RECRUITMENT UNDER NORMAL REGULATIONS OF LEGAL Assistants in various Government Depart-

1. Age. Candidates must be at least 26 and under 35 years of age on 1st January, 1949.

2. Sex and Marriage. (i) Both men and women may compete under these Regulations.
(ii) Married women who have formerly been established civil servants and have drawn marriage gratuity (other than those who are widows or divorced, or who are separated from their husbands, or whose husbands suffer without hope of recovery from total physical or mental incapacity) will not be slightly unless they undertake to refund on appoint. eligible unless they undertake to refund on appointment the marriage gratuity paid.

3. Nationality. Candidates must be British sub-ts... They must also satisfy one of the following iects. conditions:

(a) If natural-born British subjects, they must either

(i) have at least one parent who is, or was at death, a British subject; or
(ii) have resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment. appointment;

appointment; (b) If naturalized British subjects, they must have resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment. (c) If not qualified under (a) or (b) of this para-graph, they must satisfy the Commissioners that they are so closely connected with His Majesty's dominions either by ancestry, upbringing or residence, or by reason of national service, that an exception may properly be made in their favour. favour.

4. Qualification. Candidates must be barristers or admitted solicitors in England, except that for posts

candidates be in Scottish Departments must advocates or qualified solicitors in Scotland.

5. Health and Character. Successful candidates: must satisfy the Commissioners as to their health and character.

6. Competition. The Commissioners may sum-mon to appear before a Selection Board all who are found to be prima facie eligible, or may, if they see: fit, summon only those whose qualifications and ex-perience are considered to be most suitable. The Selection Board will take into consideration the candidates' record of experience and education, any recommendation from persons named by the cancandidates' record of experience and education, any recommendation from persons named by the can-didates as having direct knowledge of their work, and the personal qualities of the candidates as shown at the interview; and on their estimation of all the above facts they will frame their recommendations. The decision of the Commissioners will be final.

7. Candidates trained as Teachers. Persons upon whose training for the occupation of teacher public money has been spent cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate central education authority (e.g., the Ministry of Education, the Scot-tish Education Department, the Ministry of Educa-tion for Northern Ireland) has been notified to the Commissioners.

8. Assignment. The Commissioners will decide to which Government Department each successful candidate is to be assigned. A candidate who declines to accept the post offered will have no claim to be assigned to another, but will be regarded as having declined appointment. Assignments will be made in accordance with the needs of the public ser-vice, but the wishes of candidates will, where pos-sible, be taken into account.

9. Canvassing. Any attempt on the part of can-didates to enlist support for their applications through Members of Parliament or other influential persons, except as referees to be named by them in their Aplication Forms, will disqualify them for appointment.

10. Fee. A successful candidate will be required to pay a fee of  $\pounds 1$  before the issue of a certificate of qualification for appointment.

11. These Regulations apply to the competition of spring, 1949, and are liable to be modified for subsequent competitions. They are issued by the Civil Service Commissioners with the approval of the Treasury.
