alliance with the Emperor, his Grace judged it necessary, before he made use of the said Forces, to declare, That he did not come thither to possess himself of any Place of the Spanish Monarchy in the Name of Her Majesty or of the States-General of the United Provinces, or to introduce therein the usual Troubles and Calamities of War by the way of Conquest, but rather to defend the Good and Loyal Subjects of the said Monarchy, and to free them from the insupportable Slavery whereto they are brought and led to France by some distressed Persons: Wherefore the Design of Her Majesty and the States-General being only to assert the Rights of the House of *Austria*, his Grace declared, That all good Spaniards that

should not oppose his Forces should be protected in their Persons, Estates, Privileges, Religion, &c. but contrary to Expectation, they did not come with the said Good to witness, but then the Hostilities committed by the Troops and his Command may be taken the Spaniards themselves, who having so fair an Opportunity to show their Loyalty, and fulfil the duties of their Obligations and Interest, refused to do so.

There are Letters from *Lisbon* of the 6th Instant, N. S. that say, That upon the appearance of the English Fleet upon the Coast of *Spain*, that Court had declared, That France not having assisted them for the Defence of their Coast according to their Treaties, they did not think themselves further obliged by them, and looked upon the Allies to be their Friends. That thereupon the French Officers of the Artillery that were there were gone, some for *Cadiz*, where it is probable they came too late, and the rest, with the Gunners and Granadiers, went on board the French Men of War in that River. And that the Portuguese Militia was dismissed, and their Regular Troops sent back to their former Quarters.

The Dutch Mail of Friday last is not yet come in.
