Yesterday moraing a Detachment of Dutch Horse and Dragons met with a Party of 120 of the Enemy's Foot near Tongeren, of whom they killed several, and took Prisoners about 100, with the Commander, and have brought them into our Camp; There appeared likewise 4 Squadrons of their Horse, who immediately retired upon the approach of our Men. Yesterday his Excellency took a Review of the English Foot, as he had done before of the Horse, and the Foreign Troops, and sound them all in very good Condition.
