Virginia, July 29.

François Nicholson Esq; Lieutenant and Governor-General of Her Majesty's Colony and Dominion of Virginia, having received Letters from the Lords of Her Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council and the Lords Commissioners for Trade and Plantations, directing him to Proclaim Her Majesty throughout that Colony; Orders were thereupon given, That the Militia should appear in Arms; and accordingly on the 10th of June last Her Majesty was proclaimed with all the Solemnity the Country was capable of; The Confluence of People was so great, that there never was such an Appearance in Virginia before. The Governor (on his Part) spared neither Cost nor Pains to have it done as became Loyal and Dutiful Subjects.

From the Imperial Camp near Luzzara, Sept. 17. N.S. The 11th Instant, we saw the Gariton of Guastalla pass over the Enemy's Bridge on the Po, with Drums-beating, Colours flying, &c. who are to be conducted to the Country of Tirol, and not to serve against the French during this Campaign. The 12th, we foraged towards the Botta with the loss only of some Horses: The 13th, our Left Wing foraged without any loss: The 14th, our Right foraged with a Guard of 200 Horses, whereof the Enemy having notice, they sent out of their Camp 1000 Horses, and as many Foot, who falling upon our Foragers took several of them, with about 12 Horses; the Marquis of Vaubonne immediately marched out with several Regiments to protect our foragers, but the French were retired in such haste, that he could not come up with them. A Party of Colonel Ebergeni's Huslars did, in sight of the Enemy's Camp, kill 5 Spanish Troopers, and bring off one of their wagons laden with Provisions. Another Party of our Huslars killed 20 of the Enemy near Marcate, took a Captain and a Lieutenant Prisoners, and some Cattel. The 16th, our Left Wing foraged without any loss, having a Guard of 200 Horses under the Command of Lieutenant-Colonel Gelhorn. We received an Account, that a Detachment of the Enemy was marching towards the Botta, and several Parties were sent out to get Intelligence, who brought Advice, that 6 Regiments of their Gendarmes with 22 Companies of Granadiers were going to encamp near that River, whereupon Prince Eugene sent Orders to Colonel Kirchbaum to march to Mirandola with 200 Horses, and with the Forces of Woltemburtel which lay at San Benedetto; His Highness detached the Marquis of Visconti with 700 Horses to observe the Enemy, and to protect our sick and wounded Men which are quartered at Rovero, and other Places thereabouts, and gave Directions that 600 Granadiers and Fusiliers should be in a readiness to march, and that Lieutenant-Colonel Gelhorn with his 200 Horses should also advance towards the Enemy to observe their Motions; who soon after sent an Account, that he believed this Body to be only a Guard to the Enemy's Foragers, and that about 400 of them fell in with a small Party of our Dragoons, which retreated in good order with the loss only of 3 Men. The 17th, in the morning, the Enemy pyled us with their Cannon very briskly, and at night made a general Discharge of their great and small Arms upon us, for joy that an Elector had in time of Peace with the Empire promised to return their Compliment upon a just occasion, Orders being given to fire *Ten Deum* for the taking of Landau, and to make three Discharges of all our Cannon and small Shot. The Marquis of Visconti is come back with the Detachment of Horse under his Command, the Body of the Enemy whom he was sent to observe being marched towards the Medenezze, where, as we are informed, they are foraging with a Guard of about thousand Men, and the Prince of Vandemont, Governor of Milan, being with them, it is not improbable that they have some farther design.

Copenhagen, Sept. 26. The French Ambassador here had private Audience of Leave yesterday of the King of Denmark, and is upon his departure home. The King intending to review the Land Militia of this Island, went this morning for that purpose to Fredericksburgh, where he will dine, and lie this night at Roeschild; He proposes to go to morrow to Kog, the 23th to Nefeld, the 29th to Anderschaw, and the 30th to Ringsted, where he will continue the two following days, and then return hither the 3d of the next Month. It is said, that His Majesty designs out of the Militia of this Place, which at present consists only of the Militia of this Regiment of Dragoons. The Muscovite Ambassador, who went from hence some Months ago to Berlin to wait upon the King of Prussia, is lately returned hither. Our Accounts from Courland say, a Body of Muscovites was come as far as Bauske in that Country.

Ratisbonne, September 28. The several Colleges having on the 26th Instant finished their Conclusions concerning the Declaration of War against France and Spain, the Electoral College and the College of Princes met yesterday, and took their Places in Ceremony, which is the first time the same has been done since the Peace of Ryswick; and then the Ministers of Mentz and Saltzbourg, their two Directors, having read openly each his Conclusion and interchanged them, each College retired apart, and after a short Consultation returned to their respective Places, and immediately gave Orders, That their Directors should draw up one General Conclusion out of both; which is accordingly done, and the same was laid before them to day, Read and Approved by them, and likewise by the third College. The 20th Instant, the Count of Furstemberg and Lieutenant-General Hobenzollern were detached with 16000 Men from the Imperial Army near Landau, with Orders to pass the Rhine, and prevent the joining of the Elector of Bavaria's Troops with those under the Marshal de Catinat, by which means he will not be in a condition to proceed farther in his Design, and may think it time, for his own Security, to consider of other Measures more agreeable to the Publick Good, especially considering the two Circles of Suabia and Franconia are so far from being moved either by his Pretences or Threats; that they highly resent his Letter upon the taking of Ulm, and are putting themselves into a Posture of Defence.

Berne, Sept. 28. The Troops of the Elector of Bavaria which were advancing towards the Frontiers of Switzerland are marching back, and we hear his Electoral Highness is returning with them into his own Country with all speed, fearing least the Detachment sent from the Imperial Army may have Orders, to fall upon his Territories.

Frankfort, October 1. The Imperial Army which was encamped near Croonweissenbourg, is marched to Haguenau, to oblige more narrowly the French Army commanded by the Marshal de Catinat, which continues under the Cannon of Strasbourg. The Deputies of the Circle of Suabia are to meet shortly at Heidelberg, and those of the Circle of Franconia at Neckars Ulm; about 2 Leagues from thence, to consider of taking such Measures as may prevent any other Designs of the Elector of Bavaria, that so the Peace of the Empire may be preserved.

Hamburg, October 3. According to our Accounts from Poland, great Endeavours are used to procure a Peace between the Kings of Sweden and Poland, with good hopes of Success. The Cardinal Primate had lately a long Conference with the King of Poland at Warsaw, wherein he obtained his Consent to several Particulars, which will much contribute to a good issue of this Negotiation; This Prince seems unwilling to forsake his Ally the Czar of Muscovy, which is urged by the Swedes as a Condition from which they will hardly depart. They write from Cracow, that the Cattle of that Place has been burnt down by the Negligence of some of the Swedes that were quartered in it, and that the whole Town was not without much difficulty preserved from being laid in Ashes.
