Venice, Sept. 29. N. S.

THE Cardinal *d'Estrees* will be going from hence very soon to wait upon the Duke of Anjou, who, we hear, intends to set his Camp on the 2d of the next Month, in order to return to Milan, and from thence to the Imperial Army continues in the Camp near Luzzara, and they are intrenching themselves, and fortifying Mirandola. The Cardinal intend, as it is said, to demolish the Castle of Luzzara, and have mounted several Guns at Viadana; They are getting together all the Provisions they can, in order to erect a Magazine at Mantua, and seem rather to care for going into Winter Quarters than making in hand the Siege of Bersello, or any new Enterprize. The French Court continue to treat this Republick in a very Imperious manner, and that King pretending lately to have offered an Affront from them, in that they had put to Death for several enormous Crimes some of their own Subjects who bore his Commisfaction. The Cardinal *d'Estrees* gave them to understand, that the King his Master expected they should send an Ambassador on purpose to request his Pardon, which if they refused to do, he would expect Two; If these were denied they must send Four; Upon their farther refusal he would expect Six; And if they persisted in their refusal nothing should make Attonement but the Death of the Doge and Six Councillors. The Count de Fourbin was seen this week off of France with the French Squadron under his Command.

October 5. The 2d Instant we received by a Courier, that the Elector of *Bavaria* being with his Army before *Memmingen*, and having bombarded it, the Inhabitants were put into Consternation, that they opened their Gates to the King's Army, and the Elector's Army, who are so differently fortified, but had no Garison; and that it requires 4 or 5000 Men to defend the same. The Elector cannot well spare at present; the Duke of *Baden* is marching towards *Fribourg* with 3000 Men, but his Design is kept very secret. The King of the *Romans*, with the News, that the Elector of *Bavaria* had attacked a Detachment of the *Bavarian* Army in the *Schwarze-Waldt*, near the *Kemzingen*, had defeated them, killing 500 of them on the 27th Instant, and at the same time Major General *Haguenau* with some Battalions of Foot sent Orders to repair the Fortifications of which the French have entirely ruined, and ordered Batteries to be raised against Fort *Memmingen*, in order to bombard it. Another Detachment of the Elector's Army was to march towards *Elzas Zabern*, by the narrow Passages towards the Dutchy of *Alsace*. The French Army is also divided into three Divisions, the Cardinal being encamped with one of them near the Canon of *Strasbourg*, for the Security of that Place; Count *Guisard* being marching towards *Saltzburg* and *Elzas Zabern*, in order to keep the *German*s will prevent him; and another of 10000 strong, under the Command of *de Villars*, drawing towards *Heuningen*

and *New-Brisac*, in order to endeavour to join with the Elector of *Bavaria*: That Elector has given Orders that all his Militia should march immediately, in order to defend the Lines which he has directed to be made along his Frontiers; And yesterday the Magistrates of this City received a Letter from him, requiring them to send thither the Quota of Men which they are to furnish, as being a Member of the Circle of *Bavaria*; but it is believed they will excuse themselves, as well as the other Members of this Circle, to whom like Letters have been dispatched, seeing the Troubles which the Elector is at present engaged in are his own particular Concern, and have no relation to the Affairs of the Circle.

Francfort, October 8. The Elector of *Bavaria* having taken *Memmingen*, we hear he is marched with his Army towards *Norlingen*, another Imperial Town, or rather, as is generally believed, towards *Kempen*, the taking of which Place would be more advantageous to him in securing his Frontiers. The *German* Forces at *Friedlingen* have lately been reinforced, in order to hinder the French Troops which are marching towards *Heuningen* from passing the *Rhine*. Another Body of the *German* Forces which is lately come before Fort *Louis* has taken two Redoubts belonging to that Fort, taking Prisoners about 600 French Soldiers that were posted therein, and our Men are preparing to bombard that Place.

Hamburg, October 10. Our Letters from *Poland* do still give us great hopes of a Peace between the Kings of *Sweden* and *Poland*, who of late have shewn much Civility to each other; all the Prisoners that have been taken by either side being immediately sent back, with Compliments to their Masters. Some Advices say, a second Cessation of Arms was agreed upon between them, but this is not very certain. In the mean time the Deputies appointed by the Republick to wait upon the King of *Sweden*, in order to promote this Negotiation, are on their way to *Cracow*, and have with them a Letter from the Cardinal Primate to that King, wherein he exhorts him in very Pathetick Terms to an Accommodation. The Nobility of the *Greater Poland* are entred into a Confederacy, whereby they solemnly engage to assist their King with their Lives and Fortunes, if the *Swedes* refuse to make Peace upon reasonable Terms, and in that case to make diligent enquiry after those who invited the *Swedes* into *Poland*, in order to punish them as Traitors, with the utmost Severity; But there is a Clause, That before they take the Field, the King shall enter into a new Engagement, to maintain them in their Privileges, which some Letters say he has already done: His Troops were marched towards *Prussia*, where the Magistrates of *Dantzick*, *Elbing*, and *Thorn*, had Orders to provide for their Subsistence; and he designed to be going thither himself from *Warsaw*, as soon as he should have Advice that the *Swedes* were broke up from *Cracow*, who, by reason of the Scarcity of Forrage in that Country, had also resolved to take Winter Quarters in *Prussia*.

last night from *Ruennede*, who assured us, that a Detachment of 20 Squadrons of Horse and 12 Battalions of Foot, of the Forces that were employed in the Siege of that Place, will be here this day, and that our Artillery is coming from thence up the *Maese* with all possible diligence; whereupon his Excellency the Earl of *Marlborough* has given Orders for the Army to march this night, and to pass the *Jaar*, which will oblige the Enemy either to march to *Liege* to secure that Place, and to leave their Lines and all the Country of *Brabant* open to us, or else (as is most probable) to post themselves so as to secure the latter, and to leave us at liberty to attack *Liege*; in which case we shall march directly thither, and may be before it by to-morrow night, in order to form the Siege as soon as the Artillery comes up; And we hope by the taking of that Place to put a Glorious end to this Campaign: We hear the Enemy have already taken all their Stores and Provisions out of that City, and have given Orders, That upon the first Notice, which is to be by firing off a great Gun, the Garrison shall immediately retire into the Citadel, and a Place called the *Charreufe*, which is also fortified. Yesterday morning a Detachment of Dutch Horse and Dragoons met with a Party of 120 of the Enemy's Foot near *Tongeren*, of whom they killed several, and took Prisoners about 100, with the Commander, and have brought them into our Camp; There appeared likewise 4 Squadrons of their Horse, who immediately retired upon the approach of our Men. Yesterday his Excellency took a Review of the *English* Foot, as he had done before of the Horse, and the Foreign Troops, and found them all in very good Condition. We hear the Count *de Tallard* is retired in haste towards *Bon*, without executing his Design upon *Dusseldorp*.

Hague, October 13. N. S. The Forces which were before *Ruennede* were yesterday to join the Army of the Allies commanded by the Earl of *Marlborough*, and his Excellency would be this day before *Liege*, with intent to make himself Master of that Town, and afterwards to oblige the *French* Army to retire from *Tongres*. A Detachment of the Forces of the Allies is marched towards *Limbourg*. The Body of our Forces sent after the Count *de Tallard* is advanced to *Mulheim*, and their Commander has sent a Message to the Magistrates of *Cologne*, requiring them to depart from the Engagement which they have lately entered into with the *French*, to observe a Neutrality; since being forced thereto by the fear of a Bombardment, it cannot in Justice be binding. Count *Tallard*, upon the approach of our Troops, repassed the *Rhine* with the Forces under his Command with great Precipitation, and is marching towards the Dutchy of *Luxemburgh*, having with him the Elector of *Cologne*, who has left *Bon* out of apprehension that our Forces will bombard it. Our Letters from *France*, which came in this day, make no manner of mention of the Plate Fleet, which they assured us by the foregoing Post was got into *Vigo*; This makes some Persons call in question the truth of that Advice.

Hull, October 3. Her Majesty's Ship the *Portland* came into the *Humber* the 30th past, with several Merchant Ships from the *Sound* under his Convoy.

Falmouth, October 3. Seven Dutch Privateers, the least of 18 Guns, sailed from hence yesterday morning for *Holland*, taking with them 22 *French* Prizes, which they had at several times brought into this Port; Another Dutch Privateer was coming in with two *French* Prizes, but this Fleet not being out of fight, he failed after them.

Plymouth, October 4. Sir *Claude* Shovell failed by this Place the 30th past to the Westward, and was joined by divers *East-India* Ships, and other outward-bound Merchant Men, which lately came in here from the *Downes*. A Danish Ship came into this Port the next day from *St. Martin's*, the Master whereof reports, that the *French* there grow very poor for want of Trade. Yesterday the *Shrewsbury* Gally of *London*, bound to *Guinea*, with about 60 other Merchant Ships bound to *Wales*, *Bristol*, and *Ireland*, failed from hence under the Convoy of Her Majesty's Ships the *Hastings* and the *Dolphin*; And the *Buffenburgh* of *Flushing* brought in 3 *French* Prizes, one of them from *Newfoundland*, and the other two from *Lisbon*. This day the Easterly Wind put into our Harbour several Dutch Privateers bound for *Holland*, with about 20 Prizes, which they had brought from *Falmouth*.

Cowes, October 5. A Dutch Caper of 16 Guns sent in hither yesterday a *French* Privateer of 12 Guns, which she had taken off *Ushant*, after a sharp Dispute, in which the *French* Captain and 9 of his Men were killed, and 20 wounded.

Deale, October 6. Several outward-bound Merchant Ships failed from the *Downes* the 3d Instant to the

Westward, under Convoy of Her Majesty's Ship the *Woolwich*. The *Tilbury*, *Dartmouth*, *King-Fisher* and *Blackwall*, Men of War, came into the *Downes* the next day from the Squadron of Her Majesty's Ships bound *Dunkirk*, and brought with them 4 *French* Prizes.
