Genova, Sept. 16. N. S.  
**S**ir Lambert Blackwell, Envoy Extraordinary  
 from Her Majesty of Great-Britain, came  
 hither the 12th Instant from Florence: He  
 has given notice of his Arrival to the Doge and  
 Senate, who appointed four of their Noblemen  
 to Compliment him; and he is preparing for  
 his publick Audience.

Rome, Sept. 23. A Courier came hither this  
 week with an Account, that the French Squa-  
 dron, commanded by the Chevalier de Fourbin,  
 was come to Porto di Gerro in the Ferrarese, and  
 had burnt some Boats in the Mouth of the Po  
 belonging to the Pope's Subjects; upon which  
 the Congregation of State has met several times,  
 but we do not yet hear what Resolutions they  
 have taken. Several Couriers are lately passed  
 by this Place, with Letters from the French Court  
 for the Count de Toulouse, who is still on the  
 Coast of Messina, directing him to return forth-  
 with with his Squadron to Toulon. The Spanish  
 Ambassador had lately an Audience of the Pope,  
 and happening to mention the Investiture of  
 Naples and Sicily, the Pope turned away from  
 him, and would not hear him any longer. They  
 write from Naples, that 300 Foot were embark-  
 ing there, in order to their being transported  
 to Catalonia; That the Persons who were princi-  
 pally concerned in the late Disturbances be-  
 tween the French Soldiers in Garison there and  
 the Spaniards, are condemned, some to be put  
 to Death, and others to the Gallies; And that  
 Monsieur de la Trimoille, who was appointed to  
 inspect the Custom, and other publick Reven-  
 ues of that Kingdom, being come thither to  
 execute his Commission, the Council of State  
 would not allow of it because he is not a Na-  
 tive; upon which he has writ to France, and  
 expects farther Directions.

From the Imperial Camp near Salzara, Sept. 24.  
 The 18th Instant, Lieutenant-Colonel Patte was  
 sent out with 200 Horse towards the Modeneze  
 to observe the Enemy. Major St. Amour, who  
 was abroad with a Party of Horse, sent an Ac-  
 count, that the Enemy having bought up a  
 good quantity of Corn at Verona, came with a  
 Guard of 1000 Horse and Foot to fetch it a-  
 way, in order to lay it up at Mantua; but the  
 Country People would not furnish them with  
 Wagons, unless the French would give them Se-  
 curity, that they should be paid the full Value  
 thereof if they were taken by our Forces, which  
 they refusing to do, were forced to leave the  
 Corn behind. The 19th, we foraged with the  
 Loss only of a Corporal of Dragoons, who was  
 killed venturing out too far. The Body of the  
 Enemy, which was abroad in the Modeneze, re-  
 turned to their Camp, having been fear out on-  
 ly to cover their Foragers. Colonel Kirchbuss  
 sent Advice, that he was arrived at Mirandola  
 with his 200 Horse and the Troops of Welfem-  
 buttel, and that 5 Regiments of the Enemy's  
 Horse and 4 of their Foot were come to Carpi  
 in the Modeneze, but were very weak, and did  
 not seem to have any other Design than to quar-

ter there. The 20th, we foraged again without  
 any Loss. There being a Report, that a French  
 Regiment of Dragoons was marching to Goito,  
 Major St. Amour was sent with 200 Horse to  
 Ostiglia in order to observe them. Our small  
 Parties brought hither 7 or 8 Prisoners. We  
 heard, that the Enemy were making a Bridge of  
 Boars over the Po at Guastalla, intending to re-  
 tire towards that Place, and to break down  
 their Bridge near Luzzara. We received an  
 Account, that the night before, the Spanish Sol-  
 diers, which kept Guard in the Duke of Anjou's  
 Quarters, were on a sudden removed, and in  
 their stead a French Guard of 3 Companies of  
 Granadiers, and 30 Gendarmes on Foot, was  
 placed there, and 8 French Officers were ordered  
 to lie in his Chamber to prevent any Surprize,  
 which caused a great Alarm in their Camp, and  
 much murmuring among the Spaniards. A Par-  
 ty of 30 Hussars killed 30 of the Enemy near  
 Carpi, and brought in 2 Prisoners, and 7 Head  
 of Cattel. The 21st, a Party of 60 Horse  
 went out towards Mantua, and meeting with  
 one of the Enemy, killed several, and brought  
 in 7 Prisoners, and 54 Head of Cattel. Our  
 small Parties likewise brought in 9 or 10 Pris-  
 oners. The two Colonels of Hussars, Ebergemf  
 and Paul Diack, with 100 of their Men, and Ad-  
 jutant-General Davis with 30 Horse, went out  
 to make an Excursion into the Milanze, and  
 are to continue abroad 3 Weeks. The 22d, our  
 Right Wing foraged without any interruption.  
 The Enemy began to make the Reparition of their  
 Winter-Quarters, which are to extend from the  
 Po by Guastalla, Reggio, and Carpi, to Corregio and  
 Modena. The 23d, our Left Wing foraged with-  
 out any Loss; their Guard on the contrary ha-  
 ving taken some Cattel from the Enemy. It was  
 confirmed, that the Enemy intend to retire to-  
 wards Guastalla, and we saw them sending some  
 of their Cannon to the other side of the Po.  
 The 24th, the Enemy were drawing together a  
 great number of Country People in the Mila-  
 neze and the Montferrat, who are to be employ-  
 ed in making a Line to cover their Winter-Quar-  
 ters; We have again received Advice, that the  
 Duke of Anjou will soon be going back to Spain,  
 and that the Enemy will shortly decamp and  
 march into Quarters. Yesterday they made a  
 General Forage towards the Parmesan, com-  
 mitting great Disorders. We received an Ac-  
 count from Bersello, that a Lieutenant of Dra-  
 goons, who was abroad with a Party, see-  
 ing some Boats which the Enemy were send-  
 ing down the Po to their new Bridges, found  
 means to seize 8 of them, killing and taking  
 Prisoners those who were on board them, and  
 afterwards burnt the Boats.

Copenhagen, October 3. The 27th of the last
