Lisbon, Octob. 16. N. S.

Three days ago arrived here a Tartane freighted by the Alcayde of Tangier to carry 14 English Captives, who are set ashore here, and delivered to Paul Methuen Esq; Her Majesty of Great Britain's Envoy Extraordinary at this Court.

Rome, Sept. 30. Last week we received an Account, That the French had surpris'd a little Fort in the Emarsé, and had burnt 4 Barks laden with Salt for the use of the City of Ferrara, which were going up the Po, suspecting that they were design'd for the Imperial Army, upon which a Congregation of State was held, and the Pope has since ordered about 4000 Men to be sent into that Country for its greater Security. Letters from Naples of the 28th Instant say, that Sentence of Death had been published there against the Marquis del Vasto, Don Malizio Caraffi, and the Duke of Telefa, who sometime ago retired from thence into Germany, being in the Emperor's Interest: That 2 French Regiments of Foot were ordered from that place to Milan, and a Companies of Spaniards to Barcelona; And that the Gallies of Naples were gone to cruise on the Coast of Libya.

Venice, Octob. 12. Letters from the Imperial Army of the 8th Instant say, That both Armies were still in the same Posts. The King of Spain left the French Camp the 2d Instant, in order to return to Madrid, having before his departure made the Duke de Vendosme a Grandee of Spain, and Knight of the Order of the Golden Fleece.

Ruubema, Octob. 16. On the 12th Instant a Courier arriv'd here from Vienna, with the Emperor's Approbation of the Resolutions taken by the Diet on the 15th and 20th of the last Month against France and Bavaria, which Cardinal Lambert, his first Commissioner, has accordingly ratified. He delivered to the Diet at the same time Copies of the Emperor's Letter to the Elector of Bavaria, and of another to the Affiliated Circles, promising them his Assistance in case that Elector did not desist from disturbing the Peace of the Empire; as also a Letter from the King of the Romans, thanking the Diet for their speedy and vigorous Resolutions in the Affair of Uim, and offering to assist them, though with the Hazard of his Person; and enclosing several Letters from the Court of Bavaria to France, which had been intercepted, whereby the Elector's Engagements are plainly discover'd, particularly by one, wherein the Marshal de Carinar is desired to send 30 Battalions and 40 Squadrons to his Assistance, as had been promised by France. The 15th another Courier came from Vienna, with the Declaration of War in the Name of the Empire, and the Emperor's Advocatoris, against France and Spain, all which Papers will forthwith be made publick. The Elector of Bavaria is still at Memmingen, with part of his Forces, and the Count d'Arco is poited with the rest at Biberach. A Detachment of 2000 Bavarian

Horse is sent out to make head against Colonel Gomborch, who, with a strong Party of Hussars, is between the Rivers Lech and Iller, putting under Contribution the Villages belonging to that Elector. General Palfi, with 1200 Hussars more, has taken Post at Lawingen and Dillingen, to secure those Passes on the Danube against the Bavarians.

Cologne, Octob. 24. The Elector of Cologne was expected at Luxembourg the 20th Instant, and it is said he intends to proceed from thence to France, Count Tallard, with his Detachment, is march'd towards Triers to join a Body of French Forces encamp'd near that Place, who have lately seiz'd the Towns of Sarbourg and Andernach, and seem to have a Design upon Traerbach. The Elector Palatine returned to Disseldorf the 17th Instant, and the Bishop of Raab is gone thither to confer with him. The Dutch Forces which came lately into our Neighbourhood, under the Command of Major-General Hompesch, march'd the 15th Instant to Breul, where they continue encamp'd, and a Detachment of 1000 Horse was sent out from thence this morning towards Boss. We hear, the Imperialists and the French have lately had an Engagement near Huningen, wherein the former obtained a compleat Victory over the Enemy, though with the Loss of many of their Men.

Hannburgh, Octob. 24. Letters from Cracow give an Account, That the King of Sweden has had a Fall from his Horse, and broke his Leg, but that he was past all Danger, and in a fair way of Recovery. The Secretary of the Embassy appointed to offer the Mediation of the Republick of Poland to that Prince, in order to adjust Matters between him and their King, was return'd towards Warsaw, but without any positive Answer. In the mean time there have happen'd several Skimmishes between the Swedish Troops and those of Ogmisky, which last have usually had the Advantage; and it is said, 30 squadrons of Polish Horse are come to the Frontiers of Lithuania, with intent to oblige the Swedish Forces quarter'd in that Duchy to retire from thence. The King of Poland, according to our last Accounts from Warsaw, was still there; 6000 of his Saxon Foot are march'd into the Polish Prussia, having obtained Passage through the King of Prussia's Territories. Letters from Berlin say, that King has received a Letter from the Emperor, concerning the Proceedings of the Elector of Bavaria; to which he has return'd an Answer, promising, That he would readily enter into any Measures that should be thought proper for bringing over that Elector to the Common Cause, or putting him out of a Condition to oppose it. A Treaty is lately concluded between the Emperor and his Prussian Majesty, for his entering into the Grand Alliance, whereby he also engages to continue in the Emperor's Service the 3000 Men of his Troops that are at present employ'd therein. They write from Copenhagen, that the Emperor's Resident there has agreed with the Danes at that Court for 1500 Foot and 1000 Horse to be taken in at the Emperor's Pay.

Paris, Octob. 25. After all the Advantages we pretend to have gain'd over the Germans under Prince Lewis of Baden near Huningen, we now begin to conceive, that we have lost there 3000 Men, besides a considerable
