Po; but Prince *Eugene* has taken such care to se-
 cure it, that it is believed this Attempt will prove
 unsuccessful. We have an Account from *Milan*,
 that Signior *Cornaro*, and Signior *Rizzini*, Am-
 bassadors Extraordinary from this Republick to
 the King of *Spain*, had publick Audience of him
 there the 21st Instant, and that he had sent away
 part of his Equipage for *Spain*, intending to be
 going thither in few days, and to embark at *Genoa*
 where there are several *French* and *Spanish* Galleys
 ready to attend him, in order to pass by Sea to
Marseilles. They write from *Trent*, that the Count
de Salai left that Place the 17th Instant, with
 the Forces under his Command, which were for-
 merly in Garison at *Gustalla*, and are obliged
 by the Capitulation which was made at the Sur-
 render of that Place, not to act against the *French*
 before the next Campaign; And that he is
 marched towards *Bavaria*, being to join a Body
 of Forces which is drawing together on the
 Frontiers of that Country, and is to be employ-
 ed against the Elector of *Bavaria*.

Plimouth, Nov. 8. The *Fane of Topsham*,
Bernard Townsend Master, came in here the 4th
 Instant from *Faro*. The next day came in a
 Dutch Man of War from *Vigo*. On the 6th
 the *Wolf* Advice Boat arrived here from *Boston*,
 who in her passage took a *French* Ship of about
 100 Tuns, bound home from the *West-Indies*,
 which is not yet come in. This Evening came
 in Her Majesty's Ship the *Medway* from *New-*
foundland, which came from thence with the
 Squadron of Her Majesty's Ships commanded
 by Captain *Lake*, and a great many *French*
 Prizes which they have taken in those Parts.
 but was separated from them in bad Weather.

Tymouth, Nov. 9. Her Majesty's Ship the
Rumney came into our Road this afternoon
 with two Merchant Ships from *Archangel*,
 having been separated in bad Weather some
 days ago from Her Majesty's Ship the *Ludlow*,
 and the rest of the homeward bound *Russia*
 Fleet. Her Majesty's Ship the *Solebay* sailed
 this day for the River, with about 50 laden
 Colliers under her Convoy.

Parsmouth, November 10. Captain *Lake* is
 just now come to *Spithead*, with Her Majesty's
 Ships the *Exeter* and *Lichfield*, and a *French*
 Prize from *Newfoundland*, having been separated
 from the rest of his Squadron by stormy
 Weather. He brings this good News, That the
 Squadron under his Command has taken in the
 Harbours at *Newfoundland* and at Sea 29 Sail
 of Ships, and burnt two. Besides which he has
 burnt and destroyed all the Fishing Boats and
 Stages &c. at *Trapassy*, *St. Mary's*, *Colnet*, *Great*
and Little St. Lawrence's, and the Island of
St. Peter's at the Entrance of *Fortune Bay*, be-
 ing all very considerable Establishments of the
French at *Newfoundland*, and of the greatest Im-
 portance for carrying on their Fishery there,
 and breeding their Seamen. At the latter of
 these Places there was a small Fort of 6 Guns,
 which he wholly demolished.

Whitehall, November 11. This day arrived here
 an Express with Letters from Sir *Claudefly Shovell*,
 dated yesterday on board the *Shrewsbury* off the
 Isle of *Wight*, giving an Account, That he set
 Sail from *Vigo* the 25th of the last Month with

the remainder of Her Majesty's Fleet, and the
French Men of War and Galeons which had been
 taken there, being in all about 70 Sail; having
 first taken 110 Brass Guns out of the Batteries
 and the Ships that were burnt and sunk, for
 Fire to all the Ships and Vessels that were on
 Shore and could not be got off, and exchanged
 several Prisoners for 7 of our Men, that had
 been taken by the *Spaniards*, which were all they
 had. One of the Galeons coming out, struck
 upon a Rock near the Isles of *Bayona*, and found-
 red, but all the Men were saved, and a Prize from
Marlaix, which had been taken by the *Nassau*, found-
 red at Sea, and all her Men were lost. The
 Weather being very Stormy on the 6th Instant, the
 Fleet was separated off *Scilly*, as they were com-
 ing into the Chanel; but when this Letter came
 away, there were about 40 Sail of them in sight.
