

from thence towards Offenbourg, where they are to be joined by the Forces which the Margrave of Baden Dourlac had drawn together for the better Security of that Country during the Siege of Landau, and then they are to march towards Uim, to make head against the Elector of Bavaria. The French Army commanded by the Marshal de Catinat is intrenching under the Cannon of Strasbourg. The King and Queen of the Romans are on their departure for Vienna; but the King will leave his Equipage at Heidelberg, intending to return into these Parts early the next Campaign. The Elector of Mentz is gone thither to make them a Visit

From the Camp of the Allies at Soutendael, October 2. Our Batteries began to play upon Stevenswaert on Saturday, and continued firing without intermission till about 10 last night, when the Belieged having abandoned the Counter-scarp, and our Men being ready to mount the Breach, they bear a Parley, and desired to Capitulate; whereupon the Hostages being exchanged, the Articles of Capitulation were this day agreed upon, and the Garrison, consisting of about 400 Men, are to be conducted to Namur. We found in the Town near 300 Barrels of Powder, with all manner of Stores in proportion, and great quantities of Provisions; We have not lost one Officer, and not above 5 or 6 private Men, in the taking of the Place: Of the Enemy we reckon 50 killed, besides the wounded. We expect every day to hear that the Batteries are finish'd before Raremonde, and do not question to be Masters of the Place in 4 or 5 days after they begin to fire. Monsieur Doff is gone to Landau, to confer with the King of the Romans and Prince Lewis of Baden about the Security of the Upper Rhine, and the Measures to be taken to put a stop to the farther Designs of the Elector of Bavaria.

Paris, Sept. 30. Letters from Italy of the 15th Instant say, the French and the Imperial Armies were still in the same Camps, and that ours suffered very much by Sickness, that Country being very unhealthy at this Season. The Chevalier de Fourbin continued to cruize in the Adriatick Gulph with the French Squadron under his Command.

Hague, October 3. N. S. This day we received an Account of the Surrender of Stevenswaert upon the following Articles:

That the Garrison should march out of the Place with Arms and Baggage, Drums beating, Colours flying, &c. That two Pieces of Cannon 12 Pounders should be allowed them; and 42 Wagons, whereof 12 to be covered, for their Sick and Wounded; and for their Baggage: That they should be conducted by the shortest way in 5 days to Namur: That the Town should not be Plundered, nor the Inhabitants disturbed in the Exercise of their Religion; but if any of them was desirous to retire, 6 weeks time should be allowed him to do it in: That the Garrison should march out the 3d Instant, at 8 in the morning: That the Wounded who are not in a Condition to march, might remain in the Hospital, with a Chirurgion to look after them: That the Ammunition, Stores, Artillery and Arms, in the Magazine, should be delivered up to the Commissioners who should be sent the next day into the Town for that purpose; to whom the Mines should be faithfully discovered: And lastly, That the Ravelins before the Gate should be delivered up to our Troops that night, and one of the Gates the next morning at 6 of the Clock. Dated October 2. N. S. at 2 of the Clock in the morning.

The French seem to have a Design to quit Liege, and the People are in Apprehension of being Plundered by them before they go. The States are sitting out several Men of War; but upon what Design is kept very secret. The Convoy from England that brought over Mr. Aglionby, Her Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary to the Swiss Cantons, is arrived, and he speaks of going from hence to morrow on his Journey thither. Sir David Mitchell, the Wind continuing contrary, is come back hither from the Brill. They write from Switzerland, that 500 Men of the Canton of Bern were marched with Artillery, &c. to oppose the Designs of the Elector of Bavaria, having already killed 2 or 300 of his Men in the Black Forest; and that 5000 Men more of the Protestant and Catholick Cantons were following those before-mentioned, in order to form a Body of an Army.

Portsmouth, Sept. 25. Yesterday the Rt. Hon. the Lord Marquis of Carmarthen had the White Flag hoisted on the Fore-top Mast of Her Majesty's Ship the Royal William, lying in our Harbour. The Hampton Court, and 7 more of Her Majesty's Ships, with about 100 Sail of Coasters, Victuallers, Storeships, &c. came yesterday from the Downes, and joined Her Majesty's Ships at Spithead under the Command of Sir Cloudesly Shovel.
