their defence, which news added for much courage to the Garrison, that they made a flour fally upon the Turks, and forced them out of the Baltion with much flaughter, in which servi e Monsieur de St. Andre Montbrun received a flight hu tin his fide by a Granado.

The Dake de reaufors being thus informed of the neceffity of his speedy appearan e ze Candia, altered his refolution of going to the Island of Cerigo, the place appoin.ed for the Rendez cus of the whole fuccors, and failed immediately with his Fleet for Suda, dispatching away fome Veffels to the Gallies with Orders to follow him thitter with all the, ip ed they were able.

The Venetian Amballador has by a Courier Extraordinary; received advice, that the Popes and Maltha Galies arrived the 18.h path at the Illand of Corfu, where they firid uill the 22, and then put to 'ea for Zante; and that the French Gallies arrived there the next day thinking to have toyned with them, but milling them, without

any kay put our zgàin with intendiors to follow them. A Bark lately artiving at Adapteilles from Confian ino-ple; as brought forme disparches from Monfieur de la Hay, our Amballation ar Laroffa the Matter informing, that palli g the 20th poilt by the Cape de Spada in the Island of Caudia, he heard much thoping from suda about 7 miles dillate from area, but passing on to Cerigo, he there met with 12 we than thiss, who informed him, that the f.id flooting was on it alutes upon the arrival of , the French Fleet at Suda, from whence the foid Venetian flips had been fent by the Duke de Beaufort to meet with the Auxiliary Gallies on the way from Zane, and to haften them on their way with Or ers to attend him at Suda; farther faying, that the Sieur d' Almergs was with three men of war jdyned with the French Fleer; and that the faid Sieur d' Almeras having during his flav no Milo, fens à Bark to Lariffa for intelligence, and to lound the Grand Segulors pleasure, had from thence te-ceived the Sultans Order to fail to Napoli di Romania, where an Ambifador fhould be ready to come aboard him and pass under his conduct to the Court of France, but that the Sieur d' Almeras being jealous of some farther defign, had fent onely his Firethip to receive him, if any fuch were there attending.

Paris; Fily 24. A week fince the Baron de Lerode, the Duke of Neubourgs Envoy, had his laft Audience from His Majelly, in which, in the name of the Duke his Maftqr, he gave His Majefly thanks for his good will and inr tention to promo e his interest in Paland, although they had been of light effect ; but that he could not but remonstrate that His Majefty could approve of the behaviour of the Biftop frefiers, H s Ambaffador in Poland, who had epenly efpouted the interest of the Prince of Conde, contrary to the Treaty at Berlin and His Majelties inftructisons, and had to ill referred the exclusion of the Prince of Conde that he afterwards refueed to come to an Audience to which that R publick had invited him, to which His Ma etty obligin\_lv anfwered to this purpole, that he was much afflicted at the ill fuccels of those Negotiations in Poland, in which he wanted not any good will to advance the Duke his Muffers intereft, and that he did not at all approve of he Bi hop of *Befiers* refulal of Audience, nor was he latisfy'll with any reafons he had yet alledged for the fame and that he had therefore recalled him to render him a better calon, and account of his actions.

On Sunday following, the faid -Envoy departed hence on his way for Liege, where he is to continue for lome time.

Paris July 27. On Sunday laft His Majefty was pleafed to fend for Chevalier de Fourilles, to whole care and prudence the has committed the inspection of all his Mili-'tary affairs in the Metherlands, who is accordingly going to the Frontiers ; His Majefty expecting by him a more exact account then hath hitherto been given bim of his firength both of Horfe and Foot in those Provinces. The Dauphin continues ill with a Couch and a continu-

ed Fevor, yet his recovery is not at all dispaired of, ma-ny perfons having fallen into the same distemper, who are. rgain reftored to perfect health.

His Majefty has been lately pleafed in confideration of the fervices of tie Duke de Chaulnes, to confert on him the charge of Lieurenant-General of Bretagne, upon the Relignation of the Duke Mazarin.

From Ma feilles we are adviled by a thip lately arrived from the Levant, that fome Privateers of Mattha had met with the Turkish Convoy from Alexandria, and that the Chevalier Marioy of Marfeilles, who commanded as Captain in one of these Maltha Gaps, being grapled with a Turkish thip of 70 Guns, which took fire and perished in the dispute, had received much prejudice by the flames, but got off again, whill the other Privateers feiled upon another great thip of 50 Guns, and four Saichs, which they carries off as Prize.

From spain they write, that the new, Regime it of Guards is much advanced, and already conlists of 700 men, who have been muffered, and are to receive their Colours with much Ceremony on the feast day of St. Fames.

Brußels fune 25. The Confiable of Califile is full at Antwerp ; from whence is returned hither the rince de Ligne, having with the Chancelour of Brabant been magnificently treated in that Citty at the Election of their new

Migistrates. The Marquis d' Humieres is at Aeth, from whence he is Orderen not to move till the French have furnished themselves with a sufficient quantity of Lime and Coaless we apprehend nor any holtility as formerly from them, but the Constable has for prevention of any sudden attempt temforced the Gauifons of Mons, St Gillaine and Conde, and given order for the reparation of the fortifications.

The Constable still continues to demand the sume of 59 thouland Forms, as a gratuity for the City of Antwerp, but they feem not at all inclinable to comply with him : nor are our people pleafed with the Garrilon, whole Souldie s for want of ftrict difcipline commit many roberyes and mue er , yesterday here happened a great tumult between them and the Cittizens, which might have had very ill confequence had not the Magifirates of the Litty and the Officers of the Garrifon timely uled their endeavours to appeale th.m.

F om Aix La Chappelle they inform us, of the arrival the of his Highnels the Prince of Juscany the 16th inftant from Holland, where Monlegnior Francistti the Popes Nuncio, received him with much honour and refpect, fending his Coach with his Audior to attend him upon the way, the Magistrates of the Town employing also an Officer to compliment the Prin e, and know his pleafure whither he would accept of the Honour which they were ready to pay him of a publick Entry, which the Prince excufed, as he had done in other places during his Travels ; after some little ftay there, in which time he received the Compliments of the Nuncio and Magistrates, he went thence the Friday following towards the spa, and from thence intends to direct his course towards France.

Portfmouth, July 21. On Tuesday laft, Sir Thomas Allen with the Iquadron of His Majefties thips under his Command, fet fail for the Streights with a fair wind.
