THE following Address was presented to Her Majesty by *Constantine Phips* and *William Vaughan Esqrs*, introduced by the Rt. Hon. the Earl of *Northampton*, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State.

To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Governor, Council, and Representatives of Your Majesty's Province of *New-Hampshire* in *New-England*, convened in General Assembly.

WE Your Majesty's most Loyal and Dutiful Subjects of this Province, humbly pray to be admitted with all other Your Majesty's good Subjects, to offer our Condolence for the Loss of that most Excellent Prince, our late Sovereign Lord King *William III.* of *Glorious Memory*; and humbly to prostrate our selves at Your most Sacred Majesty's Feet, with our hearty Thanksgivings to Almighty GOD, that has preserved Your Majesty for the great Benefit and Comfort of Your Majesty's Three Kingdoms, and of all the Provinces and Plantations under your Royal Government; and with all humble and sincere Assurance of our constant and entire Obedience to Your Majesty's Commands at all times, and our most earnest Prayers, That God will give Your Majesty a long and happy Reign over us, and prosper your Arms, to the Subduing the Exorbitant Power of France, and all other Your Majesty's Enemies whatsoever.

Which Address Her Majesty received very graciously.

*Venice, October 21. N. S.* According to our last Advices from the Imperial and the French Armies, they were still encamped in the same Places, and the former continued to send out Parties with very good Success: They confirm all that has been said of the famous Excursion of General *Davia*, who having ventured into the Capital City of the State of *Milan*, after a very long March, returned to the German Camp with a Booty of above 3000 Pistoles, 100 fine Horses, a great quantity of rich Silks, and other Goods, to a very considerable value; and add, that the smaller Parties sent out from the said Camp have within these few days taken from the French near 200 Prisoners, 70 Horses, 12 Mules, about 200 Oxen, 100 Sheep, and 240 Sacks of Corn, besides other Booty; We hear also, that the French Soldiers desert daily in great numbers. Orders are come from *Vienna* to the *Valley del Sole*, near the *Veroneze*, to provide Quarters for 4000 Germans, which are on their way from *Germany*, in order to join the Imperial Army commanded by Prince *Eugene*.

*Copenhagen, October 24.* Orders were sent from hence some time ago to all the Governors of the Forts and Castles on any of the Coasts in the Danish Dominions, not to harbour any French Privateers, or their Prizes; Since which we hear from *Norway*, that none of them have appeared in those Parts. Letters from *Lithuania* give an Account, that *Monseigneur Bonas*, the French Envoy to the Court of *Sweden*, going from *Riga* to *Cracow*, on purpose to oppose the Negotiations that are on foot for restoring the Peace of the North, fell into the hands of a Party of *Oginsky's* Troops, who took him Prisoner. Here is a Report, that the *Muscovites* have besieged *Narva*; but it needs Confirmation.

*Berlin, October 28.* The Letters from *Poland*, which came in this day, bring an Account, that the Fall which the King of *Sweden* had lately from his Horse does not prove to be of so dangerous Consequence as was at first reported, the Hurt he received in his Thigh being only a great Contusion, so that he was able to go abroad in a Litter, and was marched with his Army from *Cracow*, intending to proceed by slow Journeys towards *Prussia*. The Deputies appointed to offer him the Mediation of the Republick, for adjusting Matters between him and the King of *Poland*, having sent him a Letter to acquaint him with the Commission they were charged with, he has writ them an Answer, desiring first to be satisfied, Whether the Forces of the Crown acting in an Hostile manner against the *Swedes*, was by Direction from the Republick. It is said these Deputies, who were on their way to his Camp, are thereupon gone back to *Warsaw*, looking upon this Demand as a Refusal of accepting the Mediation, since it implies that the Republick is a Party concerned in the War.

*From the Camp of the Allies before Liege, November 2.* On the 25th part a Detachment of 14 Squadrons of Horse, and 10 Battalions of Foot, under the Command of the Prince of *Hesse*, Lieutenant-General, marched over the *Masse* to besiege the *Chartreuse*. The Weather proved so bad, that we could not open our Trenches until the 28th, which was done by the Brigade of *Murray*. At night they were relieved by Brigadier-General *Witbers*. The Batteries and Lines of Communication were all finished that night, so that our Mortars began to play the 29th in the morning, and our Cannon about noon: In an hour after the Enemy bear a Parley, and the Capitulation was agreed to; The taking of this Place cost us 2 Officers killed and 7 wounded, none of them English, and 12 Soldiers killed and 50 wounded. The 21st, the Garrison marched out of the Place, being upwards of 1500 Men, besides near 300 that are computed to have deserted from thence before the Capitulation. The Troops of *Liege* came out first, and immediately quitted the French Service, marching off in a Body, and their Colonel came to his Excellency the Earl of *Marborough*, who was present to see them march out, and made him a Compliment upon his quitting that Service: Of the *Swiss* there deserted likewise above 400 as soon as they came out, so that this Garrison will be very much lessened before they get to *Antwerp*, whither they are marching, being conducted by a Squadron of Brigadier-General *Woea's* Regiment. To-morrow the Army will separate, and the next day his Excellency designs to embark in a Yacht at *Mistrick*, and to go down the *Masse*, intending to visit *Stevenswaert*, *Kuremunde*, and *Venlo*, and to be at the *Hague* on Tuesday next. We have begun to repair the Works of the Citadel of *Liege*, which will soon be in Perfection again.

*Paris, October 27.* *Te Deum* was sung yesterday in the Cathedral Church of this City, for our late pretended Victory over the Imperial Troops near *Heuningen*, which, as great as it is reported to be, has not enabled our Forces to join those of the Elector of *Bavaria*. The French King has made the *Marquis de Villars* a Marshal of France. The Court returned this day from *Fountainbleau* to *Versailles*. 16th Instant, say, neither our Forces nor the Imperialists had yet removed their Camp. The French King has received a Letter from the Elector of Cologne, who complains of the great Hardships he undergoes, and that he has not been supported by France in the manner that was promised him. They write from Nantz, that a Ship is come in there from St. Domingo, which brings an Account, that Vice-Admiral Bembow has burnt 10 or 12 French Merchant Ships of great value. Letters from Rochell say, that since the War above 60 of their Merchant Ships have been taken by the English and Dutch, to the greatest Discouragement of the Trade of that Place, insomuch that the Court has thought fit to send Orders thither, that no Merchant Ship should put to Sea without a Convoy.

Paris, October 30. We are all here, and even at Court, very much troubled at the Loss of the Citadel of Liege, and especially at the manner of taking it, and that with reason, considering the Importance of the Place, and what is more, the ill Consequences that may attend it; Besides that we reckon to have lost on this occasion 14 of our best Battalions. We have not yet any Account of the Elector of Bavaria's advancing to join the Marshal de Villars, which makes us fear some Disappointment in the Advantages we expected from him, and that the Circumstances of our Affairs, and the unanimous Resolutions of the Diet at Ratisbon, may oblige him to endeavour to prevent in time those Calamities into which his Brother the Elector of Cologne is fallen.

Hague, Nov. 1. N. S. The Magistrates and Chapter of Lige have writ a Letter to the States General, full of Acknowledgments of their Deliverance from the French Yoke by the Arms of the Allies. The last Accounts from the Camp near that Place say, the Earl of Marlborough, with the other Generals, and the Deputies of the States, were regulating the Winter Quarters for the Army, and that his Excellency would be here next week. The Council of State is preparing the State of War for the next year, which is to be laid before the States General; and it is said that our Fleet will be considerably augmented. The Prussian Forces commanded by the Margrave Albert of Brandenburg have bombarded Rhinberg, and are marched into their Winter Quarters. The Count de Tallard is encamped near Triers, where he has been reinforced by several French Regiments drawn out of Metz, Luxembourg, and other Places, which are left very bare of Troops, and he is getting together some Artillery and Ammunition, with intent, as it is supposed, to attack Rhinfeld or Traerbach. It is said, a considerable Detachment of the Forces of the Allies that are encamped near Bonn are to march towards the Upper Rhine. Our freshest Accounts from thence say, Prince Lewis of Baden's Army having been considerably strengthened by the Count de Stirum and General Thungen joining him with the Forces under their Command, so that it was above 1500 stronger than the French, his Highness had attacked the Town of Newbourg on the Rhine, which the French lately took by Surprise, and intended, after he had taken it, to force the Enemy's Camp. We hear Monsieur Pointis's Squadron, consisting of 16 Sail, some of which are Men of War and Fireships, which put to Sea the 22d Instant from Dunkirk, is since returned thither, having suffered much by Stormy Weather.

Tarmouth Road, October 23. Captain Fowles Commanding the Squadron of Her Majesty's

Ships cruising off of this Road, for the observing and pursuing the Dunkirk Squadron, received Advice from a Dutch Fisherman, who had been carried into Dunkirk, and had ransomed his Vessel, that coming thence the 17th Instant, he then left 9 Frigats of the Dunkirk Squadron, with 3 or 4 Privateers of the same Place, in that Road, and believed they intended to go Northward; upon which Captain Fowles with the said Squadron stood off towards Dunkirk, in order to pursue them.

Falmouth, October 24. This day was brought in here by a Flushing Caper a French Privateer of 8 Guns, 5 Parereroes, and 45 Men, which had been cruising 6 weeks without being able to take one Prize. Two other Dutch Privateers are also come into this Port with each a French Prize, both belonging to Nantz, and laden with Sugar, &c. one from Martinico, and the other from St. Domingo.
